

Further Description of Important Features (Continue on reverse if necessary) This long, gable ended building has been altered both internally and externally in its adaptation from twine shanty to apartment house. Single sash, hopper-type windows dominate the eave walls. Original 8/8 windows are located in the shed extension of the eastern gable end. Enclosed porches occupy both gabled ends.			
43. History and Significance This is another instance where a building constructed for another purpose has been converted to a residence. This motel unit, now known as Sunrise Point, was built in 1893 by fisherman, Peter Ditchey, for use as a twine shanty for his Sandusky Fish Co. Peter, born in 1849, had come to Kelleys Island with his younger brother, John shortly before 1880, and started their			
44. Description of Environment and Outbuildings Just a short distance from the island marina, this unit lies close to the road that skirts the lake shore. A swampy area of cat tails and grasses lies to the west, and a large open field to the east. Facilities for cleaning fish are on the beach in front of the building.

own fish company. In addition to the shanty they had built a small neat home, a cook house over which John presided, and a bunk house for their men all on the shore south of the road from the shanty. (These buildings have since been lost to erosion.) Peter married Julia Monaghan (ERI-1758) and moved with her to Pelee Island where they are said to have raised tobacco. John then took over the fishing operation, engaging in both gill netting and pound fishing for which he used the facilities of Koster's Dock (ERI-1650), c 1890's. In the 1920's and 30's the Lay Brothers Fish Co. used this shanty as a center for their operations on the island, as well as using the Koster's Winery building. Fishermen such as "Boss" Allen Mc Killips and sons, Clayton Hughes, Joseph Pohorence, Jay Norris, George Suhr worked here after John Ditchey.
