WW 2 Trivia June through July 2025


Inspired by Ozzie's earlier trivia reports Do you remember or have you read about these events?

- End of the Battle of Okinawa: The battle concluded on June 22nd, with the US occupying the island.
- **Operation Downfall:** President Truman approved the planned invasion of Japan, known as Operation Downfall.
- **Capture of Manila:** US forces captured Manila from the Japanese Imperial Army. Dewey Blvd (now Roxas) runs along Manila Bay. US Embassy is to left, closer to the bay. The rubble was cleared to right of the boulevard and a park established.




- A large percentage of Manila, formerly called the "Pearl of the Orient" was in ruin. The famous Manila Hotel, where Douglas McArthur's family lived prior to the outbreak of WW2 was also heavily damaged. Manila Bay was still littered with destroyed landing craft in 1952-53. [Ed.: Our newly built house was in a compound next to bombed-out apartment buildings, yet we enjoyed our view across the bay to Corregidor, with beautiful sunsets every night. - WWII Casualties and Prisoners: The New York Times reported on June 21st that 87,343 Japanese were killed and 2,565 were captured on Okinawa.
- Strategic Withdrawals: In early 1945 the Japanese began to remove distant garrisons in the South-West Pacific to reduce the defense perimeter to the Celebes, Borneo, Java, Sumatra and hold it for as long as possible, with Indo-China and Malaya in the center of the defensive zone. Sho (Akiraka) was the withdrawal of troops from the Andaman and Nicobar islands to Singapore, Chi was the transfer of troops from Singapore to Indo-China, Transportation No. 10 was the transfer of the <u>48th Division</u> from Timor and Ho was an evacuation of troops from Borneo and Surabaya that was not undertaken. - On 8 May 1945, the Allies celebrated VE Day, marking the end of the war in Europe. But the war in the east still raged on and Japanese surrender seemed a long way off.
- War against Japan, 1945: In South East Asia, by late 1944, British and Commonwealth, US and Chinese forces had begun the reconquest of Burma (Myanmar). The main attack was carried out by the Fourteenth Army, comprising 340,000 Indian troops, 100,000 British and 80,000 African soldiers, which defeated the Japanese defending forces in central Burma. The capital Rangoon was retaken in May 1945.
