
AT FEATHER LAKE

Storms in August, September and October kept Feather Lake's water level consistently over 1 foot deep. But we've seen no rain since mid-October, and the lake level has dropped steadily. At this writing in late November, there is a nice mix of open water and very shallow water interspersed with mudflats. Good numbers of ducks, wading birds and shorebirds are all taking advantage of these conditions. Whether or not the conditions last will depend on whether or not we get some timely rain.

Feather Lake will be open to the public through at least December 18. Hours are 8 a.m. to noon on Saturdays and 2 p.m. to dusk on Sundays. We'll be closed for the Christmas and New Year's weekends. Our schedule for January will depend on water conditions.

As always, we rely on volunteers to staff our sanctuary during visitor hours. Can you help on one or more days in January or February? If yes, please contact John Sproul (747-8663, jsproul@utep.edu).

Our first 2006 workday at Feather Lake will be Sat., January 28. Once again, we'll start at 2 p.m., work a few hours, then see what birds arrive at the end of the day. Feather Lake is located at 9500 North Loop at Bordeaux, 0.3 miles west of Americas Ave. Admission is free.

UTEP offers free walking tours twice each month and also holds monthly (except December) community workdays at Rio Bosque Wetlands





WANTED: Keystone Site-'New'



Bird Species Sightings REWARD: \$15/ first sighting!

With the Keystone site's bird checklist now at 189 species, I wanted to try to add an incentive to get some more birders to go out and help add some new species to the list!

For each new species that is observed by someone else, for the list to reach the 200 species level, I will donate \$15 in cash &/or birding equipment (they don't have any optics or field guides for visitors/volunteer use) to Keystone Heritage Park, Inc. [KHP]. 'Proof of Sightings' can be discussed with me, on a case by case basis.

The bird's listed below are some of the more likely species that <u>may</u> be found at the site, but there are other less likely or more difficult to identify species, as well (review the site's checklist on the KHP or EP/T-P Audubon websites, to determine which additional species have not been seen at the site).

Hopefully this 'incentive' to help the Keystone group, will spur you to visit Keystone more frequently and help to 'build-up' the bird checklist!

DESERT BIRDS / BIRDS OF PREY Date: Saturday December 3rd

Chance to see some of the birds that inhabit the desert scrub, Cactus Wren, Pyrrhuloxia, Scaled Quail and Curve-billed thrasher to name a few. Then out along Hawk Alley for Red-tailed Hawk, American Kestrel. Sometimes there is a Prairie Falcon or Golden Eagle sitting on the poles.

CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT

The El Paso Audubon Chapter calls upon volunteers in the El Paso area to join with birders across the western hemisphere and participate in one of Audubon's winter time traditions, the annual Christmas Bird Count (CBC). This years count will be the 106th.

Last year over 56,000 volunteers from all 50 states, every Canadian province, parts of Central and South America, Bermuda, the West Indies, and Pacific Islands count and record every individual bird and bird species seen in a given area. During the 105th CBC last year, about 69 million individual birds were counted. Last year saw a new record high of 2022 individual counts. Each individual count group completes a census of the birds found during one 24 hour period in a designated circle 15 miles in diameter-about 177 square miles.

People are asked to contribute \$5.00 to help defray the expense of publishing "American Birds", This is the volume detailing all 2000 plus counts. The El Paso/Trans Pecos Audubon Chapter will cover \$3.00 of this for the Hueco Tanks and El Paso counts.





The first count in this area will be conducted in and around Hueco Tanks State Historic Site. Lets see if we can get over 65 species this year, a number that has been achieved only a couple of times since 1970. To accomplished this I will need at least 8 counters, *Please call and volunteer.* We can accomplish this, during the Nov. BIT during a period of 3 hours and only in the park we had 31 species, uncommon were *Stellar's Jay Western Scrub Jay, and Sage Thrasher.*

Date: Sat/Sun, January 21/22


One of the more popular National Wildlife Refuges in the country (there are over 500) is located about 180 miles north of El paso off of Interstate 25. How about 20,000 Snow Geese 12,000 Sandhill Cranes, thousands of ducks and Bald Eagles.


Start off your 2006 bird list with some great entrys. Last year 74 species were recorded on our trip, these included 15 waterfowl species, 6 Raptor and 3 grebe, also a number of passerines. The Refuge reported 11Bald Eagles, and we saw about 6 at one time in one water cell.
