ECONOMIC DEVELOPEMENT

Economic Development Facilitator, Mark Peake discussed going to Civic Plus from Go Daddy. Robbin did a lot of research on this and Matt Ury has looked at it and thought it looked good. The cost is \$5,136.00 with a maintenance fee of \$4,342.80 that increases 5% yearly.

It will:

- 1. make the site ADA compliant (hearing and visually impaired)
- 2. will save even deleted content for Freedom of Information compliance
- 3. each department can update their own content without having access to another department's information. (Security can be based on department AND by individual person.)
- 4. This means POSSIBLY that the Chamber and AECC can drop their websites and use a page on the Village website. Also, when they add events to the calendar on their department page, it will appear on the Village website calendar.
- 5. It is searchable within the website.

Motion Trustee Howard, seconded Trustee Blodgett and carried unanimously to approve changing from Go Daddy to Civic Plus for our Website Design and Hosting.

We continue to work with Parks & Trails on their recommendations for the Village of Newark with regards to promoting the use of the canal trail which, hopefully will lead to economic benefits for Village businesses. We ae looking at additional signage, bike racks and other various items to take advantage of their recommendations.

Mark thanked David Johnson and Lisa Butterfield for conducting field counts along the canal today from 3pm to 5pm in the rain. They are volunteering and they weren't ideal conditions to be out in today. This is another step in the Empire State Trail Town process. Hopefully, the conditions will be better for the remaining volunteers.

Mark and Robbin met with a great young man today, who went to Newark High School and graduated from RIT. He is interested in bringing an art gallery and more to the Village of Newark. We are starting the process of finding the right building for him and searching for ways to assist him in his vision for what he wants to bring to our community. He goes back and forth between Newark and Atlanta to run an art gallery there. He is a very engaging individual and I hope we can help him out. It would be great for Newark. Between him and people he knows he feels he could also help bring back the mural next to the Interpretive Center. If that is something the Board would be interested in talking to him about please let me know and we will set something up to discuss it more.

MAYOR

Discussed the possibility of adopting a new policy for the Village regarding applications for utility or construction work in the Village. It is not a requirement for utility or construction workers to give Village notice of work or clean up after they are done. This will make it a requirement and we could impose fee/fine. The City of Geneva has a similar Code in place.
