Stuck in the Mud

Like so many in our congregation, I have been feeling the travel bug as of late. Not that I'm not thankful for my family's health and that we have been able to spend a lot of extra time in our house together this year, but I often find myself dreaming of getting on a plane (hmmm, with the kids or without?) and seeing the world's beauty. I imagine the warmth of the sand on a beach in Mexico, the history and culture of a city like London, and at this point, I would be happy to just stay in a hotel in Coshocton. But the place I find myself thinking about most is Israel. It has been a number of years since I have been back to Israel, the place that was foundational in my Jewish growth in childhood and early adulthood. My very first year of Rabbinical School was spent in Jerusalem where we got to explore and see many of places described in the Tanakh (the Jewish Bible). This time of year, as we get ready to celebrate Purim and Passover, Israel was such a meaningful place to be. I think that's largely because of the feeling of togetherness; the feeling that we are all so missing these days. I so vividly remember the sense on the street that everyone was on the same schedule, celebrating holidays together. I'm writing this piece near the beginning of January due to my sabbatical, and I don't know what the end of February and March will look like, but I imagine that we will be celebrating our beloved holidays of Purim and Passover in some sort of virtual fashion. It's easy to start to feel down about the situation we're in. By the time you read these words, we will have been conducting online services for just about a year or so. It has been a year since we had a full service in the sanctuary. It's been a year since we have been together, to see each other's smiles, to catch up over fruit and dessert during oneg, to hear us sing together during services. It has been a year since we felt safe in our own community, a year since we hugged our loved ones. It's been a year since I could get through an entire Shabbat service without saying to someone or myself, "you're muted." It makes sense that we would want to spend time dreaming about our vaccinated future, picturing what our lives will look like after this pandemic is largely over.

We are so grateful that we have our community, that we can feel a little bit of togetherness, even if it's not the same as being together in person. And I am grateful for the Jewish calendar, that has not only helped me to mark time during this sometimes timeless year, but also helps me find hope. These two big holidays coming up, Purim and Passover, have a lot in common. First, the old joke about Jewish holidays proves true with these two: they tried to kill us (or enslave us), we survived, let's eat. Both of these holidays focus on the themes of liberation, of finding our authentic selves, of standing up for ourselves and our community, of fighting oppression, and wherever we can in the world, banishing hate in favor of loving one's neighbor. But I think the most important message that comes from both of these very different holidays: with every fiber of our being, **we must be hopeful.**

Within the Purim story, one major protagonists (the one who has the book named after her), Esther, ends up revealing her hidden Jewish identity to her husband, King Ahashverosh, in order to save the Jewish people of Shushan from the hands of the evil Haman, their would-be killer. When Haman is identified as having plotted to kill the Jews, King Ahashverosh has him killed, and the people of Shushan are saved. Our people faced destruction, we faced violence and pain, yet we hung on to hope, we survived, and for that we should rejoice.

And we are likely familiar with the Passover story as well. Our people were enslaved for over 400 years - that is a long time! But hope sustained us. There is a great story in our tradition that discusses what actually happened during the Exodus. The Israelites approach the sea as it parts before them, giant walls of water suspended in the air as the start to make their way across from slavery to freedom. According to this story, two people, Reuven and Shimon, hurried along among the crowd crossing through the sea. But they never once looked up at the miracle happening around them. They noticed only that the ground beneath their feet was still a little muddy – like the edge of a lake.

“This is terrible!” said Reuven. “There’s mud all over the place.”

“Disgusting! said Shimon. “I’m in muck up to my ankles.”

“You know what?” replied Reuben. “When we were slaves in Egypt, we had to make our bricks out of mud, just like this! At least we got to eat! I’m hungry!”

“Yeah,” said Shimon. “There’s no difference between being a slave in Egypt and being free here. It’s all muddy and gross!”

And so it went, Reuven and Shimon whining and complaining all the way across the bottom of the sea. For them there was no miracle, only mud. Their eyes were as if closed. Here they were at the biggest and most hopeful moment in their lives - I mean come on, the sea split in front of them! But we learn that even though they walked right through the miracle, they might as well have been asleep.

Our tradition implores us to wake up and open our eyes to the myriad beautiful, mysterious, wonderful, funny, and holy things happening all around us every day. Yes, it has been a tremendously difficult year with immeasurable pain, illness, and isolation. But if we spend all of our time looking only at the mud, we will lose sight of the miracle in which we dwell. Hope.

Nothing has filled me with more hope than seeing the many pictures of our front-line congregants getting their vaccines. This dark time in our country and our world is slowly coming to a close, there is an end in sight. Let us remember that. And in the meanwhile, we still have a lot for which to be grateful. Many of them are like little miracles: when we wake up and see the morning light, when we taste food and are nourished, when we learn from others and grow wise, when we hear our kids say hilarious things and hug them tighter, when we see each other on Zoom or Facebook and find new ways to connect.

So let us keep on dreaming during this Purim and Passover season. We will tell the stories and enact the traditions, even if once more, we are observing them differently than we want. And as we get ready to cross the sea with our brothers and sisters, even while we know there is mud beneath our feet, if we look up, we will find ourselves surrounded by the miracle of life. All we have to do is look. And as we say at the end of our Passover seders, Next Year in Jerusalem.

Marking One Year with Models of Resiliency

Dear Friends,

During one of our TBS staff meetings in mid-December, we looked ahead to start planning Purim and Passover. During our meeting we reflected that last year we had a full house in our sanctuary for our superhero Purim Spiel, before shifting to virtual programming by the end of the week. Last year, Passover was our first virtual celebration. That reflection was nothing short of surreal - especially because it means we've reached a sobering marker during this pandemic: one full calendar year.

One full year of virtual Jewish holidays, birthdays, anniversaries, and secular holidays. None of us expected the pandemic and our isolation to last this long, yet here we are. And between all of the loss we have each personally experienced, as well as the events on the national stage, we know for sure there is no going back to normal. We have, individually and collectively, experienced fundamental shifts in our lives, and nothing will truly ever be the same.

As we look ahead to 2021 - hopefully a year that brings hope and positive change, especially as COVID-19 vaccines are being distributed around the country and the world - the women in our spring holidays, Purim and Passover, can also serve as models for resilience and hope.

Queen Esther, our Purim story heroine, is a model for resilience. When she learns about Haman's plot to annihilate the Jews, she could have proclaimed defeat, or let Mordechai execute a plan. Instead, she comes up with her own strategy, including risking her own life by appearing before King Ahashverus unannounced. And Esther plans not one, but two banquets for King Ahashverus and Mordechai - perhaps to create even greater favor with the King, and false security with Haman.

Esther reminds us that resiliency takes mindfulness and planning. We can survive and adapt when unexpected things occur, but the more we are prepared, the better we can meet the challenges of surviving in the pandemic. What are the silver linings from 2020 we can continue to integrate, and what isn't working? Perhaps we can plan restful self care and quality time with our family; maybe we can carve out time to stay offline and disconnect from social media and the news. And if you need to plan a banquet for yourself - go for it!

As we look towards Passover, the story of our freedom from Egypt begins with two women: midwives Shifra and Puah, who are commanded by Pharaoh to kill all Hebrew baby boys. These extraordinary women - who could have been Egyptian - not only defy Pharaoh, but lie to his face! Shifra and Puah tell Pharaoh the Hebrew women are "vigorous," and give birth before the midwives can arrive. It is because of their defiance that Moses is born.

However, some vague details in the story might actually amplify their heroism. Rabbi Dr. Tamara Eskenazi in *The Women's Commentary* speculates: *were Shifra and Puah the single two midwives for all Israelite women? If not, were they leaders representing all midwives, or were they the only two women who chose to defy Pharaoh?*

Each scenario might change how we read the story, but one thing is clear: regardless of their status or identities, Shifra and Puah remind us to remain diligent, stay focused on justice, and speak truth to power. While Queen Esther encourages us to look inward, the midwives charge us to stay connected with the outside world and help build a “new normal” that is more equitable for everyone.

Finally, I have thought of Miriam often this year, who packs a timbrel while she and her fellow Israelites scramble to escape Egypt in the cover of night. Our tradition asks, why would Miriam pack a nonessential item during their escape? Miriam, a prophetess, knew that hope was just around the corner - after the long night, dawn would break and her people would be free.

As we gather soon together for our second virtual Passover Seder, may we stay resilient, focused on ourselves and our communities, and hopeful and optimistic for the future. I hope and pray that our time for timbrels and dancing is near, and that soon we will see each other in our sanctuary again - and it will be a time of dancing, and rejoicing, and embracing.

Charting A Path Forward, Together

We close the month of January with the Torah portion *Beshalach*. At this point in the Book of Exodus, the plagues have taken their toll, and the Israelites have been released from Egypt. As Moses leads them into the desert, we know that danger lies ahead. One such battle, towards the end of *Beshalach*, involves Israel's perpetual enemy Amalek. In Exodus 17:10-12, we read:

Moses, Aaron, and Hur went up to the top of the hill. Then, whenever Moses held up his hand, Israel prevailed; but whenever he let his guard down, Amalek prevailed. But Moses's hands grew heavy; so they took a stone and put it under him and he sat on it, while Aaron and Hur, one on each side, supported his hands; thus his hands remained steady until the sun set.

When I read this, the message that is loud and clear to me is that **people need each other**. We cannot do it alone. We need each other's care, support, love, guidance, wisdom, and concern. I can't think of a more meaningful takeaway for what we as a society have experienced over the past year. Speaking personally, in my role as Executive Director for the past nine months, I am fortunate to have been supported by leadership who have set me up for success. It is next to impossible to do this job without great presidents, lay leaders, and thought partners. As a TBS community, despite "Zoom fatigue," you have shown up every day for TBS Connect programming, Shabbat, and holidays.

We do what we do **because of you**. But for your love and support of our ideals of Joyful, Personal, and Accessible, our great community exists. At some point over this Spring/Summer, TBS's COVID-19 Task Force will consider how we can safely and gradually resume in the building activities. I don't think any of us quite know what that looks like at this point. But, regardless of how different being back in the building might feel compared to how all of us interacted with TBS in our own, unique ways pre-COVID, we'll have to collectively figure out what comes next. Do you have a great programming or fundraising idea? Are you able to volunteer more or help grow the Temple's social action efforts? Our phones and emails are open to your ideas!

We've gone through COVID together, and that is the same way in which we'll navigate our post-COVID world. Thank you for your support and passion for TBS!

Melissa's House – redecorates and remodels common living areas where people with mental health illness congregate to provide a warm, comfortable, therapeutic environment; **Local Matters** – works to create healthy communities through food education, access and advocacy, to increase food security and decrease the consequence of diet-related disease; **Pyramid Community Development Corporation** provides comprehensive training programs that teach and prepare those living in poverty with employable skills in IT, telecommunications and micro-business; **Moms2B** – a community based comprehensive pregnancy program designed to improve the health status of pregnant women and their newborn babies in low income high risk communities.
