










































June 2020 Hike the Green Trail at Camp

Plants arrived just in time for Mother's Day.

The sales were led by Luke Fox, Ben Gunderson, and Alex Hornickle who had combined sales of over 1600 plants! Our math-minded readers might want to know that we had 340 orders for 3597

products totaling \$25K in sales. This was a troop record and a much-needed one as the hoagie sale and Radnor Races were not held this year. Our farthest orders were from Missouri (got refunded) and San Francisco Bay (didn't drive quite that far). We realized the reach of our online store and how people like supporting the scouts!


The sorting of the orders which filled the Bus Barn completely to overflowing was handled by a group of willing masked volunteers. The sale could not have been successful without these volunteers.

An online pickup schedule was newly added this year which helped spread out the distribution. Scouts patiently waited for their orders to be pulled and triple checked so that Vinca, Zinnias, and San Marzano Tomatoes were not confused with Coleus Wizard or Snapdragons.

Once the flowers were 100% picked up on Thursday (thank you, troop!), if the delivery challenges were not enough, multiple freeze warnings buzzed the phones of those who carefully sorted their orders for delivery day - alerting them to get the plants into a warm shelter for the night. For extra incentive to get the task done quickly, a staple of Troop 78 events (a deluge of rain) fell on Friday night accelerating the efforts with all-hands family efforts to protect the crops from overwatering.

The flower sale committee would like to thank all of the volunteers who helped and all of the scouts who participated to support the troop and bless their neighbors with the joy of growing plants!

<u>78 Historical Notes</u> More Troop 78 History gleaned from old Newsletters By Steve D'Antonio

In January of 1980, the troop started off the new decade by taking 1st, 4th, 5th and 8th at the Council First Aid meet. Moose Patrol took the top place. Like most Februarys in the 80's there was a Klondike Derby where Troops compete against each other in outdoor events and camp (usually) in the snow. These were typically held at French Creek State park or at Hibernia park. The highlight of the day is the patrol sled races in the afternoon. Ernie assisted with the design of the sleds built by each patrol. Many of them are still used by the troop today. In 1980, the troop bought new 2-man tents, and they were a huge advance over the old Army pup tents because they had a floor! Summer camp cost \$95 a week in 1980 and troop dues was just \$12 annually.

It looks like there were no newsletters published between late 1980, and October of 1984. But since 1984 they have been published continuously, so there is a lot more troop history to tell. By 1984, dues had increased to \$20. Troop family dinners in October were being held "on the hill" at the old cabin property (now Veteran's Lane). Lights were strung up in the trees and a long extension cord led to the cabin at the bottom of the hill. What was unique about those dinners was that the Scouts in each patrol would cook some of the side dishes on an open fire, the troop staff would cook the main dish (usually ham) and families of three patrols bringing salads and the other patrol families bringing desserts. All tables and chairs were borrowed from either the VFW which was our Troop sponsor, or the Covenant Presbyterian church. It was usually late at night until everything was returned.


Throughout most of the 1980's the first trip of the year was a "beach trip" to Cape Henlopen in Delaware. Each year there was a Hoagie sale or two (the troop didn't begin working at Radnor Races until 1989), a Matje Farm trip in February, a troop swim in February at the Immaculata indoor pool, and a Florida trip over Spring break. And yes, the newsletter even mentions Mr. Matje's arrival speech back in the '80s! In May there was almost always a Council Camporee similar to the one we had last year for the Council's 100th birthday. In 1985, patrols from Troop 78 won several of the events at the camporee, including Knots, Flagpole raising, Compass and map reading, with the overall best score going to the Panther patrol.

Summer camp in 1985 was deemed the most successful since 1977, with the troop and patrols winning many events, including both the Paul Bunyan Field Day and the Water Carnival. The troop camped overnight at Camp Jubilee on the last night before the name was changed to Camp Ware. At a nightly Boom Town, the troop earned enough \$ to purchase the right to stand in for the Camp Director at retreat, while the Camp Director (Ernie) marched with the troop! I hope Ern was in step and didn't cause the troop to lose the trophy. Then as now, there were many 78'ers on camp staff, including the Handicraft Director and the Campcraft Director.

Throughout 1985, Scouts and families were saving and earning for a European trip in 1986. And at least two Scouts (Rich Foot and Mark Matje) were headed to the National Jamboree at Fort A.P. Hill in Virginia in July of '85. Next month we'll have more about the '85 Jamboree, the '86 Europe trip and the rest of the decade.

<u>Nature Moment</u>

Spotted Lanternfly Alert!

Scouts are taught to respect nature and leave no trace. This is not the case for the spotted lanternfly (SLF). Spotted lanternfly is an invasive pest ravaging trees in our area. These hungry insects cause damage when they feed by sucking sap from the host's stem and branches reducing photosynthesis. In addition, they excrete a large amount of fluid which promotes mold and attracts other harmful insects. The damage done by SLF can weaken the tree leaving it susceptible diseases. The USDA recommends trapping and eliminating where ever it's found.

One very effective method to trap SLF nymphs (nymphs are emerging right now) is to use fly trap paper to wrap the tree trunks. Here are some examples of how effective fly paper can be. These pictures were taken on May 30th and again on May 31st. Notice the white spotted black nymphs at the bottom of the paper. The first two pictures are an hour apart. The third picture is about 18 hours from the second picture.



The trap paper used is CatchMaster Giant Fly Trap Roll. For more information and pictures of the SLF stages of life, check out the United States Department of Agriculture website.
