Now there are some things we all know, but we don't take'm out and look at them very often. We all know that **something** is eternal. And it ain't houses and it ain't names, and it ain't earth, and it ain't even the stars . . . everybody knows in their bones that **something** is eternal, and that something has to do with human beings. All the greatest people ever lived have been telling us that for five thousand years and yet you'd be surprised how people are always losing hold of it. Here's something way down deep that's eternal about every human being.

Thornton Wilder, Our Town Act ///

These lines come from Thornton Wilder's beloved play, *Our Town,* set in a small New England town in the early twentieth-century. At the beginning of the final act the Stage Manager takes us to the cemetery to visit the dead. "They're waitin'," he tells us, "They're waitin' for something that they feel is comin'. Something important and great. Aren't they waitin' for the eternal part in them to come out clear?"

Soon it will be All Saints Sunday. It's the date in the church year set apart to remember loved ones who have died. It is a remembrance that conveys both the finitude and the preciousness of life. It's this same sensibility that Wilder conveys when the character Emily, now a resident of the cemetery, has the chance to revisit her life. She exclaims: "Oh earth, you're too wonderful for anybody to realize you." And then she asks, "Do any human beings ever realize life while they live it? - every, every minute?" The Stage Manager answers "No," but then he adds, "the saints and poets, maybe - they do some."

] guess that's why it's important that we listen to them—to poets and saints. And it's why we gather as a community of faith to remember loved ones who have died, why we celebrate the wonder and preciousness of life, and why we give thanks to God for it all.

Bethlehem Lutheran's 43rd Annual Apple Festival Bazaar was held on October 15, 2016 from 8:00 a.m. until 1 p.m. No coffee or donuts were sold this year. Lunch was sold from 10:00 to 12:55pm.

To publicize the event, articles were placed in the newsletter and in the bulletin insert requesting help of all members of Bethlehem. A sign up sheet was passed around at the W.E.L.C.A. Fall General Meeting. Verbal announcements were made after the church services starting in September.

To reach the community, Christina emailed a press release to the News Enterprise. The article was not printed. Canceling our paid advertisement might have affected publishing our Bazaar news. The wooden APPLE FESTIVAL BAZAAR sign was propped up against the tree on Wallingsford, festooned with colored flags. The beige banner was placed on the PCP pipe facing Katella and the red banner was strung across two poles facing the alley on Sunday Oct. 9th.

Several women worked on their own to provide baked goods. Cheri Dobberteen provided beautiful Bundt cakes, banana bread, pesto, fresh herbs and homemade candy, Camille Riach made candy, Caryl Harris made cinnamon rolls, Jams and other goodies were donated by members, Bill Haglund made 22 jars of Donna's Bean Soup and Pat Watson baked "Grandma Bread". Most Gourmet/Baked items were sold by Sun. October 16<sup>th.</sup>

Craft Workshops were not held again this year, instead people were encouraged to make crafts and this year several handcrafted items were donated. Marjorie Moeller and Dianna Reynolds donated many handmade, hand sewn, hand crocheted/knitted items. New this year were personalized ornaments chaired by Liz Nehrenberg.

Addie's Attic received a lot of donations this year. Many of the items were brand new with the price tag still attached. Marianne S. and Camille agreed to chair a separate area for the "brand new treasures". In Bachman Hall, signs were hung from hooks in the ceiling indicating donation locations

for sorting and pricing. Several people worked throughout the week pricing and organizing the donations, especially Johanne, Jeanne, Camille, Arlene, Marianne and Linda S and her granddaughter.

Dianna and Janice coordinated the donations needed for the kitchen. All donations came from the congregation. We brought the Olive School Chili back this year and also sold "chili by the quart" and it was very successful. Janice and Dianna ran the kitchen the day of the event with Bethlehem ladies working shifts. Food service was steady from 10:00-12:55.

Set-up for the Bazaar began at 6:00 a.m. Sat. morning where the Men in Mission, under the supervision of Jim Brandon, erected 10 pop-up tents. 4 Long tables and 1 small table for condiments were placed for dining. All other tables were used for Addie's Attic, Lynn's Book Nook, Crafts, New Treasures and cashier.

Pastor Richard led us in prayer just before opening. We dedicated this Bazaar to our saints that recently joined our Lord ; Karen Bonwit, Joen Coleman, Doris Schaefer, Jean Franz, Lynn Estabrook, Dan Powers and Charlie Buezis.

The Craft area was placed next to the Nursery (Gourmet/ Bakery) for better visibility. Tarps were placed on the grass to display all the clothing, which was sorted by gender. The "better" clothing items were put on 4 racks and placed by the cashier area.

All departments were outside except Gourmet/Bakery. The Bank was located in a Sunday school room. Kitchen served from inside the building offering seating outside under the two pop-ups against the East wall. Margie Reynolds provided centerpieces of baskets with apples and fresh plants. Bachman Hall was used only for the volunteer refreshment area.

Three separate organizations came to take all that was left from our sale. Seafarer's Lutheran Maritime Mission took mostly men's clothing and kitchen wares. Theresa Murphy from "Precious Life" took women's clothing for their organization. The balance of the donations was collected by "Beacon House", a non-profit organization located in San Pedro. We fed the two volunteers from Beacon House at no cost to them. Two of their men and about 15 of our volunteers filled their big truck to about half capacity. The church building and parking lot was cleaned up by 2:20 p.m. due to so many helping hands.

Approximately \$2030 was raised on Saturday. The Lynn's Book Nook raised \$59 in books etc. for Vacation Bible School in 2017. Additional funds for Gourmet/Baked goods and IOU's were collected the next day. We will net about \$2200. We feel sales were lower this year due to a very low attendance.

It was a cool, beautiful day everyone had a great time, enjoying each other's company, spreading the word of "Bethlehem" through fellowship; working, eating and playing together. Thank you to everyone who participated.

## International Seafarer's Center and Lutheran Maritime Ministry

Did you know.....The International Seafarer's Center started in 1982 in a bus reaching out to Merchant Seafarers, much in the same way as the USO did to the military during the world wars.

Now, they are a non-profit organization with a 13 member board of directors, located on South Pico Ave. in the center of the Port of Long Beach. The center has a large common room complete with a ping pong table, pool table, separate T.V. and reading room, computer and telephone room, chapel and small store.

This center serves seafarers from Noon-10 p.m. six days a week and is run by two women and many volunteers. They have four vans that pick the merchant seamen up from the ships and bring them to the center (at no charge to them) and take them shop- ping at local stores if they desire. At the center they can enjoy complimentary refreshments and browse through the "back room" where they can take a jacket, pants, shoes and anything else they need, also at no charge.

Now I want you to close your eyes and think of yourself back home. Practically everything you picture in your mind's eye (furniture, knickknacks on shelves, food, and clothing) came to us by these huge ships. At any given time there are 60-80 ships in port. Long Beach is the largest port in the U.S, the third largest in the world. A crew of only 21-24 men and sometimes women run these ships. They are paid below poverty level salary. The top pay is around \$800.00 a month for a 12 hour, often dangerous, day.

The seafarers come from all countries around the world; places you have heard of like Russia, Bulgaria, China, and Indonesia and places you haven't heard of like Tuvalu and Kiribati located in the South Seas. These people are away from their families for up to ten months at a time. But to them it is a way to support their family (which may include parents, grandparents as well as their wives and children). Often there is no work available in their homeland and they are forced to work long hard hours on these freighters.

So where does the Lutheran Maritime Ministry come in, you ask? Well at the 2000 Pacifica W.E.L.C.A Convention, Chaplain Virginia Sharma spoke to the women about the International Seafarer's Center and explained that the Lutheran Ministry reaches out to seafarers of all nations and cultures with Christian Witness and Word, meeting personal needs and encouraging spiritual growth. This is where your donations come in. At Christmas time over 2,000 gift bags are assembled and distributed to the sea- farers.

The Lutherans are the main providers of the items that make up these "gift bags".

We spent several evenings last year putting the bags together and had the opportunity to meet some of these amazing people. These are the only gifts they will receive at Christmas. I will be going to the center on Tues. Dec. 13th 6pm to bring our donations and help package the Christmas bags for the Seafarers. Imagine yourself in a strange country where no one speaks your language, you are away from your loved ones and you can't even communicate that you need toothpaste. In a small but important way the International Seafarer's Center in conjunction with the Lutheran Maritime Ministry (of which we are all a part) can bring some joy to these deserving men and women.


