Our next book club meeting will be Tuesday, January 21, 2025, at 1:00pm.


The book will be, "Making it So". It is an autobiography by Patrick Stewart, otherwise known as Captain Picard on Star Trek.

Chanukkah

<u>Laws and Customs</u> The Chanukkah festival, which is observed for eight days, begins on the 25th day of the "Kislev" month. The word Chanukkah is composed of two parts, "Chanu" which means "they camped" referring to the victory of the Maccabees over the Syrian Greeks, and "Kah" are the letters "Raf" and "hei" which together mean 25th. This holiday is also known as the "Feast of Lights" and the "Feast of Dedication".

Of all our holidays in the year, "Cjanukkah" is the only one that we are told to publicize. I was taught to celebrate Jew and non-Jew a like, for two reasons. The first is the victory of the Maccabees (priests) over the Greeks and the second is the miracle of the cruse of oil that burned for eight days when it only had the capacity to burn for one.

Rule of Antiochus The Greek ruler Antiochus did not want to destroy the Jewish people; he wanted to destroy their religioun. He would never have tried to convert the Jews had he not been reassured by the priests of Israel that Judaism no longer held first place in their hearts. The priests told him that the Jews were only waiting for him to place a Greek idol in the Temple.

Rebellion There was one priestly family that did not think as the ungodly priest; it was the family of the Hasmoneans, or Maccabees as they were later called. Mattathias and five sons knew it was wrong to forsake their religion. They knew that Jews had sinned greatly in adopting customs of the Greeks which were contrary to Jewish beliefs. When an altar was put in the market place in the town of Modin for sacrifice to the Greek god, and Mattathias was the first to be approached.

Though, all the nations that are under the king's dominion obey him, and all fall away from the religion of their fathers, he said, "yet will I and my sons walk according to the ways of our fathers." When one of the Jews stepped out from the crowd that had gathered in the market place, to sacrifice to the Greek god Mattathias killed him, together with the king's officers who stood there.

"Whoever is for G-d follow me", he shouted, and he and his sons fled to the mountains. There he raised a small army and planned to free the Jews from the Greek influence and the rule of Antiochus. The Jews won great victories under the leadership of Judah Maccabees who replaced his aged father and the sons returned to Jerusalem.

When the Maccabees saw the Temple desecrated by Greek idols, their hearts bled, they did not lose courage and replaced the old vessels with new ones. As a final touch, they had to light the Menorah.

By law the "Menorah" was to be kept burning in the Temple continuously. Oil that was initially prepared was used to insure its purity. This oil was put into containers that were marked with the seal of the High Priest. When the Maccabees searched for the oil, they found a small cruse which contained only enough oil for one day. They put it into the Menorah and hoped for the best. In the meantime they prepared new oil. The process took eight days. To their surprise, the oil in the Menorah, lasted miraculously for eight days. They rededicated the Temple on the 25th day of Kisleiv in the year 165 B.C.E.

Not only did the Jews win a victory over Antiochus, but more over, they won a victory over themselves. It took a Mattathias to teach them that the right way is the way of the Torah, as only the Torah can preserve our Jewish people. Our Sages tell us to display their Chanukkah "menorahs" at the window to remind all to see the Chanukkah story. In the present this display shows all who see it that we are proud of our Jewish heritage.

<u>The Menorah</u> We light and display each night, a model "menorah" of remembrance of the Chanukkah holiday. We begin with one candle and add one candle each night, bringing it to a total of eight candles on the eighth night of the holiday. The "menorah" is lit by a special lighting candle called a "shamash". It is positioned a little higher in the "menorah" to show that it is not part of the Chanukkah candles. The candles are put into the menorah from right to left. The candle on the extreme right is put in on othe first night. Each night a new candle is added on that side. In lighting the "menorah", however, we go from left to right. The newest candle is first lit and followed by the second newest and so on.

The "menorah" should be lit in the evening after the "Ma'ariv" service. The candles should burn for at least half an hour. At their lighting the entire families presents are necessary to witness the "Mitzvah". On the first night of Chanukkah the following three blessings are recited before lighting the candles: The first blessing indicates the fulfillment of the "mitzvah", the second thanks G-d for enabling us to reach this holiday in health and happiness. After the first night only the first two blessings are recited. Each household must light its own "menorah".

On Friday eve, the Chanukkah "menorah" must be lit before the Sabbath candles. Had the Sabbath candles been lit first, it would not have been permissible to light the Chanukkah candles, since the Sabbath would have already been officially accepted. On Sabbath night the "Havdalah" is recited to officially end the Sabbath and then the menorah is lit.

Additional Prayers On Chanukkah a special prayer is added to the "Shmoneh Esrei" thanking G-d for the miracles he performed for our ancestors at that time. It is also included in the "Grace After Meals" that is called "Al Hanissim". In addition to this prayer the "Hallel" is recited during the "Shacharis" service every day of Chanukkah. The Torah is also read in the synagogue after the "Shacharis" service.
