IT'S TOUGH BEING A CHRISTIAN

Joshua 24:1-2a, 15-17.18b: Psalm 34:2-3, 16-21: Eph. 5:21-32: John 6:60-69

"As a result of this (Jesus' teachings), many of His followers returned to their former way of life and no longer accompanied Him."

It has become common practice for fickle-minded Catholics to abandon their faith for the most frivolous of reasons. In my twenty-one years as a priest, I have met many Catholics who claimed that they are no longer practicing Catholics because they disagree with the Church's teaching on certain social issues. Some would easily walk out of a church or stop attending it if they disagree with what the preacher says. You and I are in a society that cannot tolerate the truth. Thus, craving acceptance or recognition, some often resort to outright falsehood, bending the truth and/or attempting to be politically correct in order to impress their listeners.

After Moses' death it was incumbent on Joshua to lead the Israelites into the Promised Land. With their military prowess they had invaded other nations and as nomads they had interacted with people who were pagans; and thus, they had strayed from the true God. Many times they promised fidelity to God and many times they failed. Many times they promised never to return to their evil ways and many times they went back on their promises. Joshua was exasperated, thus, he exhorted them: "If it does not please you to serve the LORD, decide today whom you will serve..." The fickle mindedness of the Jewish people continued on to the time of Christ, setting the stage for the encounter in today's Gospel, where they said: "This saying is hard; who can accept it?"

Today's first reading and the Gospel paint a true picture of the Christian reality. It is a fact that it is not the intellectual difficulty that keeps people from becoming Christians and remaining committed to it; but it is the height of Christ's teaching and His moral demands. Surely, Jesus offers you and me words of comfort, mercy, compassion, forgiveness, healing, joy and happiness. But, on the other hand, if this is all we are willing to receive from Jesus, we are not practicing the true form of Christianity. The Christian reality stems from a relationship with God in His Son Jesus Christ through the power of the Holy Spirit. It consists of a set of beliefs, practices and statutes. Make no mistake about it, the real difficulty of Christianity is twofold - it demands an act of surrender to Christ, an acceptance of Him as the final authority; and it demands a moral standard of the highest level.

The decision to follow Christ is a hard choice to make when compared to what the corporate world offers through various forms of entertainment and recreation. But the choice is yours: "Whom will you and your family serve...?" There is so much indifference towards worshipping the true God. Many have opted to leave the Church because of her adherence to the teachings of Christ on morality - the sanctity of life - the sacredness of Marriage - emphasis on attending Mass where we offer the sacrifice of the Holy Eucharist - the Ten Commandments, et cetera. For sure, life sometimes deals us painful, heart wrenching cards, which tend to take away our ideals and our enthusiasms and our dreams and our loyalties. In moments like these, Jesus inquires: "Do you also want to leave?" Master, to whom shall we go? You are the only One who can offer us the Spirit that gives life; while, the media, the politicians and the secular world can only offer us the flesh, which is of no avail. Thank you, Jesus!






ALTAR FLOWERS for this week have been donated in loving memory of Giuseppe & Pantaleo Aloia by Theresa DiRodio.

The practice of scattering cremated remains on the sea, from the air or on the ground, or keeping cremated remains in the home of a relative or friend of the deceased are not the reverent disposition that the Church requires."

MARTYRDOM OF JOHN THE BAPTIST AUGUST 29TH



The drunken oath of a king with a shallow sense of honor, a seductive dance and the hateful heart of a queen combined to bring about the martyrdom of John the Baptist. The greatest of prophets suffered the fate of so many Old Testament prophets before him: rejection and martyrdom. The

"voice crying in the desert" did not hesitate to accuse the guilty, did not hesitate to speak the truth. But why? What possesses a man that he would give up his very life?

This great religious reformer was sent by God to prepare the people for the Messiah. His vocation was one of selfless giving. The only power that he claimed was the Spirit of Yahweh. "I am baptizing you with water, for repentance, but the one who is coming after me is mightier than I. I am not worthy to carry His sandals. He will baptize you with the holy Spirit and fire" (Matthew 3:11). Scripture tells us that many people followed John looking to him for hope, perhaps in anticipation of some messianic power. John never allowed himself the false honor of receiving these people for his own glory. He knew his calling was one of preparation. When the time came, he led his disciples to Jesus: "The next day John was there again with two of his disciples, and as he watched Jesus walk by, he said, 'Behold, the Lamb of God." The two disciples heard what he said and followed Jesus" (john 1:35-37).

It is John the Baptist who has pointed the way to Christ. John's life and death were a giving over of self for God and other people. His simple style of life was one of complete detachment from earthly possessions. His heart was centered on God and the call that he heard from the Spirit of God speaking to his heart. Confident of God's grace, he had the courage to speak words of condemnation or repentance, of salvation.

COMMENT: Each of us has a calling to which we must listen. No one will ever repeat the mission of John, and yet all of us are called to that very mission. It is the role of the Christian to witness to Jesus. Whatever our position in this world, we are called to be disciples of Christ. By our words and deeds others should realize that we live in the joy of knowing that Jesus is Lord. We do not have to depend upon our own limited resources, but can draw strength from the vastness of Christ's saving grace.
