→ From the Pastor →

7 For the Lord your God is bringing you into a good land, a land with flowing streams, with springs and underground waters welling up in valleys and hills, 8 a land of wheat and barley, of vines and fig trees and pomegranates, a land of olive oil and honey, 9 a land where you may eat bread without scarcity, where you will lack nothing....11 "Take care that you do not forget the Lord your God by failing to keep his commandments, his ordinances, and his statutes that I am commanding you today. 12 When you have eaten your fill and have built fine houses and live in them 13 and when your herds and flocks have multiplied and your silver and gold is multiplied and all that you have is multiplied, 14 then do not exalt yourself, forgetting the Lord your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery, 15 who led you through the great and terrible wilderness, an arid wasteland with poisonous[a] snakes and Scorpions.



These are the words of Moses reminding God's people (Again!) that God is providing for them, even when they do not see it. How did they lose their vision? They relied on themselves and their own perceptions. They questioned Moses, rather strongly. They turned their backs on his leadership. When he went up the mountain to receive the 10 commandments, they built and worshipped a golden calf. They did not follow Moses because they could not see where they were going. They looked back, and saw their slavery only in terms of the provisions they received: they had food and shelter. They forgot how badly they were treated by their masters. They only saw what they wanted to see.

We are not unlike them. While we are still and always will be God's people, we too tend to rely on our own vision. We see what we want to see and ignore the rest. Or, we twist the rest so it fits into our vision. We have been led by God as surely as the Israelites were. We are where we are supposed to be. It may not fit right; we may be somewhat uncomfortable at the present moment. Maybe we had plans for our lives that haven't worked the way we though they would. Perhaps our children or grandchildren are struggling, and we don't know how to help. Perhaps we ourselves are facing obstacles that are challenging the way we thought our lives would be. We wanted things to be perfect and they aren't.

If this is your circumstance, maybe it's time to refocus. As Moses instructed the Israelites, we cannot forget our guide. We cannot forget His commandments, statutes and ordinances. We cannot forget that as surely as he was leading the Israelites into a land of milk and honey, He will also lead us. Rather than looking at what we see as not being right with our lives, let us be thankful for what we do have. As the Israelites built fine houses, so we also have solid roofs over our head. We do not go hungry. We have enough to share. We have a community of faith for support and encouragement ...to both give and receive. And, in just a short time, we will again being the season of Advent. This is the time leading up to Christmas, where we prepare ourselves to receive the greatest gift ever given to humanity: Jesus, the Christ. This gift of God's most precious Son, dispels any doubts we have about the love of God for us and all creation. It firmly directs us to see God's intervention in our lives, to bring good that triumphs over evil.

We have much to be thankful for, if we" turn our eyes upon Jesus, look full in his glorious face...then the things of life will grow strangely dim...in the light of His glory and grace."

She was proud of her four boys and, as they came along, her grandchildren and great-grandchildren. She loved them all, dearly. She loved and supported her husband, Ken, often working side by side with him in their greenhouse. Her knowledge and love of flora was so detailed.



Bev was a dedicated nurse at Thompson Health for many years. She held an RN degree and in her later years served as charge nurse in the hospital.

As a faithful member of the First Congregational Church of East Bloomfield, she served on many boards of the church. She was the organizer of the rummage sale for several years as well as organizing the pie bake sale for the church at the Bloomfield Bazaar.

Bev loved music. She said singing was what brought her to a church when she was young! She was a long-term member of the choir of the Congregational Church. The church was so blessed by her beautiful alto voice! She also was a member of the Voices of Faith vocal band that formed for a period for the third Sunday service.

Bev also loved books. She had a mini library in her house. She was a member of the Bloomfield Library Book Club as well as the church's book club.

Bev will always be remembered for her willingness to join in the work of the church. She volunteered her time whether it was painting or cleaning the building, singing praises to God, helping with many fundraisers, but most of all for being a great friend to all. We will sorely miss her.

Blue Christmas Service:

Pastor Sue will be conducting a Blue Christmas service Sunday, December 17th at 4 p.m. in the church sanctuary. The intended congregation for this service is people for whom this is not "the most wonderful time of the year." It is for those who grieve, for those who struggle, for those who find themselves alone and/or lonely. This quiet, reflective service will gently and quietly proclaim that the Son of God came to bring light into whatever darkness is

being faced. Please share this service with anyone you know who may be facing these or other issues. All are welcome, even if you just want to sit in peace and quiet.

- Christmas Eve Service: There is a Christmas Eve service, in the sanctuary, on Sunday, December 24th at 7:00 p.m.
- Women's and Men's Breakfast Dates and Times: The [changed] dates & times remain the same for both the men and women's breakfast the women meet on the first Monday of the month at 9:00 a.m. and the men meet on the last Sunday at 7:45 a.m. Both groups will also continue to meet at Brady J's restaurant here in Bloomfield (at 24 Maple Avenue).
- Advent Sermon Series: The pulpit focus this Advent will be a little different. Since the Gospel of Mark, which is the gospel to be read during Year B, contains nothing, not even a single verse, about Jesus' birth, Pastor Sue will do a sermon series focusing on the Psalms appointed for each of these Sundays. She will still be lifting up the traditional Advent words of Hope, Peace, Joy and Love, just from the perspective of the Psalms. Therefore, the first Sunday of Advent (which starts December 3rd) will feature Psalm 80: 1-7,17-19; the second Sunday will feature Psalm 85: 1-2, 8-13; the third Sunday will feature Psalm 126 and the the fourth Sunday of Advent (Christmas Eve) will feature Psalm 89:1-4,19-26. Hope you enjoy this slightly different focus during this season of Advent.
- From the Trustees: The trustees oversaw the work to conduct repairs to the church building foundation. Most of the work was on the outside of the building but there was one room inside where extensive work had to be done due to the foundation crumbling. The church thanks the trustees for taking care of the building and many thanks go to Brian Cameron, the stone mason who did the repair.






imprisoned, Honey realizes she must fight to stay free, or risk being sent away for good.
