What you need to know about this year's cold and flu season

September 23rd marked the first official day of fall. Many of us enjoy all the wonderful things that fall has to offer: the beautiful changing leaves and fall colors; picking pumpkins and apples; football games; and cooler weather. But fall also brings us the official start of the respiratory illness, and cold and flu season.

Anyone can get a respiratory virus or infection, but some people have a higher risk of getting very sick from it. Certain respiratory viruses, like the ones that cause COVID-19, influenza, and respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) infection, are more likely than others to make people very sick. Whether or not you're at higher risk, you can use strategies and tools to lower your chances of catching or spreading a respiratory virus and lower your likelihood of getting very sick if you do catch one.

Vaccinations are the safest way to build immunity from a virus or disease and remain the best protection against potentially serious outcomes of the illness. The CDC recommends that everyone six months and older get an updated COVID-19 vaccine and receive a seasonal flu vaccine. The CDC also recommends that all infants younger than 8 months and adults 60 and older receive an RSV vaccine. While getting vaccinated this season significantly reduces the chance of contracting these viruses, it does not guarantee that you will not, as viruses are always evolving. Vaccines, however, significantly reduce the severity of the illness and reduce the risk of hospitalization. This is the first fall and winter season in which vaccines are available for all three viruses responsible for the most hospitalizations. We have more tools and resources than ever to prevent the worst outcomes from these illnesses.

Tips for staying healthy this season

While vaccines provide the best method to prevent the spread of respiratory illnesses, there are additional ways to keep healthy this fall and winter season.

- Handwashing with soap removes most germs, including respiratory viruses from your hands. Avoid touching your eyes and mouth as much as possible. Using hand sanitizer and daily sanitizing frequently touched surfaces can also be very effective in killing the germs that cause illness.
- Remember to socially distance 6 feet in social places. Viral particles are airborne and are more easily spread indoors than outdoors. Opening windows

- when possible and replacing air filters can reduce the amount of virus you are exposed to.
- Masking is still recommended, particularly in crowded spaces, and can help reduce the number of germs
 you breathe in. Always use a mask during personal respiratory illness to help protect others from
 becoming ill.
- Stay hydrated, get plenty of rest, and take your vitamins. Your body has a much better chance of warding off illness when it has what it needs to stay healthy.

If you have symptoms of a respiratory virus, there are tests that can help determine which virus you may have and can help to guide your treatment and prevention actions, like physical spacing and mask use. COVID-19 tests are widely available over the counter and from community testing sites. The CDC (ICATT) Increasing Community Access to Testing program will continue to provide no-cost COVID-19 testing for uninsured people that are symptomatic or exposed. A list of no-cost testing sites can be found on the CDC COVID-19 Testing Locator website. Your healthcare provider can help advise you on getting tested for flu, RSV, or other respiratory viruses.

The truth about vaccines

There are many myths circulating. Vaccines go through scrupulous testing before being released by the CDC and FDA. None of the COVID-19 vaccines contain ingredients like preservatives, tissues (such as aborted fetal cells), antibiotics, food proteins, medicines, latex, or metals. The flu vaccine and COVID vaccine have been administered to millions of people over the last few years. Vaccines contain weakened or inactive parts of a particular organism, the (antigen), that triggers an immune response within the body. Newer vaccines contain the blueprint for producing antigens rather than the antigen itself. Vaccines train your immune system to recognize and fight specific viruses and bacteria, the (pathogen).

Different types of vaccines work in different ways to offer protection. But with all types of vaccines, the body is left with a supply of "memory" T-lymphocytes as well as B-lymphocytes that will remember how to fight the virus or bacteria in the future. With the help of vaccines, your body's immune system is incredibly smart in building immunity and resistance to pathogens.

Sometimes after vaccination, the process of building immunity can cause symptoms, such as fever that may mimic an illness. These symptoms are normal signs the body is building immunity. Vaccines <u>do not</u> cause you to get influenza or COVID. You are best protected when you stay up to date with recommended vaccines. Vaccinations can protect you as an individual, but its benefits are communal. The more people within a community who are vaccinated against an infectious disease or virus, the fewer who are susceptible to the disease or virus, and, as a result, are much less likely to spread it. Building a healthy community is important.

INFLUENZA

The recommended timing of flu vaccine is between September and October. The CDC has recommended annual vaccination for everyone six months and older since 2010. Flu viruses are constantly changing. How well the flu vaccine works can depend, in part, on the match between the vaccine viruses and circulating viruses. Last season people who were vaccinated against the flu were about 40 to 70% <u>less</u> likely to be hospitalized with related complications. Even when flu vaccination does not prevent illness entirely, it has been shown in several studies to reduce severity of illness in people who get vaccinated but still get sick.

COVID -19

The CDC recommends everyone six months and older get an updated COVID-19 vaccine to protect against the potentially serious outcomes of COVID-19 illness this fall and winter. Updated COVID-19 vaccines from Pfizer-BioNTech and Moderna were available this year in mid September. Just like influenza, the virus that causes COVID -19 is always changing, and protection from previous vaccines declines over time. Receiving an updated COVID-19 vaccine can restore protection and provide enhanced protection against the variants currently responsible for most infections and hospitalizations in the United States. Last season, those who received a 2022-2023 COVID-19 vaccine saw greater protection against illness and fewer hospitalizations than those that did not receive the vaccine. To date, hundreds of millions of people have safely received the vaccine. If you have not received a COVID-19 vaccine in the past 2 months, get an updated COVID-19 vaccine to protect yourself this fall and winter. For those that are immunocompromised, or have not previously received a COVID-19 vaccination, please refer to your healthcare provider for the number of recommended doses.

Most people can still get a COVID-19 vaccine for free. For people with health insurance, most plans will cover the COVID-19 vaccine at no cost to you. People who don't have health insurance or with health plans that do not cover the cost, can get a free vaccine from their local health departments, and pharmacies participating in the CDC's Bridge Access Program. Children eligible for the Vaccines for Children program also may receive the vaccine from a provider enrolled in that program.

RSV

Respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) is a common respiratory virus that usually causes mild, cold-like symptoms. However, it can be dangerous for babies, toddlers, and older adults. In fact, RSV is the leading reason that babies are hospitalized in the United States. In August 2023, the CDC recommended a new RSV immunization called Nirsevimab to protect babies and some toddlers from severe RSV during the RSV season. It has been shown to reduce the risk of both RSV-related hospitalizations and healthcare visits in infants by about 80 percent. In July 2023, the CDC recommended RSV vaccine Arexvy or Abrysvo for adults ages 60 and over, particularly with underlying heart and lung conditions and for those that are immunocompromised, using shared clinical decision-making. Each year, between 60,000 and 160,000 older adults in the United States are hospitalized for RSV. The CDC also recommended an RSV vaccine for people who are 32-36 weeks pregnant to protect their babies from severe RSV. These new vaccines have been highly effective in reducing the risk of developing RSV-related lower respiratory tract disease by over 80% in their first fall/winter RSV season. Please consult your healthcare provider to decide if the RSV vaccine is right for you. We now have more tools and resources than ever to protect our communities and the public from potentially serious and life-threatening respiratory illnesses and viruses. This is the first season where vaccines are available for all three viruses responsible for most hospitalizations – COVID-19, RSV, and flu. In addition to safe, updated vaccines, at-home tests for the virus can identify infection so you can protect your family, coworkers, and the public. If you do get sick, talk to your doctor about proven, effective treatments that can reduce the risk of severe illness, hospitalization, and death.

How and where can I get my vaccines?

Please contact your primary care provider or local pharmacy to schedule your appointment today. Many

pharmacies now offer walk in clinics and are able to bill your insurance. This year the COVID vaccine has been commercialized and is no longer free to the public unless there are extenuating circumstances (see below). It is safe to receive the influenza and COVID vaccine at the same time.

The Influenza vaccine is available at Division of Health at Columbia County Health and Human Services.

Please see the criteria below:

- If you have Quartz insurance through Columbia County, we will be able to bill insurance and there will be no cost to you. We are also able to vaccinate family members who have Quartz Insurance through Columbia County if they are over the age of 8.
- If you have **Medicare**, we will be able to bill insurance as well and there is **no cost to you**.
- Children (less than 18) can receive the Flu vaccine if they have Badgercare, no insurance or are underinsured at no cost to you.
- If you have any other insurance, and would like to get the vaccine with us, there will be a \$40.00 charge.

COVID Boosters are available at Division of Health at Columbia County Health and Human Services.

Please see the criteria below:

- Children (less than 18) can receive the COVID vaccine if they have Badgercare, no insurance or are underinsured at **no cost to you**.
- Adults can receive the COVID vaccine if they have no insurance, or are underinsured (meaning your
 insurance carrier will not cover the cost of the vaccine) at no cost to you. These vaccines are covered
 under the Bridge Access Program.

Children's Long-Term Support Program

Supports and Services at a Glance

The supports and services below are available through the Children's Long-Term Support (CLTS) Program. All decisions made about supports and services are made together as a team.

A support and service coordinator will work with your family to decide which services help meet your family and child's unique goals.

Support Services

Child care

Help for your family to find care for the child when they need added support, or when the child is over 12 years old and needs supervision.

Day services

Services that help the child get involved in their own community by providing regularly scheduled activities for part of the day.

Respite care

A short term break for your family when a trained worker provides care for the child. Respite care helps ease daily stress the family and caregivers.

Personal supports

Help that ensures the child is doing their daily activities, and that the activities are meeting their needs. Personal supports promote independence and safety for the child in their home and community.

(i) Example: Help to take their own medication, use transportation, and do household tasks

Community competitive/integrated employment

Help for a child to get and maintain a job in the community that is available to anyone else and pays the same amount.

Transportation

Transportation for the child so they can get to places in their community to meet their goals and needs. This is for nonmedical and nonemergency transportation.

(i) Example: Bus tickets, train passes, taxi vouchers, ride-share

Participant and family-directed goods and services

Services, supports, and items that help the child meet a goal, and which your family cannot get through another CLTS Program service or Medicaid.

Discovery and career planning

Help for a child to develop skills to get a job.

(i) Example: Interviewing skills, how to dress for an interview



Teaching and Skills Development

Empowerment and self-determination supports

Help for the child and your family to learn new skills and get training for the child to be more independent in their community.

(i) Example: Courses, conferences, books, educational materials

Counseling and therapeutic services

Supports and services that improve the health and well-being of the child.

(i) Example: Music, art, therapy using equine movement

Daily living skills training

Help for the child to build skills so they can do everyday activities by themselves.

(i) Example: Personal hygiene, food preparation, money management

Mentorino

Help for the child to build skills so they can interact and play with friends and be active in their community.

(i) Example: Peer interactions, job skill building

Family/Unpaid caregiver supports and services

Support for parents and caregivers to learn new skills and boost the child's development and independence.

(i) Example: Caregiver mentoring, conferences, resource materials, online training

Health and wellness

Services that help maintain or improve the health, wellbeing, socialization, and inclusion of the child with their family and peers in the community.

(i) Example: Yoga, meditation, sexual education

Safety planning and prevention

Items or services that reduce risk or danger to help keep the child safe in their homes and communities. This includes planning and training as well as items.

(i) Example: De-escalation training, lock boxes for medication or knives

Grief and bereavement counseling

Help for the child and/or your family to cope with the possible death of the child and supports your family after the child's death.

Management and Coordination

Community integration services

Coordination that helps the child and your family create personalized services and supports.

Participant and family-direction broker services


Help for the child and your family to direct your own CLTS Program services and supports.

Financial management services

Help for your family to manage CLTS Program services and funding.

(i) Example: Scheduling and paying self-directed workers for services



Physical Aids

Assistive technology

Services and items that improve the child's ability to do tasks at home, at work, and in the community.

(i) Example: Service animal, memory aid

Communication assistance for community inclusion

Communication aids that help the child with hearing, speech, communication, or vision.

(i) Example: Speech amplification devices, electronic devices

Personal emergency response system

Items or services that provide immediate response and help in the event of an emergency.

(i) Example: Angel Sense, Life Alert

Specialized medical and therapeutic supplies

Medical and therapeutic supplies that help the child with everyday activities, manage a medical condition, and increase independence in their home and community.

(i) Example: Specialized clothing, hygiene wipes, lotions

Vehicle modifications

Changes to a vehicle to help keep the child safe, get in and out of the vehicle, and travel with your family.

(i) Example: A ramp to load a wheelchair into a van

Virtual equipment and supports

Items that allow the child and your family to get CLTS services that are delivered remotely.

(i) Example: Tablets, computers, software

Housing Related

Adult family home

Treatment, supports, and services for young adults living in a licensed adult family home up to the age of 22.

Children's foster care

Supports and services for children in foster care.

Housing support services

Guidance and services for the child and your family to get and keep safe housing based on your preferences.

(i) Example: Searching for housing, filling out a housing application, coaching on how to rent

Home modifications

Changes to your home that make it easier and safer for the child to enter and exit your home and rooms and access equipment within the home.

(i) Example: Fences, ramps, lifts, door handles, shower modifications


Relocation services

Items for the child when moving to a less restrictive living environment or moving out of your family's home to a more independent setting.

(i) Example: Furnishings, household supplies, security deposit

Wisconsin Birth to 3 Program **Services at a Glance**

The early intervention supports and services below are available through the Birth to 3 Program. All services are based on the individual goals and outcomes of your family and child. Decisions about services are made together as a team, and put your family and the child first.

You will partner with a service coordinator, who will help you locate and coordinate needed services and supports. All services are provided and funded based on federal requirements. The Birth to 3 Program allows you to access services that help you meet your goals and outcomes, no matter what the funding source is.

Early intervention services help the child learn, interact, and thrive at home, in child care, and during other everyday activities. Learning and growing happens in the places your family spends time and during activities the child finds fun and engaging. The Birth to 3 Program provides services where you are every day. This helps the child develop and practice new skills in the places they will use them.



Primary Services

Service Coordination

Helps your family and child access early intervention services and understand your rights. Service coordinators schedule evaluations, help create the service plan, and connect you with what you need.

Special Education

Engages the child in activities that support their learning and development. This includes ideas that help them grow, learn, play, and get along with others. Individualized strategies are shared to help the child's learning, skills, and overall development.

Occupational Therapy

Helps the child build new skills by practicing day-to-day activities. These new skills will help them play, move, and interact with the world around them. These services help increase the child's ability to take part in daily routines and activities at home, in the community, and other places your family spends time.

Physical Therapy

Helps support the child's physical and muscle development. This helps them move, play, and participate in day-to-day activities. Physical therapy services also help reduce pain and prevent or minimize physical disabilities.

Speech and Language Services


Help the child understand and use language. Speech services include identifying concerns and finding activities that can strengthen muscles so the child can make clear speech sounds. Speech services might also help the child use a speech device and refer them to medical or other professional services when necessary.

Additional Services

Hearing Services

Support to improve the child's learning, communication, and interactions with others. This includes training and prevention. Hearing services help identify if the child has hearing impairments, the degree of hearing loss, and will make referrals for medical and other services when necessary.

Sign Language and Cued Language Services

Help a child learn to communicate in a way that works for them. These services help your family and child use sign language, cued language (handshapes that stand for different sounds), or spoken language. You can also access interpretation and transliteration services (such as amplification).

Vision Services

Help a child with visual impairments learn, play, interact with others, communicate, find their way around, and move safely in the places they spend time. This is called mobility training. Mobility training increases the child's participation in your family's daily routines and activities. These services also include visual and other training that help with hand-eye coordination.

Family Training, Counseling, and Home Visits

Help your family understand the special needs of the child and enhance the child's development.

Social Work Services

Help find and connect you with community resources and services that can help you make the most of early intervention. These services are based on your family's needs or interests. You might be connected with educational or financial resources, parenting supports, family counseling, or other local resources.

Transportation and Related Costs

Fund travel and other activities that are needed to help your family and child get early intervention services.

Physical Aids

Assistive Technology Devices

Help the child increase, maintain, or improve skills. Examples include communications devices, ankle or foot orthotics, and gait trainers.

Assistive Technology Services

Help your family select, get, and use an assistive technology device.



Medical and Other Services

Health Services

Help a child benefit from other early intervention services. Examples include clean intermittent catheterization, tracheostomy care, tube feeding, changing dressings or colostomy collection bags, and other health services.

Nursing Services

Help your family and child respond to current or potential health problems. These services also provide nursing care to prevent health problems, restore or improve functioning, promote good health and development, and administer medications and treatments prescribed by a licensed physician.

Nutrition Services


Help the child with nutrition recommendations, feeding skills and feeding programs, food habits, and preferences.

Psychological Services

Support the child's mental health, social emotional development, and learning. This includes counseling for you (the parent or caregiver) and the child, family counseling, consultation on child development, parent training, and education programs.

Other Intervention Services

Qualified providers support the child's early learning, growth, and development or your family's individualized needs.



Each family in the **Birth to 3 Program** is provided a service coordinator. The service coordinator works in partnership with families, helping them find supports and services that meet their needs. Coordinators meet with families at their homes or other places that may be comfortable or convenient for the family. Coordinators get to know families by asking questions and hearing about what is important to the family and their child. A trusting relationship between the service coordinator and the family they're helping is important. Coordinators provide information about the team and help answer questions families might have.

As we all navigate this world putting COVID-19 in the rearview mirror and try to negotiate the new reality of inflation and higher prices on everything from groceries to home goods, there are those among us who will need extra help with the upcoming holidays. Thankfully, Health & Human Services (HHS) works routinely with all kinds of different community groups who support our mission and who work tirelessly to help those in need.

Resources to Watch For:

Quilting, crocheting, knitting, and sewing groups in the community will soon be dropping off handmade items at HHS to distribute. HHS routinely receives hats, mittens, scarves, and blankets to share with residents in need, and we make those items available in our waiting room. We ask that people only take what they need. We have a policy of 1 blanket per person so that we can make these donations go further. We also stress that hats are not to be tried on before they are chosen.

Many communities in Columbia County coordinate Caring Trees during the holidays to help families with presents for children. Watch for a Caring Tree program in your community to either support during the holidays or to register with if you need help.

HHS also works with a number of community groups, churches, and individuals who coordinate holiday food baskets for those in need, both at Thanksgiving and during the Christmas holidays. Protect yourself from FoodShare fraud

FoodShare benefits continue to be a target for fraud. FoodShare fraud can result in you losing the monies in your account, which prevents you from being able to buy food until those monies are replenished. Therefore, it is important that you take steps to protect your identify and your benefits. Learn more about protecting your benefits.



Be aware of scams

Never give details about yourself or your finances to people you don't know. Scammers might contact you over the phone. If you aren't sure who you're talking to, hang up. They might send you text messages or emails. They might even knock on your door. If you don't know them, don't respond or follow any web links. Call your agency or ForwardHealth Member Services at 800-362-3002 if you think someone is trying to scam you.

The Federal Trade Commission is the nation's consumer protection agency. They know scam artists want to steal your identity. Scammers want to use your credit cards and checking account. They might open a new credit card, checking, or savings account, write bad checks, or take out loans in your name. You can <u>file a complaint</u> with the <u>Federal Trade Commission</u>, or call 877-FTC-HELP. If you think your identity has been stolen, report it on the Federal Trade Commission website, or call 877-ID-THEFT.

Report fraud

The misuse of public funds affects each person who lives in Wisconsin. All individuals are encouraged to report suspected fraud, waste, and abuse to the Office of Inspector General (OIG) at 877-865-3432 or online. The OIG's mission is to protect Wisconsin taxpayers by tracking and prevent fraud, waste, and abuse in public assistance programs administered by DHS. Learn more about the OIG.

Public charge rule

A noncitizen's immigration status will not be affected by receiving health care, food, housing, and many other government benefits. The only government benefits that could affect immigration status are cash assistance (SSI and W-2) and institutional long-term care paid for by Medicaid. Public benefits received by children and pregnant women will not impact their parents' or spouse's immigration status. If you need help affording food or paying for medical care, applying for, or getting FoodShare or BadgerCare Plus will not have any impact on your immigration status. The information provided is in accordance with 8 C.F.R. 103, 212, 213, and 245.

A "public charge" is someone who the government believes is likely to become dependent on the government for basic needs. Public charge is part of immigration policy that can impact some noncitizens' ability to gain entry to the United States or get a green card.



BadgerCare Plus Prenatal Plan

The BadgerCare Plus Prenatal Plan provides health care for pregnant women who have been denied BadgerCare Plus because of their immigration or citizenship status or who are in prison or jail.

Covered Benefits

This plan covers services such as:

- Prenatal care.
- Doctor and clinic visits.
- Prescription drugs (including prenatal vitamins).
- Labor and delivery.

You may be able to enroll if you meet all of the following:

- You live in Wisconsin.
- You have family income at or below the monthly income limit listed under Income Limits for 2023.
- You do not have insurance or access to an employer-sponsored health insurance plan for which the employer pays 80% or more of the monthly premium.

Note: If you are not a U.S. citizen or you are an undocumented immigrant, a Social Security number is not required. Information about your family will not be shared with the United States Citizenship and Immigration Services.

How to Apply

You can apply for the BadgerCare Plus Prenatal Plan online at <u>access.wisconsin.gov</u>, by phone, in person at your local agency, or by completing a paper application and mailing it to your local agency. To get a paper application, to ask for help completing the application, or to find your local agency, go to <u>www.dhs.wisconsin.gov/forwardhealth/resources.htm</u> or contact Member Services at 800-362-3002.

It is important to apply as soon as possible since the date you can start getting benefits is the first of the month in which you apply and meet all plan rules.

If You Are Not Eligible

If you are not able to get benefits through the BadgerCare Plus Prenatal Plan, and you are not a U.S. citizen or you are an undocumented immigrant, you can apply for the Emergency Services Plan. The Emergency Services Plan will only cover labor and delivery costs.

A Recipe for Good Health



Work Registration Requirements for FoodShare Applicants and Members Ages 16 Through 59

What are the work registration requirements?

Federal law requires FoodShare applicants and members that are ages 16 through 59 to register for work. You will be registered for work at the time you are determined eligible for FoodShare unless you meet an exemption. If you do not comply with the work registration requirements, or meet an exemption, you will not be able to get FoodShare benefits for a period of time. This is called a sanction period.

If you need to comply with the work registration requirements, you must:

- Register for work when you apply for FoodShare and every 12 months after that.
- Provide us with your employment status or ability to work
- Not voluntarily and without good cause quit a job of 30 or more hours per week (or a job with earnings equal to 30 or more hours per week at the federal minimum wage).
- Not reduce your work hours to less than 30 per week (or your weekly earnings to less than 30 times the federal minimum wage).
- Accept a suitable job offer, if you are offered a job.
- Meet the unemployment compensation program work requirements if you applied for or are getting unemployment benefits.
- Meet the Wisconsin Works (W-2) program work requirements if you are taking part in W-2.

What are the exemptions from the work registration requirements?

You meet an exemption from the work registration requirements if **any** of the following are true:

- You are 16 or 17 years old and are not the primary person in the FoodShare group.
- You are 16 or 17 years old and are the primary person in the FoodShare group but are enrolled in school or in an employment and training program at least half-time.
- You are found to be unfit for work. This applies if:
 - You get temporary or permanent disability benefits from the government or a private source.
 - You are found to be mentally or physically unable to work by your agency.
 - You are verified as unable to work by a statement from a health care professional or social worker.
- You are enrolled in W-2 and complying with the W-2 work requirements.
- You are the primary caregiver for a dependent child younger than age 6 (whether the child lives in your home or out of your home). However, if you and another person both have parental control of the child, only one of you can be exempt from the work registration requirements as the primary caregiver of that child.
- You are the primary caregiver for another person who cannot care for himself or herself (whether the person lives in your home or out of your home).

Wisconsin Department of Health Services

- You have applied for or are receiving unemployment compensation.
- You are regularly taking part in an alcohol or other drug abuse treatment or rehabilitation program.
- You are working 30 or more hours per week or earning wages equal to 30 or more hours per week at the federal minimum wage.
- You are enrolled at least half-time in a recognized school, training program, or institution of higher education.

You may need to provide proof to your agency if you meet one of these exemptions.

What if I do not comply with the work registration requirements and do not meet an exemption?

If you do not comply with the work registration requirements and you do not meet an exemption, you will not be able to get FoodShare benefits for a specified sanction period. This includes if you voluntarily and without good cause do any of the following:

- Turn down a suitable job offer.
- Quit a job of 30 or more hours per week (or a job with earnings equal to 30 or more hours per week at the federal minimum wage).
- Reduce your work hours to less than 30 hours per week (or your earnings to less than 30 times the federal minimum wage).
- Take part in W-2 but do not meet the W-2 program work requirements.
- Apply for or get unemployment benefits but do not meet the unemployment compensation program work requirements.

What if I lose an exemption?

If you lose an exemption, then you must meet the work registration requirements. If you lose one of the following exemptions without good cause, you will not be able to get FoodShare benefits for a specified sanction period, unless you have another exemption:

- You are enrolled in W-2 and complying with the W-2 work requirement.
- You have applied for or are receiving unemployment compensation.

 You are working 30 or more hours per week or earning wages equal to 30 or more hours per week at the federal minimum wage.

How long is a sanction period?

The length of a sanction period depends on which occurrence it is.

- The first sanction period is one month long.
- A second sanction period is three months long.
- A third or subsequent sanction period is six months long.

Can I end a sanction period early?

You can end a sanction period early if you become exempt from the work registration requirements.

Once my sanction period ends, how do I get FoodShare again?

You will need to reapply. If you are part of a FoodShare group, you will need to let your worker know to update your case instead of having to reapply.

What does good cause mean?

Good cause means there is a situation beyond your control that prevents you from meeting the work registration requirements. If you do not have good cause, you may not be able to get FoodShare benefits for the specified sanction period. If you have good cause, you will be able to continue to get FoodShare benefits. Your worker will consider your situation to determine if there was good cause.

Some examples of reasons for good cause are:

- You did not accept a job offer, or you quit a job, because the job was not suitable.
- You were fired or guit at the employer's demand.
- You were discriminated against by an employer based on your age, race, sex, color, handicap, religious beliefs, national origin, or political beliefs.
- You left your job for another job, training, or school.
- You were not able to continue a job because you moved.

- Your personal health problems, or the health problems of others, did not allow you to continue your job.
- Your job hours were reduced by your employer without your permission.
- You quit a job to join a volunteer program such as AmeriCorps or AmeriCorps VISTA.
- You did not have transportation to get to the job.
- There were other situations beyond your control that the agency feels was good cause.

Meet our Foster Care Coordinator!





Foster Care



Interested in Becoming a Foster Parent?

Columbia County Health and Human Services is actively seeking foster parents interested in providing a safe, stable, and loving home for children of all ages both long and short-term. Adolescents (ages 8-17) are in the greatest need of individuals/families to care for them.

Foster parents provide a temporary home for children until they can be safely reunited with biological family or reach another form of permanency, such as adoption or guardianship.

To become a foster parent, you must meet all of the following:

- Be 21 years of age or older
- Be a responsible adult
- Complete a criminal background check
- Home must meet all physical environment requirements
- Complete a home study through multiple home visits with the Foster Care Coordinator

Trainings are provided for families committed to becoming licensed foster homes. Foster parents are compensated through a monthly payment that is calculated based on the needs of each specific child.

There is no minimum income requirement for foster parents, as long as they can take care of family expenses outside of the reimbursement received for fostering.

Safety Planning Guide for Natural Supports

Background

Natural supports are integral to keeping children in their homes and in their communities. Children and families can be supported by many different people, regardless of biological connection. Including and supporting a family's natural supports as part of local Child Protective Services (CPS) agency's intervention is an essential component of our state's vision of Putting Families First. One way to assist natural supports is to offer targeted training regarding their role in the CPS helping process and how they assist in keeping children safely with their families. This resource helps to accomplish that by providing comprehensive information that is easily accessible.

This resource was informed with input from various stakeholders, including those with lived experience. Using that feedback allowed this resource to specifically target the most important questions natural supports may have. This resource is available to view online (link) via a QR code and is organized by subject into 4 separate chapters. It was created with the intention that natural supports could view the content efficiently on any device and skip around to whichever subjects they want to learn more about at their convenience. The content in this resource is also available to view and print if needed.

Benefits of Supporting Natural Supports and Talking Points for CPS professionals

- Reduce unnecessary and traumatic out-of-home care placements
- Provides natural supports with information and support at any time
- Helps support CPS professionals in explaining the CPS process and aspects of safety planning with families
- Highlights the need to identify and practice self-care
- Provides information on possible child behaviors and reactions
- Gives natural supports tips and tricks on how and when to communicate with the assigned CPS professional

- -Discussion on custodial services for the Village. Budgeted an amount for 2024 and putting out bids/interest
- -Discussion on general outlay accounts; highlighted computer system outlay and public works equipment. Discussion on taking front-end loader out of budget for 2024. Holiday During Vacation:



Director of Public Works/Utilities Manager

Position Summary

The Director of Public Works/Utilities Manager position is a full time, salaried appointed position under the general supervision and direction of the Village President and the Village Board.

The Director of Public Works/Utilities Manager shall be appointed by a majority vote of the Village Board solely on the bases of merit, training, experience, administrative ability, efficiency and general qualifications for performing the duties of the position. This position plans, organizes, directs and supervises the Department of Public Works/Utilities.

Functions includes the management of the streets, sidewalks, building maintenance, parks, storm sewer, sanitary sewer, water distribution, electric utility, dam facilities, hydro-electric dam, wastewater treatment pond lagoon system, refuse collection & recycling, contracted services, vehicle maintenance, weed commissioner, forester, engineering and all other public works projects and programs.

Essential Duties and Responsibilities

- 1. The following duties are normal for this position. These are not to be construed as all-inclusive; other duties may be required and assigned.
- 2. General charge and supervision of all streets, sidewalks, as well as Water, Storm-Sewer, Wastewater and Electric utilities in the Village and the employees of those departments.
- 3. Responsible for the maintenance, repair and operations of public infrastructure including: maintenance of Village equipment and maintenance, repair of streets, and both surface/sub-surface infrastructure (i.e. storm water structures, force-mains, etc.)
- 4. Maintenance of all Village buildings and properties, to include parks, water towers, wells, the waste water treatment plant, electric sub-stations, lift stations, yard waste site and a material storage site.
- 5. Produce required regulatory reports and ensure compliance with regulatory requirements, law codes and enforcement factors (PSC/DNR, etc.)
- 6. Produce and finalize the PSC Annual Audit Report and work closely with the Village auditor.
- 7. Perform rate cases as needed or suggested by the auditor and approved by the Pardeeville Public Utilities Commission.
- 8. Responsible for the supervision of snow removal, street cleaning, pest control and other activities as designated by the Village Board.
- 9. Serves as the Village Weed Commissioner and Village Forester.
- 10. Inventory and manage all trees within the Village's Right-of-Ways.
- 11. Reviews, recommends and supervises all Village construction and maintenance projects. Solicits bids, analyzes bids, negotiates bids, and recommends awarding of bids or construction projects.
- 12. Reviews and references the Village ordinances for projects as required by Village Code and/or Wisconsin State Statutes (building codes, zoning codes, etc.).
- 13. Coordinate with the Village engineers to prepare, or assists, with the preparation of plans, specifications, and bid documents for Capital Improvement projects or other projects as directed by the Village Board.
- 14. Develop and administer a 5-year operational plan for Streets/Utilities, 5-year Capital improvement plan for the Public Works/Utility departments.

- 15. Develop and maintain a 10-year vehicle replacement plan.
- 16. Assist and cooperate with local community clubs, groups, and organizations for the betterment of the village.
- 17. Attend Village Board, Plan Commission, Public Utility Commission, Finance & Personnel, Public Works, and Parks & Property Meetings unless excused by the Village President. Attend other Boards, Commissions and/or Committees at the direction of the Village President or Village Board.
- 18. Represent the Village at meetings and conferences.

Personnel Duties

- 1. Responsible for the administrative direction, coordination and training of all employees of the Public Works/Utilities according to the Village's established organizational procedures.
- 2. Annually evaluates the performance of all Public Works/Utility employees.
- 3. Consults with the Village President or Village Board regarding the appointment, promotion, discipline, suspension or termination of employees.
- 4. Act as safety compliance officer for the Public Works and Utilities departments. Ensure that all Public Works/Utility operations are carried out using industry best practices.
- 5. Ensure safety training is being completed for Public Works/Utilities employees as required (AED, CPR, Hearing tests, etc.).

Budgeting and Purchasing Duties for Public Works

- 1. Be responsible, under the direction of the Village Board, for the timely accumulation of all information required for the department of public works and utilities.
- 2. Works directly with the Clerk/Treasurer in preparation and compilation of the annual budget.
- 3. Administer and manage the Public Works and Utility budgets as adopted by the Village Board
- 4. Assist the Clerk/Treasurer with coding of invoices related to Public Works/Utility operations.
- 5. Works directly with the Clerk/Treasurer with securing contracts and bids for various projects.

Education and Skill Requirements

- 1. Minimum of a high school diploma with 3-5 years relevant work experience.
- 2. Bachelor's degree in Civil Engineering, public or business administration, project management or a related field is preferred, but not required.
- 3. Specialized training and ability to obtain and maintain required licenses and certifications, as required.
- 4. Must possess a valid WI driver's license.
- 5. General use of computers/software.
- 6. Pass a drug test/physical exam.
- 7. Ability to maintain confidentiality of all Village of Pardeeville and client-related matters.
- 8. Ability to understand and effectively carry out verbal and written instruction.
- 9. Knowledge of business correspondence format and procedures.
- 10. Ability to work with minimum supervision once the on-the-job training is completed.
- 11. Ability to establish and maintain positive and professional working relationships with the general public and other staff members.
- 12. Dedication, motivation to work cooperatively with co-workers with a positive attitude.

- 13. Must be bondable according to Wisconsin State Statutes.
- 14. Experience and knowledge of activities and specific tasks of all aspects of Public Works/Utilities operations, including but not limited to street operations, sanitary sewer, storm sewer, water and electric.
- 15. General understanding and knowledge of engineering principles and drawings, GIS mapping.
- 16. Experience in the operation of loaders, dump/haul trucks, power/hand tools, chainsaws.
- 17. Understanding of grants and grant application processes. Grant writing experience is a plus.

Physical Requirements

- 1. Ability to lift/carry/push/pull at least 25 pounds
- 2. Frequent bending, lifting, twisting, stretching, squatting, sitting, standing and walking
- 3. Visual acuity
- 4. Ability to hear normal conversation
- 5. Ability to communicate in a clear manner
- 6. Good manual dexterity of hands and fingers
- 7. Operate vehicles, machinery, power tools and hand tools.
- 8. Person must be able to walk, stand, carry, lift, grasp and hold without assistance.
- 9. The wearing of personal protective equipment
- 10. Ability to perform a variety of manual labor tasks in a variety of physical and weather-related environments.

Sec. 2-169. Community development authority.

- (a) Composition. The community development authority shall consist of seven members: five non-village board members and two village board members.
- (b) Appointment and term. The members who are first appointed shall be designated by the village president to service the following terms: For the non-village board members; two for one year and one each for terms of two years, three years and four years from the date of their appointment; thereafter, the term of the office shall be for four years. A member shall hold his office until a successor has been appointed and qualified. Two community development authority members shall be members of the village board and shall serve during their term of office.
- (c) Record. The authority shall keep a written record of its proceedings to include all actions taken, a copy of which shall be filed with the village clerk-treasurer. Four members shall constitute a quorum but all actions shall require the affirmative approval of a majority of all of the members.
- (d) Duties.
 - (1) There exists within the village a need for blight elimination, urban renewal programs, community development projects and housing projects. Therefore, it is desirable to create a community development authority for the purpose of carrying out blight elimination, urban renewal programs, community development projects and housing projects as permitted by state statute, together with all powers necessary or incidental to effect adequate and comprehensive blight elimination and urban renewal programs, community development projects and housing projects.
 - (2) Upon appointment of such an authority, they are hereby authorized to exercise the powers prescribed in Wis. Stats. § 66.1335 and any other applicable statute section.
