There will be birding in the Mexican thorn forest in the E1 Fuerte area and a cruise to Farallon Rock where arctic migrants and marine species may be seen.

BIRD SIGHTINGS

- 10/1 3 snowy egrets, 8 greater yellowlegs, 1 lesser yellowlegs. (Observer: Bill Hunt in the Lower Valley)
- 10/7 Swan species, 25 wigeon, 4 gadwalls, 2 eared grebes, 1 merlin, 2 yellow warblers, 1 Wilson's warbler. (Observers: Geth and Ed White in the vicinity of new man-made lake in new building development in the Upper Valley)
- 10/8 Migrating flock of common flickers and mockingbirds (Observer: Caroline McClintock on Federal Street)
- 10/11 1 golden eagle flying over Cement Lake toward Mexican border (Observer: Charlie Jensen) Geth White observed 7 golden eagles in the fall of 1969 during the last half of October and the month of November following this same route. A definite wind current seems to be used over the mountains toward Cristo Rey.
- 10/13 Prairie falcon (Observer: Jim Mc Culloch at Hueco Tanks)
- 10/16 1 juvenile Mississippi kite (Observers: Ruby Allen and Sarah Dodds in very good light with all field marks carefully observed for a very late occurrence of this species which is known to nest at Camp Pioneer.)
- 10/21 Phainopepla in the yard of the Clarence Shelfers on post at Fort Bliss.
- 10/23 Male and female Anna's hummingbird at feeders in garden of Luis and Sue Santaella; has been present for about three weeks in Mountain Park.

 Observed in good light for a half hour by Geth and Ed White. Also seen were a female summer tanager, 4 lesser goldfinches.
- 10/27 Field trip to Hueco Tanks State Park. (Observers: Ed White, Louise and Weldon Yerby, Mrs. Barnhart, Berttye Barnhart, Al Gavit.) Notable species seen were American bittern (for a first record in several years) which was also seen the following day by Sue Santaella, black phoebe, yellowbellied sapsucker, flocks of horned larks, brown towhee, three female American redstarts.
- 10/28 Pine siskins (Observers: Carl and Linda Jones in Coronado)


