Every year, suicide is among the top 20 leading causes of death globally for people of all ages. Every day in America on average 129 persons take their own life. Suicide is at a national epidemic level.

How can we offer both HOPE and HELP?

- ❖ Recognize persons who may be in crisis.

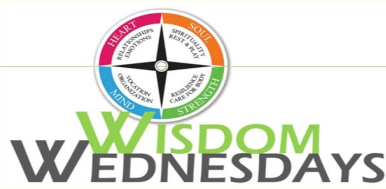

September is National Honey and Organic Harvest Month



The month of September is important for so many reasons! Summer is winding down as fall approaches, green leaves begin to show the first signs of their true colors, and farmers across the country are reaping in their harvests. Both honey production and organic harvests are celebrated nationally in September each year, and though the subjects seem unrelated to each other, farmers know that they go hand-in-hand. Without bees trying to make honey, their harvest yields would be greatly reduced.

Honeybees and other insects visit flowers for nectar and pollen. Many of these pollinators do not make honey as a byproduct. Beneficial flies, moths, wasps, butterflies, and other types of bees visit plants in peak bloom for their individual nutritional needs, but only honeybees return to their hives to make honey for their community. Honey will be their

chief food source during the winter months, and humans have learned to harvest some of this honey for their own enjoyment, while leaving plenty behind for bees to live on until spring the following year. The sweet nectar we have grown to love was first discovered more than 6,000 years ago, and though it has become part of our diet (Americans consume more than 1.5 pounds of honey per capita per year), farmers know it is not the most important product of a honeybee's labors.

Though many crop flowers have both male (stamens) and female (pistils) reproductive parts in the same bloom, there are several important species that have completely separate male and female flowers. Some examples include all squash, melons, cucumbers, and pumpkins which have distinctly male or female flowers on the same vine, and corn which has different male (the tassels at the top of the stalk) or female (each silk strand) flowers on the same plant. Other plants, such as apples, have very complicated reproductive systems. Though each individual flower on an apple tree contain both male and female structures, the stamens in a flower are shedding pollen on one day while the pistil is closed tight, not receiving pollen. Within a different flower, the opposite will be true, where the pistil is open and receptive, but the pollen in that flower has already shed. Without bees and other pollinators visiting many flowers and moving pollen around, we could say goodbye to those wonderful pumpkin and apple pies come autumn.

Farmers and gardeners alike know that without bees going about their 'business' making honey, there could not be a harvest of many of our favorite fruits and vegetables. The next time you see any insect on a flower or enjoy a cup of tea with some honey, remember to give thanks for their hard work in helping feed us. Without them, there would be very little food for us to eat, and farmers would have much less to celebrate!
