

For Reflection:

Have you ever accepted an invitation to go someplace, and once you arrived, wondered what you had gotten yourself into? This could be said for the disciples as they found themselves with Jesus in Gethsemane. Peter, James, John and the other eight (the twelfth disciple, Judas, had left the party) found themselves in Gethsemane. They were probably just looking forward to having a good ol' time celebrating Passover.

Jesus saw his persecutors approaching and said, "Rise! Let us go!" The disciples may have recalled the first time Jesus called out to them. "Come, follow me," he summoned, as they were minding their own business and working their day jobs (Mk 1:17). Now, here, caught up in the ominous events of this momentous evening, more than one of the disciples may have thought, "What does he mean by 'us'?"

As we continue deeper into this season of Lent, Jesus is calling you to "rise" and "go"? Are you coming along?

Today's Scripture:

Rise! Let us go! Here comes my betrayer!

Question to Ponder:

Look with your physical eyes and intelligent mind for the activity of God. Understand in your heart that dependence on God is the reality, and since God is love, you have nothing to fear. "Watch and pray" Jesus says to his disciples (which includes us).
