BLOCK WATCH SUCCESS STORIES Part 2

The Black Mountain Precinct's Community Action Team regularly builds and promotes Block Watch in order to maximize community involvement. If you've worked with your Community Action Officers or local Block Watch groups, you'll hear a lot of great advice regarding how to make your neighborhood safer. What you don't always hear about are the success stories associated with community involvement. Our next series focuses on Community Action Officers and their Block Watch/Community success stories.

Block Watch Success Stories (Volume 2)

This month we continue with part two of our three part series titled "Block Watch Success Stories". In this segment we hear from Officer Tewers regarding his perspective as a night shift patrol officer as well as Officer Mitten and his holiday package caper. Enjoy!

Officer Tim Tewers:

I have countless stories highlighting the success of the Block Watch program we have in the City of Phoenix. Interestingly, one of the earliest experiences that comes to mind occurred before I was a Community Action Officer.

Early in one of my shifts I went to a call of a suspicious person in the driveway of a neighbor's residence. The caller was a member of the neighborhood Block Watch and was walking her dog in the area. The caller was acquainted with the owner of this particular residence as she'd met him at Block Watch meetings she'd attended in the past. The suspicious person standing in the driveway was not the homeowner.

She placed a call to the police as she recognized this person did not belong at the residence. The caller was familiar with reporting requirements through her Block Watch/Phoenix Neighborhood Patrol training and gave a detailed description of the subject. Based on her description I was able to find this individual approximately one block away.

After identifying the man it was discovered that he had outstanding warrants for his arrest. While searching his backpack I found a notebook which contained a detailed description of every house on the block. The descriptions were thorough and even included times the homeowners left and returned to the property. By being a good neighbor and a vigilant Block Watch member the caller stopped a burglar from plaguing this neighborhood.

Officer Tim Mitten:

The Phoenix Police Department has a variety of programs that partner with the community to help prevent crime and the flagship of these programs is Block Watch. There are many times when active Block Watches are involved in the observation and reporting of crimes in progress which lead to an arrest.

Block Watch is basically neighbors watching out for others in their neighborhood in order to deter crime using common sense crime prevention methods. During Block Watch you get acquainted with your neighbors, work together to identify problems in the area and help the Phoenix Police Department by being aware of and reporting suspicious behavior. The observation and reporting of suspicious behavior is a key component as you know your neighborhood better than anyone else. Block Watch is not a hands

on program, there is no apprehending of people for any reason, you merely observe and report.

Several years ago an active Block Watch was having an issue with packages being stolen from the doorsteps of their neighborhood. This is not an uncommon problem, especially during the holidays. They started out by communicating with their assigned Community Action Officer in order to validate the stories they'd heard about the thefts. This information was provided through the Block Watch communication system the group organized in the form of an email tree with all of the involved residents in the area. A few days later an observant resident of the Block Watch was working from home and observed a UPS truck delivering a package to her neighbor's door. Right after the UPS truck left, a truck with two occupants stopped at the neighbor's house and one of the suspects stole the package. The resident called 911 and gave a description as best as she could of the truck and suspects. Responding officers found the suspect truck a short distance away, stopped it and found several stolen UPS packages in it. The suspects were arrested and further follow up resulted in more stolen property being recovered at their house.

This was all accomplished due to an observant neighbor/Block Watch member. The program works. By being observant while practicing the common sense crime prevention techniques we teach as part of Block Watch, your neighborhood safety can also be improved.

VIRTUAL BLOCK WATCH

Virtual Block Watch is one of the Phoenix Police Department's contemporary crime prevention and investigation tools that showcases our partnership with the community. Virtual Block Watch utilizes your security cameras to help solve crime. This exciting new program is now live and like all new programs, there are always new questions. Officer Martin took the time to answer these questions.

Q: How will Virtual Block Watch assist the Phoenix Police Department?

A: VBW will assist the PPD by collaborating with the community efforts to retain the theory of "being the eyes and ears" for a safer neighborhood. The recorded video will be an additional document/digital evidence of the crime for prosecution.

Q: What type of security/computer system is required in order to participate?

A: A DVR with a 30 day retention capability is preferred. This is usually a 1TB of storage capacity. It is recommended that the camera's are at a resolution of 1080p for a clearer picture but a 720p system can still be registered with Virtual Block Watch.

Q: Do you recommend any specific security/computer or camera system?

A: This will be completely up to the homeowners discretion (cost, resolution and availability of system) with the functionality and comfort level of the purchase.

Q: Does the Police Department have remote access to my security/computer system?

A: NO. Virtual Block Watch **will not** have any type of streaming capabilities or live feed from your CCTV system. The PPD will have the address of the registered system along with the locations of the camera placement.

Q: If my security system captures a criminal or crime, will I be required to testify in court?

A: NO. Once the PPD captures/copies the portion of video needed for prosecution, Forensic Imaging Tech (a city of phoenix representative) will testify on the digital evidence.

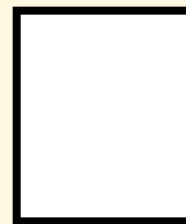

Since PNP went live with volunteer.phoenix.gov in August 2016, we have hoped to reduce duplication of effort and paper logs/worksheets. These new improvements continue this effort with the following changes. We hope to have videos up soon for the recent changes to online reporting.

Mileage Reimbursement

PNP members who have a NBW Grant in their neighborhood that has funds for PNP patrol fuel reimbursement we are offering, as an option, beginning this month to record miles and reimbursement documents online. The log sheet has been updated for this. PNP members recording their time for fuel reimbursement this way must enter the beginning and ending odometer readings and license plate number of the vehicle used on their logs. When you are ready to do a reimbursement simply email Brian.kornegay@phoenix.gov the PNP members name and the time frame you are requesting to reimburse and he will email back a report. This report will be signed as becomes your "receipt" for the grant quarterly report. The report double checks the math and calculates the reimbursement total.

If this methods work well it will likely be the required method for the grants awarded in July 2018.

PSVA Participants logging hours

In the past PNP members who also participate in the Presidential Service Award (PVSA) program had to do separate entries for PNP and PVSA. This was a duplication of effort. We have an updated combination log for PNP and PVSA. Detailed instructions went out to the PNP members who are also in PVSA.

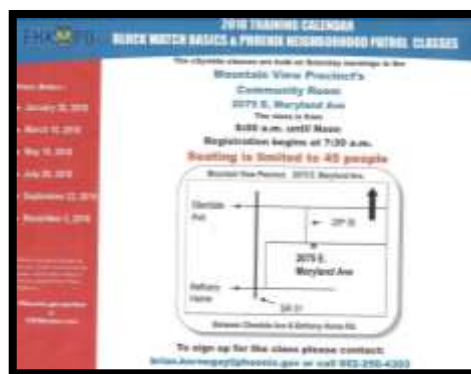

INNOVATION AWARD FOR ADOT'S I-17 WRONG-WAY VEHICLE SYSTEM

The Arizona Department of Transportation's pilot Interstate 17 wrong-way vehicle alert system being tested in Phoenix has been recognized with a Government Innovation Award from GCN, an information technology industry magazine. Governor Doug Ducey, who has directed ADOT to advance efforts to develop wrong-way vehicle countermeasures, including the I-17 system, said the award recognizes the state's commitment to public safety. In addition, Governor Ducey championed a new law that has wrong-way drivers under the influence of drugs or alcohol face felony charges. The first-in-the-nation system being tested on 15 miles of I-17 uses thermal cameras to detect and track wrong-way vehicles while also immediately alerting ADOT and the Arizona Department of Public Safety. The system also allows ADOT to quickly warn other drivers about wrong-way vehicles via messages on electronic freeway signs, allowing ADOT to evaluate how technology can be used to reduce the risks associated with wrong-way drivers. Thermal cameras have recorded more than 30 detections of wrong-way vehicles, mostly along I-17 off-ramps located within the project's boundaries. In most incidents, the drivers have turned around on an off-ramp without entering the mainline lanes of I-17. The system's 90 thermal cameras are positioned to detect wrong-way vehicles entering off-ramps or traveling along I-17.



The pilot project also is designed to trigger new illuminated wrong-way signs with flashing red lights aimed at getting the attention of the wrong-way driver. This technology cannot prevent all wrong-way crashes from happening. The primary goal is reducing the risk of serious crashes by alerting AZDPS and ADOT to wrong-way vehicles much faster than waiting for 911 calls from other motorists. While technology holds promise for reducing the risk of serious crashes, it can't prevent impaired drivers from getting behind the wheel.

Black Mountain Precinct Updates by Sgt. Scott Cain



Highlights are as follows. Sgt. Scott Cain gave a humorous update of the precinct presentation of crime statistics and trends from Lt. Williams. Month to month comparison violent crime is down 6% but up 4% from last year. Much of the violent crime is happening in 19th Ave and W Bell Rd corridor around 9pm on Saturday's. Burglaries are up 5% from last month however we are down 21% for the

year. BM Precinct and BW groups have been promoting close your garage doors, take your valuables out of your vehicles, and lock your vehicles. Keep spreading the word. Highest traffic accident areas have been at 7 th St and Bell and 32nd St and Bell. With traffic statistics the precinct can go to City Council and request an engineering study for the timing of the lights. There was a neighborhood drug arrest and identified a potential chop shop at 23rd Ave and Beck by the Neighborhood Enforcement teams after conducting surveillance and serving a search warrant on the property. G.A.I.N. Event is coming. If you are having a G.A.I.N. Event and haven't talked to Scott and Candice please do so soon. There're a total of 81 groups doing this event in the city. Eighteen are from the Black Mountain Police Precinct area. Coffee with a Cop is on Thursday, October 27th , 8:30am at the IHOP at 2103 W Happy Valley Rd.

PRESENTATION: PERSONAL SAFETY with Detective Brian Kornegay



Candice introduced Phoenix Police Department Detective Brian Kornegay. Brian is known for all his work for our Block Watch and Phoenix Neighborhood Patrol training, with the Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) principles act as a design tool as a crime prevention tool, and he is also the Citywide Coordinator for the Abatement Program. He puts on a whole list of classes and workshops and Personal Safety is one of them. Brian's Personal Safety Class which was a former Self-Awareness Class isn't a self-defense class to teach you how to fight. He used real life stories to demonstrate teaching points and asked for group participation. Basis for the class is awareness, intuition, mind-set, and boundaries so you're not placing yourself in danger. Brian defined Color of Awareness similar to the one introduced after 9/11 for the level to awareness. White Level is where most people are, not alert, oblivious to things around them, daydreaming or preoccupied walking with their heads down. Yellow Level is a relaxed state of general awareness of what is happening around them and paying attention. Orange Level is a heightened alertness, that a threat or danger has been identified. Red Level is responding to that threat, being mentally prepared. Black Level is lost control. Brian asks everyone operate in Yellow Level paying attention to everything around you. Being self-aware is looking for escape routes, where are the exits, where are areas of activity, and know how to escape. The escape may not be the same one you used to enter the room. Brian suggested everyone carry a wallet that carries just what they are going to need. Photocopy all credit cards, front and back, and keep the copies in a safe place or with a close friend. WHEN YOU CALL 911 KNOW THE 10 W'S

"Call if you can. Text if you can't." was the key message rolled out during a press conference on April 2nd as text to 9-1-1 service capability becomes available for the first time in the greater Phoenix region. If you are in imminent danger and unable to talk to a 9-1-1 operator, you now have the ability to text to 9-1-1. The service goes live following months of collaboration between numerous public agencies and advocates for the disability community.

- **What** - is your location? GIVE EXACT LOCATION
- **What** - happened? WHAT TYPE OF CRIME?
- **When** - did this happen?
- These questions will determine if it is a priority call. Give as much of this necessary information as you can.
- **Was** - anyone hurt?
- **Weapons** - are there weapons involved?
- **What** - manner did they leave or arrive – foot, vehicle, bicycle...?
- **Who** - did it? –Suspect description
- **Where** - did the suspect go? – What direction
- **What** - did the suspect obtain? – type and amount
- **Who** - is calling? – Give your name location and phone number (You can remain anonymous. If you do give your name, the info is redacted from the public record access.)

SIGN UP FOR REVERSE 911 IN CASE OF EMERGENCY

- Getting an emergency message out to those living near a catastrophe can be difficult. In Arizona, there is a reverse 911 system.
- The Community Emergency Notification System helps those managing a disaster send a message to potential victims, alerting them to stay away and stay safe.
- The Community Emergency Notification System is a robo-voice message alert going straight to your phone.
- The system automatically dials the landlines in the area of the active scene, but with landline phones nearly extinct, you must register you cell phone if you want to get the message.

- The system will be able to send text messages out and not only to those who are registered but also to anyone who is near a cell tower where the situation is ongoing.

SCAMMERS USE PHONE CALLS TO PREY ON VOTERS

Beware of con artists seeking political donations and personal information

As the [midterm elections approach](#), consumers should be on the alert for bold scammers that government and industry experts say are increasingly using fake phone calls to prey on potential victims. Con artists pose as political volunteers in an attempt to lure voters into donating money by asking for cash or a credit card number. Targets may be told that they can register to vote by phone, which is not permitted anywhere in the United States, if they supply a Social Security number. Scammers use analytics to target areas with a high concentration of older adults, such as Florida.

The deceptions are pervasive and persuasive. Political ruses often start with an [unsolicited telephone call, email or text](#). Experts say these communications should be considered suspicious, and they urge consumers not to answer numbers they do not recognize. If you do receive and answer such a call, hang up as soon as the caller asks you for any sensitive personal information.

The National Association of Secretaries of State is warning its membership to be vigilant regarding fake political calls. The FBI and the Department of Homeland Security are investigating dozens of reported incidents. "Scammers are experts at social engineering and they can tell an incredibly convincing story," says Jonathon Nelson, director of product management at Hiya, a worldwide caller ID company. "The best thing is to never give anything to someone over a phone call — information or money."

Here are the most-common political fraud schemes and how to combat them:

Cash Donations

When any organization calls and asks for a donation, many Americans already are skeptical. But some politically minded citizens engage in conversations with pseudo-political volunteers, particularly if the callers express like-minded opinions. That leaves them susceptible to giving money to a campaign. While some campaigns legitimately contact citizens, many targets fail to verify that the call is legitimate.

"Political donation scams represent one of the most straightforward ways to ask for money," says Nelson. "If successful, the person who donated may never even realize they were scammed, so the charges are unlikely to be reversed."

Areas such as the Deep South, Washington, D.C., and states such as Michigan and Texas are targets for scammers because of their politically passionate populations, Nelson says.

The Los Angeles County District Attorney's Office recently cautioned citizens about this swindle. "At the end of the call, the thief will ask victims to make a pledge by providing a credit card," Los Angeles Deputy District Attorney Benyomin Forer says in an online video. Hiya reported that one New Mexico resident received a call asking for a political donation to aid a candidate who wanted to lower taxes. It was another credit-card scam.

Political Surveys

Another election tactic involves fraudulent "polling companies" offering compensation or prizes for participation to pry sensitive information from consumers. The scammers ask their victims for a credit card number so they can process shipping charges and/or taxes. The Better Business Bureau warns about such hustles that involve freebies, such as exotic cruises.

When in doubt, don't give it out, when it comes to personal information, advises the office of Minnesota Attorney General Lori Swanson.

Legitimate surveys by bona fide research companies never ask for personal information that could be compromised in order to win a trip. If asked for personal information from a "polling company," you should tell the caller not to call back and hang up. To reduce unwanted calls, register your home and mobile phone numbers with the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) at www.donotcall.gov or call 888-382-1222 toll free.

Voter Registration

The FTC warns consumers about phone calls (landline or mobile), emails and unsolicited in-person visits to homes by phony election

volunteers or those posing as representatives of a civic organization. The goal is to convince citizens that they can register to vote over the phone by supplying personal information, such as a Social Security number. Voter registration by phone is not allowed in any state.

Cities and counties provide voter registration forms, which may also be accessed from their websites. Consumers should contact the FTC at 877-FTC-HELP (877-382-4357) if they believe they have been victimized by a scam.

Voting

Only two methods of voting exist in the U.S. — in person at a government-sanctioned location or via absentee ballot using the U.S. Postal Service. If an unsolicited caller offers to register someone, hang up and contact the local election commission or call the Department of Justice at 800-253-3931 toll free.

Anyone who contacts you by landline or mobile phone, computer or in person and says you can vote by calling, emailing or texting is trying to con you. This is an attempt to secure personal information, perhaps a birth date, during what seems like an informal call, email or text. ID theft is common with such fake political calls. Sometimes the scammers spoof the 202 area code for Washington, D.C., to make the calls appear legitimate, or they display a campaign name on caller ID.

SCAM CALLS ARE 'EPIDEMIC' — AND GETTING WORSE

A new report says nearly half of mobile calls will be fraudulent by next year

Scam calls are getting more frequent — and quickly. By next year, nearly half of all calls to mobile phones will be fraudulent, according to a new report from telecommunications firm First Orion. The company analyzed data from more than 50 billion calls over 18 months to get a snapshot of what they call the scam-call "epidemic." Here's what they found:

- **Mobile phone scam calls are increasing:** In 2017, only 3.7 percent of calls to cell phones were fraudulent. This year, that number reached 29.2 percent — and it's expected to climb to 44.6 percent in 2019.
- **Fraudulent landline calls are declining:** Scam calls originating from landlines are decreasing. In 2019, only a projected 24.8 percent of scam calls will come from landlines, a decrease from 56 percent in 2017. This is in part because fewer people use landlines in the first place, but it's also a sign of just how technologically sophisticated — and successful — mobile scammers have become.
- **Beware the area code:** "Neighborhood spoofing" is a tactic in which fraudsters show up as a local number on your caller ID by matching the first six digits of your number. The report estimates that 9 in 10 scam calls will come from a familiar area code next year.

The increasing numbers of scam calls mean it's harder to determine what calls are legitimate — on either a mobile or landline.

"People just don't answer their phones anymore," says Gavin Macomber, First Orion's senior vice president of marketing and strategic business development.

According to Macomber, 84 percent of unknown mobile calls (and an even higher percentage of landline calls) go unanswered these days. This can be a real problem for legitimate businesses trying to reach their customers.

And for consumers who get caught up in a scam, the financial repercussions can be serious. The FTC [reports](#) that the median loss from a phone-based scam in 2017 was \$720.

Luckily, there are several ways to stay protected. For smartphone users, apps such as RoboKiller and Truecaller can help detect and block unwanted calls — but keep in mind that these apps block calls only from known scam numbers, not "spoofed" calls that temporarily hijack legitimate digits.

Some carriers, such as T-Mobile, have started to offer screening services that alert consumers if an incoming call is likely fraudulent — and other carriers are likely to follow suit. In the meantime, familiarize yourself with [common scams](#), like calls from people claiming to work for the IRS or your credit card company.

Macomber says he hopes we'll soon be living in a world in which consumers can answer their phones again. Until then, just hang up

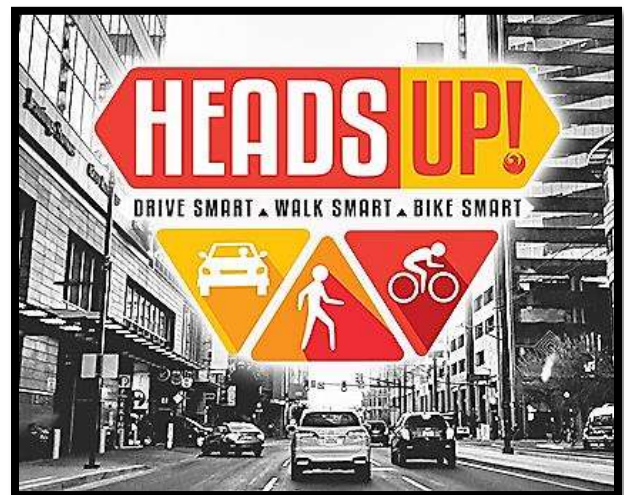

From the Desk of Bill Montgomery- Maricopa County Attorney Offers Perspective on New Crime Report



The FBI's 2017 Uniform Crime Report (UCR) for Arizona was released in late September and reflects an overall 1.4% drop in crime in the state. While crime is down overall in Arizona for the sixth year in a row, the new report indicates a mix in other trends. The report, which analyzed crime data from 2017, shows the violent crime rate rose 7.9%, while the property crime rate fell 2.9%.

"This report allows us to look at statewide data year over year and assess trends to see where we can identify areas for further coordination in law enforcement," said Maricopa County Attorney Bill Montgomery.

Violent crime has generally trended downward since 1993 where we saw a high of 715 violent crimes per 100,000 people; our lowest rate was seen in 2014 when the rate hit a low of 392.7 violent crimes per 100,000 representing a drop of 45.1%. However, the past three years reflect an increase in violent crime with the new report indicating there were 508 violent crimes per 100,000 in 2017. This new data represents an increase of 29.4% since the low in 2014, but still remains 29% lower than the 1993 high.

The murder rate increased slightly from 5.6 per 100,000 in 2016 to 5.9 in 2017. Arizona's historic lowest murder rate was 4.5 set in 2015, while the historic high remains 10.5 set in 1994. Rape increased to 51 per 100,000 in 2017 from 47.8 in 2016. Robbery also increased to 106 per 100,000, up from a historic low of 99.9 set in 1969 and an historic high of 204.2 set in 1974. Aggravated Assault rose from 315.6 in 2016 to 345 in 2017, continuing a trend of significant increases year over year since 2014.

Community Based Prosecutors have been reviewing aggravated assault numbers in several of our Community Based Prosecution Bureaus to identify crime drivers and partner with police and communities to develop strategies for reducing these crimes. One successful example is the North Central Phoenix Bureau which partnered with Phoenix Police Department and neighbors in the vicinity of 19th Avenue and Camelback. Efforts have led to a 15% reduction in reported aggravated assaults over the first six months of this year.

Property crimes trended lower in every category except for a slight increase of 1.5% in motor vehicle theft to 271.6 from 267.5 in 2016. Our historic low of 255.7 was set in 2013 while the high of 1,157.7 was set in 1995. Overall, the property crime rate of 2,914.9 offenses per 100,000 is the lowest rate since 1960 and contributed greatly to an overall reduction in the rate of criminal offenses against Arizona residents.

Number of organ and tissue donors rise with assist from MVD

Customers can choose to be a donor while renewing vehicle registration online

PHOENIX – A recent change to how Arizona motorists can choose to be an organ and tissue donor at ServiceArizona.com has coincided with a nearly 20 percent increase in the number of people signing up for this important cause.

The increase was measured comparing sign-ups for donations between November, 2017 to July, 2018 to the same period the year before.

Since Oct. 31, 2017, Arizona Department of Transportation Motor Vehicle Division customers have been able to register as donors when renewing a vehicle registration at ServiceArizona.com, which is the most common renewal method. Previously, that decision could only be made through ADOT MVD when a driver was getting a new or updated driver license or ID card.

Because Arizona licenses are valid until the customer turns 65, and photo updates occur every 12 years, the chances for customers to make this selection were limited. By contrast, vehicle registration renewals for most occur every one to two years. Customers who renew online can click a link to Donate Life Arizona at the completion of the transaction.

"This was an easy decision for the MVD to make," said MVD Stakeholder Relations Manager Jennifer Bowser Richards. "Organ and tissue donations save lives and it's gratifying that making a simple change to our vehicle registration process has enabled more Arizonans to become donors."

Only 500 business days left before Travel ID deadline for Arizona

TSA to stiffen airport ID requirements on Oct. 1, 2020

PHOENIX – Arizonans thinking about getting a Travel ID to replace their current standard driver license or ID card should make an appointment at an Arizona Department of Transportation Motor Vehicle Division office soon to prepare for the Oct. 1, 2020, changes to ID requirements at airport security checkpoints.

"As of this week, there are about 500 business days, excluding government holidays, for people who want to get the Travel ID," said MVD Stakeholder Relations Manager Jennifer Bowser Richards. "There are literally millions of Arizonans who may want to get this credential, so making an appointment at ServiceArizona.com to visit an MVD office and obtain the Travel ID is becoming more important as time passes."

Arizona is one of 37 states to offer a choice between a credential that meets federal standards and one that does not. Arizona law requires that MVD provide customers with this choice.

The Arizona Travel ID replaces the holder's current card and is distinguished by a gold star embedded in the upper right-hand corner. This indicates the holder has verified his or her identity to meet the more stringent standards of the federal REAL-ID Act. It does not replace a U.S. passport for international travel.

When making an appointment, customers should be prepared to bring several different forms of identification. Some examples include:

- One document such as a birth certificate or valid U.S. passport to verify identity
- One document with the user's Social Security number such as a Social Security card or W-2 form
- Two documents such as utility bills or bank statements that prove Arizona residency

A full list of acceptable documents is available online at azdot.gov/travelID.

Customers should bring documents that are consistent with each other in regards to a person's name and other information. For example, name changes due to marriage or divorce, use of nicknames instead of given names and so forth, need to be considered when bringing in documentation.

Some Authorized Third Party dealers provide full license and ID services, including offering the Travel ID. Go to azdot.gov/thirdpartyDLservices for more information on locations and availability.

At ports of entry and elsewhere, ADOT helps combat human trafficking

Training, K-9 units among agency's steps to identify and aid victims



PHOENIX – At Arizona Department of Transportation commercial ports of entry near California and New Mexico, K-9 units are trained to identify not only evidence of illegal drugs but human cargo that can include victims of human trafficking. Lieutenants overseeing these ports have training on identifying warning signs of human trafficking, such as unusual tattoos, an unwillingness to speak up and carrying large amounts of cash without explanation.

Meanwhile, dozens of vehicles driven by officers with ADOT's Enforcement and Compliance Division have bumper stickers aimed at directing those who need help or who see signs of trouble to EndSexTrafficking.AZ.gov or 888.373.7888, resources offered through the Governor's Office of Youth, Faith and Family.

With human trafficking an increasingly urgent issue, ADOT officers enforcing commercial vehicle laws have joined other law enforcement agencies and the Arizona Human Trafficking Council created by Governor Doug Ducey to help make Arizona a leader in combating this crime.

"Human trafficking is not just something you hear about on TV or read on the Internet; it's happening right here in our state," ADOT Director John Halikowski said. "That's why it's critical for ADOT to be part of this comprehensive effort to combat it."

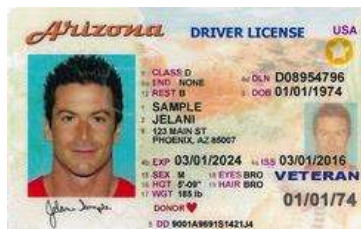
As a member of the Arizona Human Trafficking Council, Chief Gary McCarthy with ADOT's Office of Inspector General, part of the Enforcement and Compliance Division, chairs the outreach and awareness committee that not only raises public awareness but trains people on how to spot human trafficking and what to do about it.

In addition to the training provided to lieutenants overseeing commercial ports of entry, starting in 2019 advanced training for ADOT officers will include a human-trafficking component, including where the demand comes from and what cases look like. And the Enforcement and Compliance Division plans to develop online training so other ADOT employees who work along highways will learn how to spot the signs of human trafficking.

Since December, ADOT has had its first two K-9 units trained to detect human smuggling in addition to illegal drugs. The K-9s are used at the ports of entry along the eastern and western sides of Arizona to check any commercial vehicles that raise suspicions.

"We're taking a few approaches to do our part to end this heinous practice here in Arizona," McCarthy said. "From training more officers to use of our K-9 units to raising awareness through bumper stickers on our vehicles, ADOT is serious about stopping human trafficking and saving lives."

BLIGHT AND ZONING LAWS

STRUCTURES: The maintenance of a home is the responsibility of the property owner. Any wood, siding, shingles, roof covering, railings, fences, walls, ceilings, porches, doors, windows, screens and other exterior parts of any structure on the property must be maintained in weather tight, sound condition and in good repair. The property owner is responsible for making sure there are no doors or windows left open and not secure to the outside. *FOR HELP call the Preservation Division of the Neighborhood Services Dept. at 602-495-0700 to see if you qualify for a free Grant!*

OUTDOOR STORAGE: All outside storage that can be seen from the street should be inside sheds or cabinets. Items should not be set in car ports in view of the street. Please use enclosed areas or backyards.

JUNK, TRASH & DEBRIS: Junk, trash and debris cannot be left in the yard or car port and must be properly disposed of. This includes junk auto parts, appliances, furniture, building and/or landscaping material, trash such as discarded papers, cardboard, plastics, etc. including tree trimmings and fallen limbs or any other items that appear to have been discarded. The only exception is during the Bulk Trash Collection weeks four times a year.

PARKING: Parking is only permitted for passenger cars and motorcycles on residential streets, on driveways or in garages. A driveway or parking area must be constructed with an approved dust free parking surface. The stone must be 1/4 -3/4 in size with a permanent border holding it in. 1/4 minus size stone is not allowed for parking. There are limits to the amount of front yard area that can be used for parking. Only 35% of the front yard may be converted to driveway or dust free parking.

GRASS AND WEEDS: Grass and weeds must not be allowed to grow over 6 inches high due to fire hazard, allowing the weeds to go to seed and spreading throughout the neighborhood and insect infestation.

ELIMINATE GRAFFITI: Keeping the neighborhood graffiti free is something we can all do. If there is graffiti on your property, please remove it as soon as possible. The Graffiti Busters Program provides paint, supplies and training to assist groups with eliminating graffiti. The City will also remove the graffiti from private property with written permission from the property owner. Call 602-495-7014.

The Blight Buster Volunteer Program (BBVP) is a training program designed for residents, ages 18 and above, to learn how to address a variety of

blight-related issues; from back alley clean ups to reporting illegal signs in the public right of way. Those who successfully complete the training will be given a city identification, uniform, and resources to help carry out their volunteer assignments.

There are two levels to the BBVP, the Blight Buster and Blight Buster Leader. The Blight Buster works alone or in small groups. Their primary duties are to report illegal signs, remove graffiti, and to help out on big projects. The Blight Buster Leader is reserved for the more involved volunteer. They will receive the training and knowledge on how to become an effective leader for their community, learning how to recruit and manage volunteers. They will conduct anti-graffiti presentations to educate our community and youth on the negative effects graffiti has on our economy, and will also work one on one with residents in need, solving blight issues in their own neighborhood. www.bolocop.com is web-based delivery system built by law enforcement to be used by law enforcement to provide direct communication to businesses and community members. The service is free and there will never be a cost associated with using or receiving BOLO/ALERTS!

Simply go to www.bolocop.com and register for the alerts. You can choose alerts for the state, a city or just your zip code

You can help police solve crimes in your community if you're willing to "BOLO" (Be On the Look Out). An easy way to do this is to register at BOLOCop.com, a web-based communication program that will send you alerts from law enforcement agencies seeking the public's help on a range of public safety issues, including locating missing persons, identifying probation violation offenders, and recovering stolen property. The service also distributes information about crime trends that may be impacting your neighborhood.

Created in 2012 by Gilbert Police Crime Prevention Officer Vickie Owen and website developer Steven Mueller, BOLO Cop is used by hundreds of federal and state law enforcement officials to distribute critical police information in a variety of ways to individuals and businesses. The site will soon add a national registry known as the "Silver Directory" which allows members of the public to add information about a loved one suffering from dementia which can be used by police to find the individual's home should they be found or if they need to activate a Silver Alert.

BOLO Cop had its origins in a fax-based service started by Peggy and Paul Secaur in 1990. After Paul received a business fax that helped him and police apprehend a purse thief in the building he worked in, Paul and Peggy got the idea for Fax Net 1 and started sharing faxes with neighboring businesses about crimes in the area. Within weeks of launching the service, police were able to catch a bank robber, break up a counterfeit ring, locate an elderly man suffering from dementia and divert an attempted rapist.
