A People of Five Books

We United Methodists are a people of five books: The Bible; *The United Methodist Hymnal*; *The United Methodist Book of Worship*; *The United Methodist Book of Discipline*; and *The United Methodist Book of Resolutions*. The first one is obvious. Also, there is no one translation that is recommended; we have lots of choices. For most of my career, I have relied on the New International Version, first published in 1978 which corresponded with my studies at North Central Bible College. In 2011, the NIV underwent a major revision.

Eugene Peterson's *The Message* is a popular paraphrase of the Bible, and it can help us to look at familiar passages in new ways. However, if you're looking for a modern, more accurate translation, Today's Living Translation is an excellent option.

In 2022, the New Revised Standard Version was updated and released, and it is considered the version that is the most faithful to the original text. I recently purchased a copy and have been using the NRSVUE in my devotions. ("UE" stands for "Updated Edition.")

The Book of Discipline is our official law, doctrine, and polity guide. It contains our constitution, beliefs, and rules for clergy and laity. It also contains our Social Principles, and a brief history of Methodism, including the various branches which comprise our Connection. *The Book of Discipline* details how our church is to be structured, from our General Conference to the local church. It is also subject to revision every four years by action of our General Conference. A copy of *The Book of Discipline* is in the church office.

The Book of Resolutions is also subject to revision every four years. It is a collection of the church's official social policies and stances on hundreds of current social, moral, economic, and environmental issues. It serves as a guide for ministry, education, and action for members and leaders, distinct from the legal *Book of Discipline*. These resolutions offer guidance—but not binding law—on topics like care for the creation, immigration, health, and justice. A copy of *The Book of Resolutions* is in the church library.

The United Methodist Hymnal is our guide for worship, and like our other books, it must be approved by General Conference, which can be a daunting task. Our current hymnal was presented to the 1988 General Conference for approval, and I suspect those who had worked on it for years were fearful that it would be subjected to dozens if not hundreds of amendments. (Let your mind run wild on that thought!) As it happens, one of the keynote speakers at that General Conference was Bishop Woodie White who, at the time, was assigned as our bishop. He preached a sermon there based on the hymn, "Lord of the Dance." After he preached, there was only one amendment to the hymnal, and that was to include "Lord of the Dance;" it hadn't been included in the initial presentation.

Thanks to our Bishop, "Lord of the Dance" was

Continued from page 1 added to our hymnal and we sang it this past January 18.

When I decided to transfer my ministry into the UMC, one of the first things I did was check out our hymnal. And I liked what I saw. I liked the layout of the hymnal and the diversity of hymns. But our hymnal is more than hymns, which I learned on my first Sunday under appointment. That was in Verona, and since it was the first Sunday of July, I served communion. As it happened, my District Superintendent Robert Mushrush also attended that service, and afterwards, he complemented me on the service and my sermon. But then he told me that when it came to Holy Communion, I needed to follow our hymnal.

Oops.

I had been in the habit of simply reading a scripture before serving communion; however, I learned that morning that United Methodists celebrate the Lord's table in the context of prayer. That's why it's called "The Great Thanksgiving."

Years later, I attended a funeral for a friend, and a colleague conducted the funeral. Let's just say that he didn't follow the pattern for a funeral as found in our hymnal and the words of Rev. Mushrush echoed in my mind. All that to say that our hymnal gives us our pattern for worship.

The Book of Worship is our companion to our hymnal, providing us with prayers, liturgies, and patterns for worship for the entire year. I have a copy and have used it regularly over my 32 years as a United Methodist pastor.

Lent begins with Ash Wednesday, February 18, and once again we will begin our Lenten journey "by the book." Specifically, we will rely on the Bible, the hymnal, and our Book of Worship. Service time is 6 pm, and I trust you will be able to join us as once again we continue in our journey of faith "by the book." Or, more accurately, by the five books.

Ash Wednesday, February 18: Joel 2:1-2, 12-17; Psalm 51: 1-17; 2 Corinthians 5:20b-6:10 and Matthew 6:1-21.

Sunday, February 22: Genesis 2:15-17, 3:1-7; Psalm 32; Roman 5:12-19; and Matthew 4:1-11.

Join Our “Bucket Brigade”

We had an excellent response to our Advent Buckets with proceeds going to Heifer International as we raised \$2,000 for this excellent ministry. With the arrival of Lent, you will have another chance to fill them with your spare change, only this time, proceeds will be directed to another vital missions endeavor: our United Methodist Connectional Ministries and Benevolence Fund.

As a United Methodist Church, Aledo contributes a set amount of money every year to our denomination at both the regional and the global level. The regional level is the Illinois Great Rivers Conference which encompasses roughly all of Illinois south of Interstate 80.

The funds we contribute are called *apportionments* and they fall into two categories. The first is *Clergy Support and Administration* which essentially pays for our denominational “overhead.” It’s not quite as glamorous as some of the more visible work The United Methodist Church is doing to combat hunger, share the good news of Jesus Christ, or raise up new leaders to develop innovative solutions to the challenges facing our world today. But, guided by God’s Spirit, it is the oil that lubricates these gears moving the church’s work forward to impact hearts and lives. Without it, the life-giving work of The United Methodist Church simply wouldn’t be possible.

The second category is called *Benevolences and Connectional Ministries* and it includes missions and outreach ministries within our Conference and beyond. For 2026, the Conference budget for this category is \$2.891 million; Aledo’s portion of that total is \$10,572 or \$881 per month.

This year, we want to get a head start on this apportionment, so we’ve set a goal for our Lenten buckets: with your help, we’ve set a Silver Goal of \$881, or one month’s apportionments for Benevolences and Connectional Ministries. Our Gold Goal is \$1,762, or two month’s apportionments.

Benevolences and Connectional Ministries supports congregational development, Wesley Foundations on Illinois campuses, the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR), Conference camping ministries, Africa University, and the Black College Fund, to list just a few ministries.

Buckets will be distributed beginning on Sunday, February 15. You may also pick up your Lenten bucket at our Ash Wednesday service, 6 pm on February 18.

Please return your buckets on Easter Sunday, April 5th.

Who was St. Valentine?

Valentine was a Roman priest and physician who lived under Roman rule during the Third Century. At that time, Emperor Claudius II outlawed marriage because he believed that single men made better soldiers. However, Valentine defied the emperor's ban on marriage by secretly joining couples in marriage. Consequently, Valentine was arrested, thrown into prison, and subsequently martyred.

While in prison, Valentine reportedly befriended the blind daughter of his jailer, Asterius, and healed her sight. Before his execution, he supposedly wrote her a letter which he signed, "From your Valentine." That legend begat our modern tradition of giving Valentine greetings.

Valentine was martyred for his faith on February 14, 270 AD; that date as established as his feast day by Pope Julius I a century later. Today, St. Valentine is the patron saint of love, young people, and beekeepers.

Incidentally, if you post *@AledoUMC* in the search bar, you will visit the YouTube page of our sister church in Aledo, Texas.

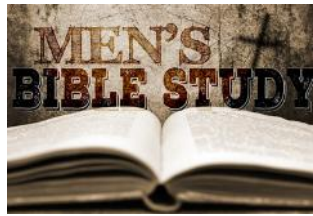
Finally, even though we are developing our own YouTube channel, we plan to continue streaming our 8 am services on Facebook.

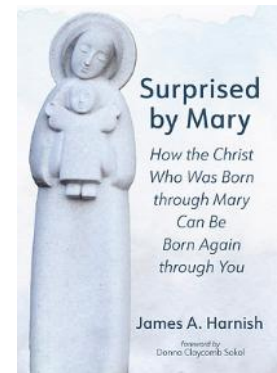

February Connection Coins: Hy-Vee Bread Ministry

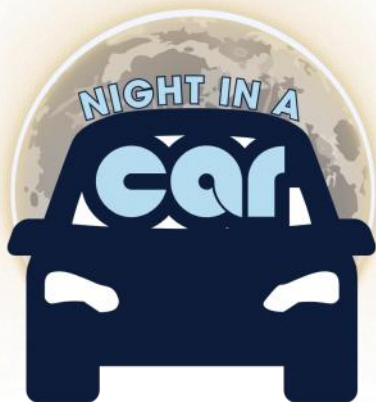

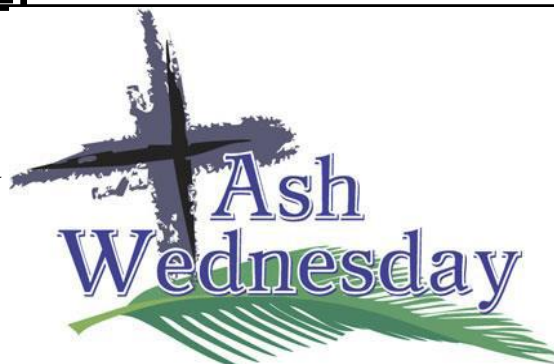
Did you know?

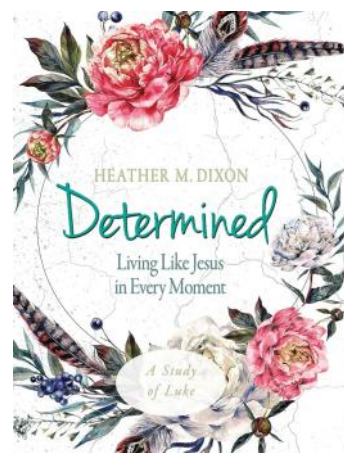

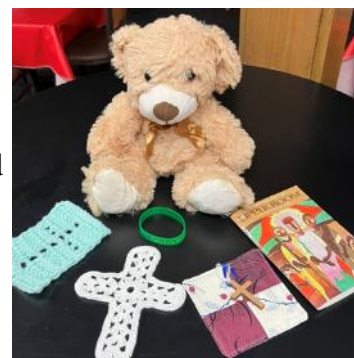


To Assist You in Your Prayer Life
