Richmond Council has an Opportunity to Tour the Mercy-class Hospital Ship, USNS Comfort (T-AH-20) at pier side on Friday, December 12, 2025



Richmond Navy Members and guests are invited, and encouraged, to join us on a unique educational experience.

The USNS Comfort (T-AH 20) is a 1,000-bed, 894-foot-long hospital ship of the U.S. Military Sealift Command (MSC), providing advanced medical care and humanitarian support for military operations, disaster relief, and global partnerships. Commissioned in 1986, it serves as a mobile, acute care facility, equipped with 12 operating rooms, digital radiology, a medical lab, a pharmacy, and a helicopter deck. USNS Comfort has been deployed for humanitarian missions like the Continuing Promise initiative in Central and South America and provided critical medical aid during crises such as the Hurricane Katrina disaster and the COVID-19 pandemic. In 2013 USNS Comfort was assigned to the Norfolk Naval Station to be close to Portsmouth Naval Hospital where some of its medical staff are based.

Are You Skating on thin ice?

Is the value of our faith determined more by the sincerity with which we believe or by the worthiness of the One in whom we believe?

Consider this example. Tom went to skate on a frozen pond. He was fully confident that the ice would hold his weight, and so he skated out toward the middle with great abandon. But the ice was thin, and Tom fell through. Tina also went skating on a frozen pond. She wasn't at all sure that the ice would hold her weight, and so she edged toward the middle with great caution. But the ice was thick, and Tina was secure.

Whose faith was of greater value: Tom's sincere faith in thin ice, or Tina's tentative faith in thick ice? Tina's, of course.

Hebrews 11:1 defines faith as the assurance of what is hoped for and the evidence of things not seen. It is a confident belief in God's promises, which provides a firm foundation for what is currently unseen, or intangible, and is central to understanding the nature of genuine, confident, and purposeful faith.

It seems so obvious, and yet so many people persist in the myth that it doesn't matter what we believe, so long as we believe sincerely. Tom's sincere faith only got him wet and cold because the object of his faith was not worthy of his trust.

Any faith in God, the One Who is perfectly reliable, is of great value. It holds. For He is surer than the thickest ice! We trust not in the sincerity of our faith, but in the reliability of our God.

So, let's go skating!



The Honor Flight is conducted by non-profit organizations dedicated to transporting as many United States military Veterans as possible to see the memorial of the respective war they fought in Washington, D.C., at no cost to the Veterans. The mission of the Honor Flight Network is one of gratitude. For their sacrifice, and selflessness.

After arriving by 0630 hrs. on 18 October 2025, Veterans, guardians, and support staffers enjoyed a buffet breakfast at American Legion Post 175 in Mechanicsville, VA., with greetings by The Virginians Barbershop Chorus, Congressman Rob Wittman, Hanover County Police Color Guard, Veteran Motor Cyclists, and Fire Stations. Afterwards, the four bus convoys on I-95 rallied at the Dale City rest stop to onboard the 100-year-old WWII Veteran of the Battle of the Bulge. While heading north, box lunches were enjoyed by the passengers.

In DC, the convoy visited the Air Force, Korean Veterans', WWII, Vietnam, and Women's memorials before arriving at Arlington National Cemetery for changing of the guard and wreath laying ceremonies at the tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

Veterans' needs and wishes were met by guardians and support staff. Conversations included memories and experience sharing. At each stop, Veterans received profound tributes for their service.

The gourmet, banquet-style dinner in Fredericksburg at The Knights of Pythias Lodge #22 capped off the beautiful day. Engaging flight captains and group sing-alongs elevated spirits. We arrived safely and on schedule at 2130 hrs. with an enduring sense of pride for serving our country.

U.S. Navy 250th Anniversary Ceremony Celebrating the Founding of the United States Navy At the Virginia War Memorial



On October 13, 2025, our Nation celebrated the 250th Anniversary of The United States Navy. Virginia's celebratory event was held at The Virginia War Memorial and was attended by many, including nine members of The Richmond Council Navy League.

After the Call to Assemble, an actor, Bryan Austin, portraying John Paul Jones, Father of the U.S. Navy, opened the event by reciting a poem, "Come Sail With Me". Next, all stood for the singing of our National Anthem and the Pledge of Allegiance.

The reading of The Continental Army Proclamation, establishing The U.S. Navy was done by RADM Frank F. Rennie, IV, USN (Ret) Frank Rennie. Speakers included Virginia's Speaker of the House of Delegates, Don Scott; Captain Joyce Reed, USN (Ret.) and Virginia's Governor, Glenn Youngkin.

Council Board Members, Billy Butler and Pat Robson were honored to participate in The Sacred Honor of the Passing of the Torch. This is a ceremonial process indicating that those who had previously served are passing the responsibility for future service to today's youth. A Challenge coin, recognizing 250 years of the U.S. Armed Forces, was passed to cadets from James River High School NJROTC symbolizing the Torch's passing.

In closing, the actor betraying John Paul Jones, recited a poem, "Sea Fever" and Taps were played to salute the fallen. All sang "Anchors Aweigh" and were invited for refreshments provided by The Virginia War Memorial.

It was hard not to have a feeling of great pride and appreciation for our country and The United States Navy when one left this ceremony.

November 28, 2025 The 250th Birthday of the U.S. Navy Chaplain Corps

"In God we trust" is the official motto of the United States and its first usage printed in English dates to 1748 in the Pennsylvania Gazette. Our Founding Fathers readily acknowledged God as our Creator and our foundation. Shortly after our Continental Navy was established in 1775, the Navy Chaplain Corps was formed on 28 November 1775.

Navy Chaplains are commissioned officers assigned to serve the Navy, the Marine Corps, the Coast Guard, and the Merchant Marine service members and their families. They are non-combatants and are not permitted to carry weapons. They can be Protestant, Catholic, Orthodox, Jewish, Buddhist, or Muslim in their own faith, but they must respect and serve members of all faiths.

A Chaplain must be at least 21 years old, hold both bachelor's and master's degrees, and have specific training in theology and religious studies. The bulk of their training is done at the Navy Chaplaincy School and Center at Naval Station, Newport, RI.

A Navy Chaplain's mission is to provide religious ministry and support for service members and their families of all faiths and to guide the command on freedom of religion. They promote moral and ethical behavior within the sea services, which can be a big challenge in liberty ports after weeks at sea. Chaplains understand that spiritual readiness is a vital part of operational readiness.

A Navy Chaplain must balance the roles of friend and officer. They must be available and sensitive to the spiritual and emotional needs of all service members, while promoting strength instead of emotional over-dependence. In recent decades, as mental wellness has become a major command factor, this delicate balance has become vital.

Our faith in God is our source of comfort and strength. To keep faith on the forefront, understandable, accessible, and in context require a uniquely special skill set. The U.S. Navy needs its Chaplains.

The Richmond Navy League gratefully acknowledges their value. God bless our Nation; God bless our Navy; and God bless and guide our Chaplains.

On October 22, 2025, 54 Richmond Council Navy League members and guests met at The Willow Oaks Country Club for Council's annual Sea Services Luncheon. This event was extra special as we celebrated the U.S. Navy and the Marines' 250th anniversary this month.

During the social hour, attendees were treated to coffee and beautiful music provided by Mechanicsville High School's String Quintet. After the call to order, the Presentation of Colors was provided by Highland Springs High School's MCJROTC Color Guard.

Council's Chaplin, John Harler M.D. opened with the invocation followed by Dr. James Dageforde explaining the Missing Man Table.

The Sea Services Cake was cut by our guest speaker, GySgt Atger, USMC (Ret.) and CDR Amy Thomas, CO Navy Reserve Richmond, VA.

After lunch, Council President Vaughan Dize introduced our guest speaker Gunnery Sergeant Jerome E. Atger. The subject he spoke was on the "Relationship Between the Marine Corps and the U.S. Navy." He started by sharing information about his family.

His father was French, and his mother was Mexican. The French term his father used for navy was "Marine National" and the Mexican term for navy his mother used was "Secretaria De Marinia". After finding out he was not ready for college he decided to join the Navy. He went down to the recruiting station to sign up. Remembering his fathers and mothers' terms for the navy, he saw the Marine Recruiting station thinking he was joining the Navy. He enlisted and got the shock of his life when he arrived at Parris Island!

Throughout his career, GySgt Atger had numerous interactions with the Navy. When his father died, it was a Navy Chaplain who helped him deal with the sad ordeal. When he caught pneumonia, a Navy Corpsman provided him with Motrin, telling him it would cure all. Later in his service, he was sent on a humanitarian mission in Peru. It was in Peru that Atger worked closely with his Navy commanding officer and came to fully understand and appreciate the important connection between the Navy and the Marine Corps.

GySgt Atger retired from the Marine Corps in August 2024 and in August 2025 he joined James River High School as Naval Instructor in their NJROTC Program where he serves today.

This in-port period, the crew of **USCGC** *Northland* continued working to prepare the vessel for future deployment.




