This year we will sponsor 12 needy children by providing them with new clothes from head to toe, along with winter outerwear to keep them safe and comfy in the cold winter months. Miriam and I

will be coordinating the effort so let us know if you have any questions.

Here's how it works. The tree will be decorated with tags including each child's name, age/grade, and sizes, along with their favorite colors and interests to make shopping easier, and more fun! There will be multiple tags for each child so hopefully you can find something to fit your budget. You don't have to provide "extras" like toys, books, games, etc., but you're certainly welcome to do so. Donations are due back by December 1st.

Next to the tree will be a table with sign out sheets for the tags you select. Please write your name in the corresponding space to help me keep track of the donations. Save your tag, return it with your unwrapped items by December 1st and place them under the tree. Not a shopper? No problem! I Sing a Song of the Saints of God

Our current study about a few saints has now been completed. We may choose some others to learn about in January and February until we are ready to jump into our Lenten study.

Today our discussions were far reaching. Besides talking about the first Native American Episcopal priest, Enmegahbowh, and Harriet Bedell, a deaconess who

ministered to Native Americans, we discussed a lot of other things. The discussions ended up on the hierarchy of the Episcopal church, what makes a saint and other interesting questions.

Enmegahbowh was born in 1820 in a village outside Toronto to an Ojibwe chief and his wife. Their village had a lot of Methodist influences but Enmegahbowh became discouraged as an interpreter and looked for other things to do. He met an Episcopal priest who gave him a Book of Common Prayer and talked with him about Anglicanism. Later on, he became a deacon then a priest. He diligently worked for peace both between the tribes and the US Army. Peace was his main focus for the rest of his life.

Harriet Bedell was born in Buffalo, NY in 1875. She became a deaconess (this word is no longer used, by the way!) and served the Native American tribes in Oklahoma, Alaska and especially the Seminole people in Florida. She spent thirty years living in the Blade Cross Mission and working with the Seminole tribe. She died at 94 years of age.

Next week, November 20, we will begin our Advent study using An Advent Book of Days by Gregory Kenneth Cameron. The author is the Anglican Bishop of St. Asaph in Wales and is an artist as well. We used his Lenten book A Lenten Book of Days for our Lenten study and it was well received. There are 25 short chapters each about a character of Christmas like St. Lucia, Herod, the Shepherds, the Ox & the Ass and others. We will read and discuss 6 chapters each Wednesday since they are short. We learned a lot of interesting things from the Lenten book so I am quite sure we will learn a lot from this one as well. Come join us on Wednesday mornings at 10 AM starting November 20. We will not have class on November 27 since it is the day before Thanksgiving and we will end on December 18.

News from Fort Dauphin and the Friends of Toliara

Here is the latest words I have had on the possibility of selling Days for Girls (DfG) kits to UNICEF. First, I was wrong about the number of women a big contract from UNICEF could keep employed. That number is currently TWELVE. Here is the newest news on this front from Sue Babbs at St. James the Less. She sends out prayer requests to the church prayer network of which

I am a part, so I get this "stuff".

Thank you very much for your prayers. I heard today that there has been an encouraging response. There is currently some special activity happening through UNICEF in the area (Diocese of Toliara), which includes a measles vaccination drive and a youth conference. When these are over, they are inviting one or two women from Toliara to visit them and train them in the use of DfG kits. UNICEF will pay their expenses. Please pray that this will lead to orders of kits from the DfG Enterprise in Toliara.

It is cyclone season in the Southern Hemisphere, so please pray that no huge storms hit the island this year. So far, so good.

There are 12 kids who have been identified by Fiadanana of the Education and Sponsorship department who are in need of sponsors for their schooling. To refresh your mind, for \$30 per month you would sponsor a child for his or her tuition, monthly fees, school supplies, medical checkups and uniforms (if necessary).

Even if you are not currently sponsoring a child in Madagascar, you can pray for them all. Please remember each of them in your prayers each day. If you notice, we pray for 5 different kids each week in the Prayers of the People so each month we name them all. They are all doing well in school but please pray for their safety since Madagascar is not a safe place, especially after dark!!!
