The **December** theme is – Maintenance of Way and Non -Revenue Cars. The categories are:

- A. Track maintenance materials cars for hauling ballast, ties, rails, etc.
- B. Crew cars bunk cars, inspection cars, cooking/dining cars
- C. Track maintenance machinery/cars (incl snowplows)
- D. Track/bridge construction machinery/cars, cranes

The January Rail School has been cancelled and we will have a regular meeting. This will include a contest in January. The **January** theme is snow:

- A. Locomotives mounted plows
- B. Rotary plows






For December we will be visiting Al Pott's layout. Al will be presenting the clinic for this meeting so we'll be able to view his work on his layout.

In memoriam, Tom Eckstein



We lost a longtime member when Tom Eckstein passed away on October 27, 2021. Tom was a regular face at our Division meeting sign-in table with Don Swinton, an active member going back to the early days of the Division. Tom was awarded both the Bob Davis Award

for volunteer spirit and the Madison Mac Award for his modeling efforts. Tom was the Division's third Master Model Railroader, #96. You could usually find him working as Yardmaster at



LaGrande on Bill Weber's UP railroad. And he loved to tell stories of his days in the Navy and working on the railroad.

Most of us probably had not seen his railroad, the Tired, Pooped & Exhausted but it was fun railroad. If you were not at the November Division meeting, Al Potts put together a great Powerpoint presentation on Tom's layout along with some photos of Tom. I took Tom to his last Morse Telegraph Club meeting several years ago and got to hear stories of his times working for the Chicago & Northwestern. They apparently were being sent somewhere for use in poisoning serums. On the first shipment, Tom kept hearing hissing noises and asked what was in the crates. When he was told, he really didn't want to handle the crates and put them far away until the next train came in to pick them up.

Tom and I were best friends for over 40 years. We would take a week or two in the summer to chase trains. Tom, Don Johanning and I would meet at Tom's house and decide where and when to go. We would get out the AAA books and book our motel rooms and map out our routes. Tom's wife Shirley would get our food supplies and we would set out for our great adventure somewhere around a railroad track and wait for a train to come by so we could get video and still photographs. We had our folding stools and sat and shot the breeze while waiting. I must tell you one of our tales: It happened in Cumberland, Maryland. We arrived at the Ambassador Motel about 3:30pm and checked in. We were told we couldn't get in the room for a while because they were fumigating the room. We went to dinner and chased some trains and came back to find that the room had a

Narrow Gauge Railroads In Wisconsin??

What is meant by "narrow gauge"? In the early years of railroads, many track widths were used. The fact that the early railroads seldom operated more than 15 miles of track, generally linking one or two towns, the multitude of track gauges was not a problem. After profitable rail lines were built, it soon became obvious that a common track gauge and standardized equipment would make interchanging rolling stock possible, and thus increase profits considerably.

Wisconsin was fortunate enough to have five different common-carrier railroads which built in 3'gauge track size. There were several other proposed lines that never got off the ground, in addition to the plethora of private narrow gauge lines serving mines, sawmills, quarries, and other industries. The following is a summary of the primary narrow gauge lines built or proposed in Wisconsin:

Fond du Lac & Whitewater Railway

- Incorporated in 1874
- Merged into the Fond du Lac, Amboy & Peoria Railroad in 1875
- Constructed and operated line from Fond du Lac south to Iron Ridge, WI
- Converted to standard gauge (Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul) May 24-26, 1884

Galena & Southern Wisconsin Railroad

- Incorporated March 2, 1857
- Could not raise funds to build in Standard gauge, so 3' narrow gauge was decided upon
- Built line from Galena to Platteville, with branch line extending from Ipswich to Montfort
- Bought by Chicago & North Western in 1880, merged with Chicago & Tomah Railroad to form the "Milwaukee & Madison"
- Converted to Standard gauge in 1882

Chicago & Tomah Railroad

- Woodman to Fennimore line built 1878
- Fennimore to Lancaster built 1878
- Lancaster Jct. to Montfort built 1879
- 1879 line graded from Wauzeka to Gays Mills, but track was never laid because funds were lacking for a bridge over the Wisconsin River. This line was later used by the Standard gauge Kickapoo Valley & Northern Railway, and much later became the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul LaFarge Brach. Purchased by Chicago & North Western in 1880 and merged into the "Milwaukee & Madison Railway"
- All trackage except Fennimore to Woodman converted to Standard gauge beginning in 1882

Pine River Valley & Stevens Point Railroad

- Incorporated August 5, 1872
- Track laid from Richland Center to Lone Rock 1875-76
- Originally built of 3.5 x 5" maple rails with strap iron facing on curves. Eventually rebuilt with steel rails.
- Purchased by Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul May 26, 1880
- Line entirely converted to Standard gauge August 1, 1880

Robbins Railroad

- Rhinelander to Robbins, WI
- Originally private line built to haul logs and lumber
- Organized to common-carrier in 1898
- name changed to Brown & Robbins Railroad
- 1901 name changed back to Robbins Railroad after Brown left business
- eventually became property of Thunder Lake Lumber Company, and operated as "Thunder Lake & Northern" though the official name remained Robbins Railroad
- Abandonment approved June 19, 1941, making this the last narrow gauge common-carrier to operate in the Midwest

Milwaukee & Southern Wisconsin Narrow Gauge Railroad

- Projected to build from Milwaukee to Beloit
- 1874 line was partially graded, but track was never laid

Wisconsin Peninsula Railroad

- Incorporated January 1, 1881
- Proposed route was Green Bay to Liberty Grove Township (at tip of Door County), via Sturgeon Bay
- 1883 second charter secured for line from Green Bay to Fond du Lac
- No track ever laid, unknown if grading was ever started, though a route was surveyed and chartered. Private Railroads
- Unknown how many lines were built for mining, logging, quarrying, and other industrial operations Oddly enough, the only narrow gauge lines built in Wisconsin were of the 3' gauge variety. Wisconsin has not seen a scheduled 3' narrow gauge train since 1941, and its high time this colorful history be brought to light and life. To my knowledge there are only seven pieces of 3' gauge equipment on display in Wisconsin. They are as follows: Fennimore, WI Godchaux Sugar Company 2-6-0 steam locomotive on static display (never used in service in Wisconsin), and Denver & Rio Grande boxcar (used on Colorado narrow gauge system).

North Freedom, WI - Chicago & North Western Boxcar #10 and Combine #1099 (used on "The Dinky" C&NW Fennimore-Woodman line).

Rhinelander, WI - Steam locomotive, coach and caboose on static display at Rhinelander Logging Museum (locomotive used on Thunder Lake Lumber Company line, unsure about coach and caboose).

This article will focus on:

A History of the Galena & Southern Wisconsin Railroad



The Galena & Southern Wisconsin Railroad was incorporated in 1857 as combination of two separate Galena & Wisconsin Railroads, one in Illinois and one in Wisconsin. Its main line between Galena, IL, and Platteville, WI, at 21.2 miles in length, was constructed in 1874 with a 3-foot narrow gauge, a more feasible option when compared to the costs of standard gauge. Notable along this route is one of Wisconsin's few railroad tunnels, Buncombe Tunnel, which was built in 1875 on the Illinois/Wisconsin border near Buncombe proper, in Lafayette County. A branch line at Ipswitch was built north to Rewey, a distance of 8.5 miles, in 1877.

In 1880, the G&SW was merged with the nearby Chicago and Tomah Railroad to form the Milwaukee and Madison Railroad, a subsidiary of the Chicago and North Western Railroad. Later that year, the branch line to Rewey was extended north to Montfort, where it connected with a C&NW line at Montfort Junction. The railroad was further merged into the Chicago, Milwaukee and Northwestern Railway in March of 1881.

At the time, the C&NW was one of the larger railroad operations in the state of Wisconsin, and had amassed a wide collection of narrow-gauge railroads within the state. In 1882, it re-gauged most of these narrow gauge lines to standard gauge, the former G&SW included. This also included widening of Buncombe Tunnel to accommodate the additional track/loading width.







1937 aerial view of the Buncombe Tunnel Portal and switch to Strawbridge

A spur from Millbrig, WI, (just south of Buncombe Tunnel) to Hazel Green was built in 1907, a distance of 2.7 miles. By this time the CM&N had been fully absorbed into the C&NW; the former G&SW was then known as its Platteville Subdivision.

The first abandonment of the former G&SW came in 1938, when its line between Galena and Benton, WI, was abandoned. This also meant abandoning Buncombe Tunnel (which still stands today). The remainder of the line saw diminishing traffic, with the last passenger train in 1955. Mining in the area of Platteville came to an end in 1979, and with it, the final vestige of railroad traffic; the rest of the line was ultimately abandoned a year later in 1980.




The Route Today

The old right-of-way, now abandoned, can still be seen in some places, tracing what was once a small but prosperous locally owned and operated railroad empire stretching between Galena, Illinois, and Platteville as well as Montfort Junction, near where the C&NW Coaling Tower still stands off Highway 18:





Only a few of the structures that served as stations and depots for the G&SWRR exist today. Some bridge abutments can still be found where the roadbed snaked along and across the <u>Galena River (Illinois)</u> (also known as the Fevre River).







Here is a Galena & Southern Wisconsin box car that served as the Strawbridge Depot and still is there today:




Here is an aerial view of Strawbridge and the tunnel location, near where the depot was:



This year's SCWD video contest will be open for submitting entries on November 1, 2021.

Here are the things you need to know:

- There are two categories: **Prototype** and **Model.**
- The contest is open to those who attend the SCWD meetings.
- The person submitting an entry <u>must</u> be the one who took the video, however you may have help from others in editing your entry.
- The video can be from any time period (it doesn't have to be taken just to enter this contest).
- It has to be a **maximum** of 5 minutes in length, but can be any size less than that and the file has to be <u>less than</u> 2GB in size.
- All videos must be on a railroad or model railroad theme.
- The video can have title screen but not necessary, however there should be no names or identifiers on it (it is a "blind" contest).
- For the **Model Category**, the video can be of anyone's layout, not just your own.
- First, second and third place will be given for each category (no points given toward annual Photographer contest).
- **Deadline for Entries March 1** (you will upload all entries to the website listed on the SCWD website, Video Contest webpage).
- You may enter more than once (max. of 5 entries per person).
- Voting starts Mar 10 on the SCWD Video Contest webpage.
- Voting will be closed on end of day **April 15**.
- Winners will be announced at the May 2022 Meeting.

You like trains, or train watching, but have you ever wanted to go to an OPS (Operating Session) and run trains on someone else's



layout, but were afraid you wouldn't know what to do?

Model Railroad Operation is a fun and interesting role-playing game where the players (operators) use model trains to simulate the movements of the prototype railroad. Operators fill the roles of railroad employees like engineers, conductors, yardmasters, dispatchers, and more. Many of our SCWD members participate each month at multiple layouts to enjoy this fun and stimulating practice of critical thinking and problem solving in the context of railroad operations.

Now, there is a way for you to get your feet wet in this critical thinking and problem-solving railroad environment in the privacy of your own home through the use of railroad switching puzzles.

In July, a group of SCWD members started a project to introduce more of our members to the enjoyment of railroad operations, or as our wives call it, playing trains. Some of us have been engaged in operating sessions for 20 years or more, and would like to get more of you involved.

The project involves getting one to solve a series of train switching puzzles (on paper, or your computer) in the least number of moves possible. You can then submit your solution to see if yours was done in the least number of moves.

Beginners can start with 3 introductory puzzles to show the kinds of skills used in railroad switching operations. Then, you can advance to a series of more advanced puzzles written and based on actual SCWD member area layouts. Or, if you have already been to an OPS session, you could do an introductory puzzle, and jump right into the more challenging ones.

There is some concern about our members and volunteers with their exposure to a large number of people that would be attending our event. Precautions will need to be taken to minimize this exposure.
