

March 15, 2020 Third Sunday of lent Jn 4:5-42

Dear St Pius X and St Anthony Church,

'Give me a drink', Jesus asks. Sounds like something we might hear at the water cooler at work, or at the Gulch after work! But no, it is Jesus speaking to the Samaritan woman at Jacob's well. What is most striking to me about this exchange is that Jesus' question sounds 'desperate'! I think it strikes the Samaritan woman that way too! So, she asks in a surprised tone, 'What?' or specifically in verse 9, "How can you, a Jew, ask me, a Samaritan woman, for a drink?" It is unlikely for sure, because Jesus is revealing his vulnerability to her by 1) asking a woman in public for help, 2) asking a Samaritan-enemy and 3) without even having a cup-mug himself? But this is Jesus, who is the master of compassion and understanding. Jesus is comfortable with his perceived helplessness by her. I wonder if He is intentionally approaching her through such neediness, so she can lower her hostile defensiveness and find in Jesus the forgiveness and peace she has been seeking in all the wrong places. Jesus could say, 'Yes, I know it is a risk asking you for help, but I am really offering you so much more than you imagine." She has been trying to find fulfillment in relationships to men (six times now) that have not worked out. She is looking for something in others that can only be found and in God and within herself. She has been spending her life dipping into what seemed satisfying, only to come up empty and still seeking more and more. She has been going back to the same old well of 'pleasure, status and convenience', looking for love to fill her soul. But always coming up short or empty. Now Jesus invites her to quench that thirst through new life in Him and fulfillment and forgiveness of the past. Jesus appears desperate Himself to appeal to her 'desperation'. Her desperation is shown in the odd time of day that she is at the well. Customarily, the village women would draw their fresh daily water, the first thing in the morning. But by her coming so late at noon, it indicates that she is either avoiding the others or has been pushed away by them (Were her men their exes?). So Jesus knows the unsettled & troubled waters of her heart, and he approaches her as a fellow vulnerable person to draw her into conversation. And what happens? Like with baptism, she is reborn to a new way of living. No longer to live for her own satisfactions serving only herself, with Christ she will live fully-filled to serve God! And she goes right to it, sharing Jesus with others. As John 4:39 proves, this woman becomes a great missionary for Jesus. It says, "Many of the Samaritans of that town began to believe in him because of the word of the woman who testified, "He told me everything I have done." She is saying, "Jesus knows my heart, my brokenness and he loves me through it, healing me, and making me whole again." And how did this whole life change start but by Jesus simply asking for a little drink of water from her? This Lent, what has Jesus asked from us?

Little do we know how God can use such small things to start great beginnings? As famous chefs tell us about wonderful spices, 'a little bit goes a long way'. Even just the small talk and touch of Jesus can upend our lives and usher us into new worlds of good. Through this prayer-dialogue with the Samaritan woman, Jesus ends up giving her the 'living water' of Himself that became within her an internal font of life-satisfaction. In John 4:14, Jesus says, "Whoever drinks the water I shall give will never thirst; the water I shall give will become in him a spring of water welling up to eternal life." He repeats that in John 7:38, when He says, "Whoever believes in me, as scripture says: 'Rivers of living water will flow from within him". So this Lent, Jesus asks us 'Give me a drink of water?' God is asking us, "What do you really need in life?" Our practices of prayer, fasting and almsgiving attempt to have us evaluate what we really need. Prayer helps us review how we occupy our time. Fasting reveals what we are dependent upon or addicted to. Almsgiving teaches us who we think the most of and how we spend our resources. All of these make us explore our hearts, exposing what we think are our needs. God always reveals that we in fact, need less than we think we do. Before Jesus speaks to us, He has read our hearts. Luke 9:47 says that Jesus 'realized the intention of their hearts' and Romans 8:27 tells about God who is the "one who searches hearts and knows". So what Jesus asks of us, reaches deep within us to forgive, heal and truly satisfy longings. It is not just the woman at the well who needs such fulfillment. The apostles need it too. Jesus challenges them to review their own needs, when he says to them in John 4:32 ""I have food to eat of which you do not know." Maybe because they are not open enough with Him to receive it yet? The apostles know about food that satisfies the stomach but not yet their souls. Jesus describes this 'soul food' in verse 34 when he says, "My food is to do the will of the one who sent me and to finish his work." And we need asking too! What does Jesus ask us to give Him this Lent?

A Bible Study of Matthew: On Thursdays from 6:00-7:00 pm at St Pius Hall, we will be reviewing the unique and interesting emphases found in the Gospel of Matthew. Six sessions will examine the relation of Matthew to the Old Testament, to the other three gospels and in seeing Jesus as a New Moses, Elijah and David!

******Updated Pandemic Flu Policy:

Depending on changing circumstances with the Coronavirus outbreak, the church does have a stage by stage policy of safeguarding actions to implement. An outline copy of the severe Stage 4-5 steps can be found on the bulletin boards. At the current precautionary stage, before any specific changes are made to our weekly worship, we simply make a basic request for prudent actions on behalf of everyone.

Most simply, 1) if any one feels sick (sore throat, runny nose, cough or fever), then s/he should stay home to avoid possible contamination to others. 2) Frequent hand washing and/or use of alcohol-based hand gels should be done. 3) Smiles, greetings and kind words will replace hugs or handshakes by ushers and at the sign of peace. Also, simple bows or openhand waves are friendly recognitions of our neighbors. 4) The offering of the chalice to the congregation will be suspended, and its offering will be re-evaluated at a later time. 5) Greater attention will be given to cleaning and regularly replacing water in any holy water fonts, and wiping down hymnals, pews and door rails/knobs.
