District Court. The cases of Francisco Cassanova vs. Alfred Mussey, G. W. Runner vs. Miller Hendricks et. als., Herman Wagenfuhr vs. Julia C. Leigh, executrix, O. Terrill vs. D. A. Harris, J. H. Coker vs. Anton Lorantz, were continued by consent.

Military Orders. HEADQUARTERS DEPT. OF TEXAS, SAN ANTONIO, Feb. 13, 1882. Special Orders No. 15.

The below enumerated recruits, enlisted by the recruiting officer at Fort Clark, Texas, are assigned as follows: John Kennedy, to troop G, 8th cavalry. John M. Morrice, to troop G, 8th cavalry. Frank Frasure, to troop D, 8th cavalry. Joseph Hill, to company C, 22d infantry.

The post quartermaster Fort Clark, Texas, will forward to San Antonio depot, Texas, certain articles of public property, for which Major F. S. Dodge, paymaster U. S. army, is responsible.

The verbal order of January 12, 1882, directing Captain G. B. Russell, 9th infantry, aide-de-camp, and department inspector, to proceed from Fort McIntosh to San Diego, Texas, and return to the former point, on public business, is confirmed.

So much of the unexecuted portion of the sentence, as relates to confinement, in the case of Private John Smith, troop II, 8th cavalry, promulgated in general court martial orders No. 37, series of 1881, from these headquarters, is remitted.

Conformably to the requirements of paragraph 2386, army regulations, Second Lieutenant F. H. French, 19th infantry, is announced, from the 1st to the 31st of January, 1882, inclusive, as on duty requiring him to be mounted.

Recruit Andrew Gallagher, enlisted by the recruiting officer at San Antonio, Texas, is assigned to company I, 16th infantry.

The quartermaster's department will furnish transportation, by rail, from San Antonio to Uvalde, Texas, for Private E. C. Inlay, signal corps, U. S. army.
