The SIA works cooperatively with residents, visitors, Upper Township and other Officials as well as other community organizations to achieve shared goals and focuses our efforts on advocacy and projects that improve our quality of life and protect our beaches and wildlife. Examples include beach plum planting on the dunes, beautification of beach entrances, posting educational information on dark skies and other environmental topics on our website. In honor of our 70th anniversary in 2021, Linda Bateman, then President of the SIA, Deb Rivel and others worked with the NJ Department of Environmental Protection to design two signs at the entrance to the State Park that describe endangered and protected wildlife and the role Strathmere plays in the Atlantic Flyway, an aerial route used by millions of migratory birds. The SIA supports the Strathmere Piping Plover Project led by Deb Rivel. This Project consists of a group of volunteers who help protect the plovers and other endangered and protected beach-nesting birds and educates the public about the importance of this effort and how they can help.

In the past, we have worked with UT and County Officials and advocated for the management of development to maintain the character and uniqueness of Strathmere, played a key role in securing the pedestrian/recreational lane on Commonwealth Avenue and supported neighborhood advocacy groups on various issues.

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About Strathmere

- Strathmere was founded in 1881 and was initially called Corson's Inlet.
- It was named for the settlers John and Peter Corson, who had sailed across the inlet between Ocean City and Strathmere. In 1881 the West Jersey Railroad only ran from Camden to Cape May. In 1884 they built a line up the coast through Corson's Inlet to Ocean City. It is said that many of the men who built the railroad line stayed at the Whelen Inn now known as the Deauville.
- The name of the town was changed to Strathmere around 1912.
- The very tip of the island and the bay is still known as Corson's Inlet.
- Strathmere is only 1-1/2 miles long and just 2 blocks wide.
- Today Strathmere has approximately 390 family homes.



Protecting our Enviornment

Strathmere is a haven for wildlife. Our village lies directly under the Atlantic Flyway - an ancient aerial highway traveled by millions of migrating birds every year. Our State Park Natural Area and surrounding marshes are host to twelve endangered and threatened species of birds -- at least three of which nest here every season.

Our springs and summers are filled with birdsong and the beauty of all sorts of wildlife - including porpoise, whales, horseshoe crabs and Diamond-backed Terrapins which nest in our dunes. In fall, we have thousands of shorebirds who use our beaches to fatten up for their arduous migration south, and hundreds of thousands of other songbirds migrate through, often stopping to rest and refuel. Butterflies feed from flowers on our native plants. In winter, seals rest on our beaches and ducks are easily seen in the bay and ocean. We are proud of our open spaces and the wildlife who call our end of the island home.

Our dunes are the best defense we have from flooding and high tides. They also are where Diamond-backed Terrapins lay their eggs. Help us keep our properties safe and our nesting birds and terrapins secure by staying off the dunes, out of designated shorebird nesting areas and keeping your dogs on a leash.

Black Skimmers-once common at the North End are now an Endangered and Special Concern Species

American Oystercatchers nest on our beaches every year but they are a declining shorebird and are an Endangered and Special Concern Species
