BILLIONS FOR AUTOS

The automobile industry says that the cost of operating a small pleasure automobile is 6.43 cents a mile, and that the average number of miles such a car runs in a year is 11,000, so that the annual cost of upkeep of a small car is \$757.30. There are, in round numbers, 23,000,000 pleasure cars registered in the United States. The estimated cost of operating them all, therefore, is in excess of \$16,000,000,000 a year. The Government's latest figures show that the total gross farm

income is \$6,920,000,000. The gross cost of education, including all schools, is \$3,200,000,000 a year. One of the trade papers estimates that the total cost of all buildings in the United States in 1931, was \$4,312,000,000. The figures seem to indicate that the cost of upkeep for pleasure automobiles, including depreciation, is substantially greater than gross farm income, plus the total cost of education, plus the total cost of building.—Sphere.

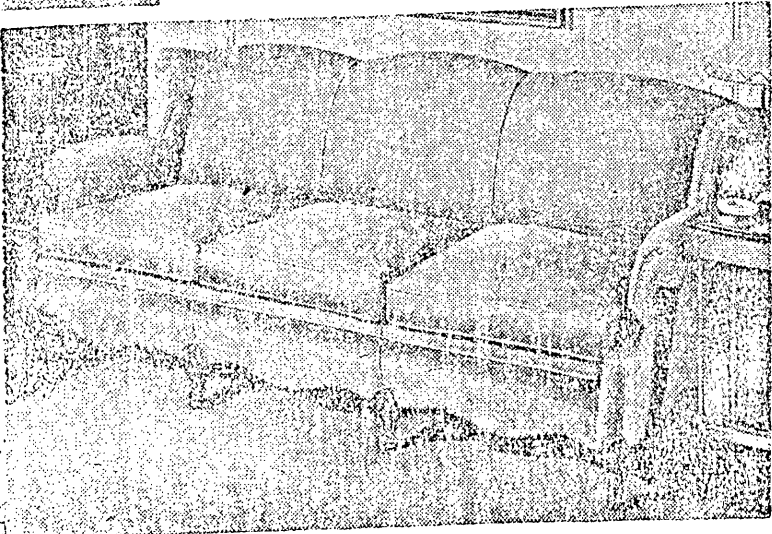
