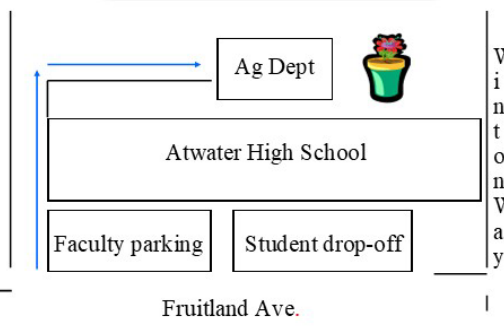

Shade Trees

Mt Fuji Flowering Cherry

A magnificent show-stopper with showy clusters of fragrant white flowers backed by bronze-tinged new foliage. Works well as a single specimen or lawn tree in smaller landscapes or in groves for magnificent impact in larger landscapes. Excellent for use as a shade tree. Deciduous. Moderate growing; reaches 20 ft. tall, 25 ft. wide.

Krauter Flowering Plum

The Krauter Vesuvius Purple Leaf Plum is a small tree, reaching 15 to 20 feet tall and spreading about the same distance wide. It has a dense, upright crown of many branches, and in spring they are covered in a profuse blooming of small pale-pink flowers.

Bradford Flowering Pear

Bradford pear (*Pyrus calleryana* 'Bradford') is a spring-flowering tree that has been widely planted throughout the eastern U.S. in the last few decades. It is a popular tree that is frequently seen in nearly every city within its growing range. The Bradford pear grows 30 to 50 feet tall and 20 to 30 feet wide. It has a wider and more erect, branchier canopy than the species.

Raywood Ash

Raywood Ash, botanical name *Fraxinus oxycarpa* 'Raywood,' is a Mediterranean native that can grow to be a large tree with a round-headed form, so it is capable of providing the right amount of summer shade! It's a favorite in landscapes throughout the Southwest both for its shade coverage as well as the beautiful fall color it brings to yards! In the fall, the attractive dark green leaves turn to an alluring red wine color. Once the leaves fall, it can let the sun's warmth in, and you'll only need to do a one-time easy cleanup! The foliage comes back in the spring, just in time to cool off your home and keep you comfortable while you're enjoying your yard! Grows up to 60-70'.

Birch (European)

A graceful deciduous tree with a gently arching form and distinctive, white, peeling bark. Small green leaves turn shades of bright yellow with the coming of fall, and small catkins drape from the branches in spring. Makes a handsome lawn specimen, windbreak, or Privacy screen. This tree instantly adds a woodland look and feel to the garden.

Chitalpa

Broadleaf deciduous tree, small to medium, 20-35 ft (6-10.7 m) tall, branches dense, spreading. Leaves alternate, occasionally opposite, to 20 cm long, narrow, tapering at both apex and base, dull green, glabrous above and shaggy soft hair below. Flowers in erect clusters (racemes), trumpet-shaped, resemble Catalpa, pink, yellowish center. Sun and partial shade. Blooms for several months during the summer. A tough, drought-tolerant plant.

Locust (Purple Robe)

Purple Robe Locust is a tough, fast-growing shade tree with highly fragrant and very attractive chains of deep pink flowers in spring. Truly a unique specimen shade tree, which has been growing in popularity recently, the Purple Robe Locust is extremely adaptable to all soil conditions. Purple Robe Locust has bluish-green foliage that emerges burgundy in spring. The oval leaves turn yellow in fall. It has chains of fragrant rose pea-like flowers with yellow eyes hanging below the branches in late spring. This tree is definitely a head turner worth paying attention to!

Maple (Red Sunset)

'Red Sunset' maple is the trademarked name for a popular 'Franksred' cultivar of the North American red maple species (*Acer rubrum*). This 40-to-50-foot cultivar is grown for the richness and reliability of its fall foliage color, turning from green to brilliant red, and for its cold hardiness. Plant it in a location with at least six to eight hours of sun with at least 40 feet of width to accommodate its adult size.

Weeping Double Flowering Cherry

This slow-growing ornamental tree makes the perfect showcase plant. The double-weeping cherry lends its elegance to any landscape with its reliable, unique blooms, thriving in moist soil. Use this tree as either a single focal point or paired to frame entryways-- this cherry is particularly striking when set against a dark evergreen background.
