REMEMBERING KINGMAN JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL

After the end of World War II, Kingman's population had quite a spurt of growth. Many new residents were members of the "Greatest Generation" who had spent part of their military service training at Kingman's Flexible Gunnery School. This new growth was taken in stride by the residents of our county who knew that new schools would be needed for the influx of families who would call Mohave County their home.

Kingman Grammar School was already overcrowded and could not expand. City and County officials agreed in 1947 that a bond should be passed to build a new Junior High School on property at the corner of Spring and Grandview. At the time, Spring Street ran across what is now the middle of the Lee Williams High School campus to Grandview. Construction started in 1947-48, and if I recall rightly, the first class to enjoy this new campus was the Kingman Junior High Class of 1949. Three grades, sixth through eighth, used the new school. We felt honored in Kingman to have a brand new school. I got there in 1955 and immediately fell in love with the campus layout and atmosphere of the whole experience. Many a sack lunch break was spent outside with friend and relative, Sandy Cornwall—no cafeteria or

gym at the school in the early years.

Through my three years at KJHS, I had excellent teachers. Mrs. Letha Bonelli, Mrs. Irene Lewis, Mr. Colling Ottipoby, as well as woodshop instructor and Principal Mr. Blaine Benson, were the teachers who tried to instill some semblance of learning into this writer. I must reveal that two afternoons were spent in Mr. Benson's office awaiting well-deserved discipline. The "swats" doled out by Mr. Benson weren't even close to what my own father meted out, so I took my punishment as prescribed, and made Mr. Benson feel that I had learned my lesson.

A special educator I will always remember is Mr. Les Byram, our physical education instructor and basketball coach. How I made the eighth grade basketball team is still a mystery to me as my only skill was shooting free-throws. I regret not having Mrs. Nell Hand as a teacher while I was at KJHS; she was a

dynamite personality who started her teaching career in Oatman in the 1920s. Although she stood less than five feet tall, Mrs. Hand was a great educator and friend, and well respected. When it was time to move up to the Mohave County Union High School campus across Spring Street, we joined students there from St. Mary's in Kingman, as well as from Topock, Wickieup, Bullhead City, Peach Springs, Valentine, Chloride, Oatman, Goldroad, and other far-flung areas of Mohave County. MCUHS was the only secondary school in the entire county.

Within the last decade or so the decision was made to tear down KJHS. Seeing the old edifices being leveled was, to me, a travesty of trust. I will eventually learn to live with the decision but I felt that there was too much character -building and learning acquired there to have the building demolished. The beautiful campus that was Kingman Junior High School will always be fondly remembered by me and countless other students who matriculated through the Mohave County school system.

NAME THE TELEPHONE OPERATOR (Part Two)

September email from Grover Thomas to Shannon Rossiter:

"...I received the newsletter yesterday. The first thing I do is read Chuck Cooks's column and then the rest. The reason I am writing to you is that I have an entry for a name to put with the telephone operator.

"There was a woman named Mary Lou Roe (married name) in the late 1950-1960's who was one of the main operators at Citizens Utilities, the phone company in Kingman. At that time, while I was in high school, I worked in the evenings and weekends at the Kingman Travel Lodge front desk (because I grew up in my parent's Roping Cowboy Motel so I knew how to work the front desk).

"The Travel Lodge had the first switchboard in a hotel in Kingman. When a customer wanted to make a call, they would pick up the phone in their room and call the front office (me). I would then ask them to hold and I would call Mary Lou at Citizens and say, "Hi, Mary Lou. We have a customer in room #000 who would like to call their family in (Akron, Ohio) and the number they want to call is xxx-xxxx. I will need T&C please (that means Time and Charges)." Mary Lou would connect to the number they wanted then connect it to the motel switchboard (me). Then I would connect the customer. When they finished the call, Mary Lou would call me and say, "Hi, Grover. The call for the (Jones family) in room #000 has T & C of eleven minutes and \$4.40." I would put that information on their room bill so they could pay when they checked out.

"So when I read your Letter from the Director, I had an immediate flashback to the hundreds and hundreds of calls that Mary Lou put through for customers at the Travel Lodge. That's my nomination for your name."

Thanks, Grover: Great story. We'll get a nameplate for Mary Lou at the Brunswick Hotel very soon.




80 Years Ago From the Mohave County Miner

Nov—Dec 1918

The influenza epidemic has not gained much headway in Kingman the past week, there being a total of about twelve cases scattered throughout the town and twenty-one in the hospital.

F. D. McClain of the Goldroad is another one of the more fortunate deer hunters, having returned Tuesday with a fine buck from the hunting grounds near Seligman.

Postmaster Metcalfe reports that Kingman Post Office alone sold through the windows here war

stamps to the extent of \$25,000. This is quite a showing for one office and the employees are to be commended for their good work.
