From compassionate to overwhelmed

Roanoke man overrun with pets after taking in all the homeless

Together again

Roanoke Police have visited the menagerie of dog pens off LaFayette Highway several times but accompanying them last week was Aris Murphy, chief investigator with the Fifth District Attorney's office, and Chuck Smith, president of the Randolph County Animal Shelter. Roanoke nuisance officer Bill Ford has been there several times as well as Randy Moore and Shannon Laney, who are assigned to the narcotics unit and wanted to assist Murphy with the project.

What was expected to be a horror story turned out to be a situation where a man's wife turned from an animal rescuer into a hoarder and left behind her husband, Craig Carse, to care for the animals when she died from pancreatic cancer last September.

After feeding, watering and car-

ing for the animals for almost a year he seemed to welcome people coming in to relieve him of their care. He admitted he is overwhelmed

Smith admitted it was a far different situation than what he had expected en route to the trailer. The animals were well cared for in separated pens, most under shade trees.

It is believed about 53 dogs are in the pens and possibly 15 to 20 cats, maybe more, in trailers. Ford said basically she was running an animal shelter before her death.

Friday, RCAS kennel manager RickyPoole moved among the dogs checking them. Smith said some will be good adoptable dogs. After quarantine they will advertise the dogs they have already taken the way they normally do through the newspaper, Petfinder, the RCAS

Drive west past Quail Run Subdivision and turn off Alabama Highway 22 beside Clark Brothers Quality Meats, then turn into a dusty road to the left. A pretty little church, Shady Grove, is to the

The trip continues along the road to a locked gate, then through the gate into the area of a concrete pond-looking facility. This is the HCR or hydrograph controlled release lagoon, according to Jerry Revis, general manager of the Roanoke Water Sewer Gas & Filter Plant Board.

It is like a holding facility for mostly liquids in this sewerage system. Solids are pumped into Roanoke's three lagoons: McMurray, which lies next to this facility, Finch-
