"What to do for All in Authority"

With July beginning with the celebration of our nations independence, it is a great time to reflect upon the God's gifts of both civil government and citizens. The Table of Duties in the Small Catechism summarize these gifts by highlighting several Scripture references for living in this world as God's Children.

Table of Duties

Of Civil Government

Romans 13:1–4, "Let every person be subject to the governing authorities. For there is no authority except from God, and those that exist have been instituted by God. ² Therefore whoever resists the authorities resists what God has appointed, and those who resist will incur judgment. For rulers are not a terror to good conduct, but to bad. Would you have no fear of the one who is in authority? Then do what is good, and you will receive his approval, for he is God's servant for your good. But if you do wrong, be afraid, for he does not bear the sword in vain. For he is the servant of God, an avenger who carries out God's wrath on the wrongdoer."

Of Citizens

Matthew 22:21, "Render to Caesar the things that are Caesar's, and to God the things that are God's."

Romans 13:5–7, "Therefore one must be in subjection, not only to avoid God's wrath but also for the sake of conscience. ⁶ For because of this you also pay taxes, for the authorities are ministers of God, attending to this very thing. ⁷ Pay to all what is owed to them: taxes to whom taxes are owed, revenue to whom revenue is owed, respect to whom respect is owed, honor to whom honor is owed."

1 Timothy 2:1–3, "First of all, then, I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for all people, ² for kings and all who are in high positions, that we may lead a peaceful and quiet life, godly and dignified in every way. ³ This is good, and it is pleasing in the sight of God our Savior."

Titus 3:1, "Remind them to be submissive to rulers and authorities, to be obedient, to be ready for every good work."

1 Peter 2:13–14, "Be subject for the Lord's sake to every human institution, whether it be to the emperor as supreme, ¹⁴ or to governors as sent by him to punish those who do evil and to praise those who do good."

This July of 2021 I encourage you to reflect on Paul's words to Timothy, "First of all, then, I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for all people, ² for kings and all who are in high positions, that we may lead a peaceful and quiet life, godly and dignified in every way. ³ This is good, and it is pleasing in the sight of God our Savior." (1 Timothy 2:1–2)

"They are all a bunch of crooks." All of us have heard people say that of our government officials. You yourself may have even uttered these or similar words. Surveys show that people in our land do not trust their government. On television broadcasts, we have heard people in other lands express the same opinion.

We also know how difficult it is for some children to submit to parental authority. If you are a teen, or if you remember when you were, you must admit that you chafed under parental authority. When a clash of wills occurs, teens feel animosity for their parents.

Because the concept of individual freedom is so strong in our society, many find it difficult to be subject to authority. Even in the workplace some people resent being told what to do.

Who Are Those for Whom We Should Pray? God's Word makes it very clear—all people, and for all who are in high positions.

Given the ever escalating and scathing political remarks, genuine prayer for another of a political stripe may prove difficult. You may find it an arduous and often unfruitful task to pray for someone who holds to a different position than you an one or many issues. However, God calls us to pray for the leader of the land, no matter who fills the office. Christians, who believe that God sent His Son to die for all, have a higher reason to pray. Out of love for God, generated by His undeserved love for us, we gladly pray for the spiritual welfare of others, especially those who hold high influential positions—presidents and governors.

Yet, there are many others in authority. There are the members of Congress, federal judges, and other national, state, and local leaders. We are to intercede also for them, and it makes no difference to which political party they belong.

In the state and local governments, the mayor, justices of the peace, and local representatives are among those for whom we pray. The police officer who stops you for a traffic violation is worthy of your respect and prayers. God commands, "Be subject for the Lord's sake to every human institution" (1 Pet 2:13).

Parents have been given authority over their children. "Children, obey your parents in the Lord, for this is right" (Eph 6:1). All of us know that children do not always find it easy to obey, particularly teenagers.

Our Savior understands that. He experienced all the stages of life, including the teen years. He became our substitute, obeying God's will in being subject to all authority. The righteousness necessary for eternal life has been earned for us by Christ in all stages of life. God's Word assures us that in Christ we have the righteousness of God (2 Cor 5:21).

1 Timothy uses the important word, the plural "kings," indicating that we are to pray for the rulers in other countries as well. "There is no authority except from God, and those that exist have been instituted by God" (Rom 13:1), and Jesus said, "Render to Caesar the things that are Caesar's, and to God the things that are God's" (Mk 12:17). God's grace extends toward all people in all places. God so loved the world that He sacrificed His Son, Jesus, for all.

What if the ruler is a tyrant or a dictator? Are we to pray for such an authority also? The two phrases in our text, "all people" and "all," allow for no exceptions; they include everyone who has been placed by God in a position of authority. The criteria for deciding if we should pray for a certain person in authority is not whether we like them or whether we feel they deserve our prayers. In God's sight, outside of Christ there are no good people. All have sinned. All deserve nothing but punishment and eternal damnation. Yet God is good to all—"He makes His sun rise on the evil and on the good, and sends rain on the just and on the unjust" (Mt 5:45).

John the Baptist said of Jesus, "Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world!" (Jn 1:29). Jesus came to take upon Himself your sins. He has paid the price for your disobedience and rebellion against God. "God shows His love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us" (Rom 5:8). The Roman Caesar was a tyrant and a pagan. Nevertheless, God said through Paul, "Let every person be subject to the governing authorities. For there is no authority except from God, and those that exist have been instituted by God" (Rom 13:1). The apostle Peter also wrote, "Honor the emperor" (1 Pet 2:17). Therefore, whether good or bad, kind or harsh, rulers need our prayers.

Jesus prayed for those who were treating Him harshly and unfairly. In reality, we were the ones responsible for His suffering and death. As His love and compassion for us penetrates our inmost being, we are led to pray for those who hate and persecute us. Jesus taught, "Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you" (Mt 5:44). Even if a person in authority becomes our enemy or persecutes us, Christ asks us to pray for that individual.

Why Pray for Those in Authority? What need do authorities have for our prayers? They are in the driver's seat. Scripture urges us to pray for those in authority so that we can live quiet and peaceful lives. It is the task of government to maintain order so that the Church can carry out our Lord's commission to make disciples of all nations. Without government, which has the authority to punish evildoers, society would be in chaos. Swift and certain punishment helps keep evildoers from committing crimes. For our own sake, therefore, we need to pray that our government officials enact and execute just laws and maintain law and order.

Those who have been entrusted with authority do not always administer fairly. Indeed, one finds many complaints in the Old Testament regarding injustice. "You who afflict the righteous, who take a bribe, and turn aside the needy in the gate" (Amos 5:12). If you have been the victim of injustice administered by some level of government, you know how frustrating that can be. We need to pray for justice in the land for all. God is interested in our temporal as well as our spiritual and eternal welfare.

Sometimes those in authority, be they government, parents, or supervisors in the work-place, act unfairly—by ignorance or by malevolent design. It is not always possible to make the right decisions, especially in difficult cases. It is not possible in every instance to know all the facts. Not all those in authority have the wisdom of Solomon. But we pray for wisdom for those in authority so that they may make decisions that are fair and benefit all of society.

Those in authority often are pressured by rich and powerful people to make decisions favorable to their cause. Most of us are acquainted with such favoritism and conflicts of interest. God complained about the leaders in ancient Israel for giving in to such temptation: "Your princes are rebels and companions of thieves. Everyone loves a bribe and runs after gifts" (Is 1:23). "Power corrupts, and absolute power corrupts absolutely," so the higher the authority, the more our prayers are needed. Pride precedes a fall. Those in authority need our prayers to help them avoid falling for such temptations and injuring society. When we remember that God desires that those in authority be a benefit to us, we are eager to pray that they govern according to His will. As sons and daughters of a merciful God, with His Spirit in us, we desire to help those in authority do their job so that we can do ours—proclaim Jesus Christ, the Savior of the world.

We may not be inclined to pray regularly for those in authority. However, as we remember the blessings that authority brings to our lives, we will find it easier to pray for such people. Look at the many blessings that we have in our country through our form of government. While not perfect, our country has prospered, and the Christian Church has largely been free to go about the task of making disciples of all nations. Imagine what your life would be like without authority. Even those we may dislike and resent the most—whether bosses, parents, or government leaders—are good and necessary. As many children have said in their later years, "At the time I did not appreciate my parents and what they did for me, but now I do."

As we hear and believe that God loves us in Jesus despite our unworthiness, we are moved to respond. God sends the Holy Spirit to empower us to do so. In reverence for God, we submit to His will and walk in His ways. God, in His loving care for us, has provided authorities for our individual good and the good of His Church. May we thank Him joyfully, today and always!

Prayer for Responsible Leaders



President's Piece for Peace

As I travel around our district, and in some cases around the country, I see more and more of a return to some sense of normalcy. After spending a year and a half in isolation, facial coverings, distancing, and working from home, we seem to be crawling out from under the rock of oppression. Athletic fields are occupied by fans and not just participants. It is nice to hear other voices in public places as well as the noise of hustle and bustle. What was once an annoyance is now a pleasure.

Of course this does not mean we throw caution to the wind and to be careless with your own health, or anyone else's either. If we have learned one thing among many over the past year and a half it is that we can be more considerate of others when we ourselves have any kind of illness. The basics of not sneezing in the presence of others, covering your mouth when you cough and then washing hands soon thereafter are simp-

ly common sense. If illness does have you down for a little bit, remain home until you are over the sickness. It is not to anyone's advantage to be a "sturdy soldier" and go to work regardless of how your health is. You do this to get better and also out of respect for your neighbor.

Now to my point: We need relief. It has been a tense-filled period of time with major adjustments that I for one am glad to see come to an end. We need a breather. Jesus frequently took a breather from the tense conditions of His life. It is often that we read in the Gospels that Jesus went

off privately to pray. He rested from His labors and from the onslaught of stress. Jesus rested by having conversations with His Father. When we are given that rare glimpse into the very words that Jesus prayed we can find that He prayed from the Psalms or what is known to us as the Psalter.

The Psalms were the prayer book, or maybe better known as the hymn book of the People Israel. The order of their services as well as major festival days was built around the Psalms. The Psalms are versicles that the Holy Spirit inspired men to record for the sake of properly praying to the Lord Almighty. The Psalms remind the person praying who God is. They also remind us of who we are and how needy our lives are. The Psalms are not short in identifying enemies who would do us harm. They allow us to pray ardently for God's intervention to defeat the enemies.

Ah, what of that, Lord, what of that!



13 That same day Jesus went out of the house and sat by the lake. ² Such large crowds gathered around him that he got into a boat and sat in it, while all the people stood on the shore. ³ Then he told them many things in parables, saying: "A farmer went out to sow his seed. ⁴ As he was scattering the seed, some fell along the path, and the birds came and ate it up. ⁵ Some fell on rocky places, where it did not have much soil. It sprang up quickly, because the soil was shallow. ⁶ But when the sun came up, the plants were scorched, and they withered because they had no root. ⁷ Other seed fell among thorns, which grew up and choked the plants. ⁸ Still other seed fell on good soil, where it produced a crop—a hundred, sixty or thirty times what was sown. ⁹ Whoever has ears, let them hear." - Matthew 13:1-9

A few weeks ago, around Easter, on one of my zoom meetings with the IDE Early Childhood Directors, I asked them to share one thing they

were concerned about and one thing they were excited about. Many of the "concerns" revolved around COVID, getting to the end of the year, next year's enrollment, and so on. To be sure, these were, and are, real concerns.

As for the items they were excited about, several Directors talked about how their "littles" seemed to be more aware and engaged in Bible stories this year. They wanted to hear stories over and over again. How exciting to hear how Jesus is at work through our IDE preschools and daycares! Kari Markla, our IDE Early Childhood Consultant (Redeemer, Ventura) shared a story a parent told her son, one of Kari's students. Mom and her kids were going somewhere or doing something outside when she caught her son looking directly up at the sun. Mom told her son, "Don't look at the sun, it will make you go blind." To which her son matter-of-factly replied, "I'm not worried Mom because I know Jesus can heal me. He'll just put some mud on my eye and I'll be able to see!"

Now, I doubt that you'll see any "mud" tables in our Early Childhood centers where kiddos can practice mud healing. But even though this little one has a few stages to go through in his faith development, you have to smile at his understanding, application, and verbalization of a Bible story told during "Jesus Time". Even when we think students aren't paying attention or totally engaged, they come up with the greatest insights! I've observed that sometimes it's the student you least expect to make the astute faith observation or connection from Bible story to real life. No matter the age, the Word is going to come back to us.

Your classroom (and school) this year is an example of what Jesus was talking about in His parable of the Sower. Throughout each day you were sowing the Word through your lessons, classroom management, and relationships. There were many "aha" moments and yes, distractions. Yet you kept on planting. Just when you thought no one was listening or no one cared, our Heavenly Father reminded you that His Word would prevail. He was faithful. You, through Him, were sowing seeds that were producing a crop – a hundred, sixty or thirty times what was sown. You were blessed to see the harvest. Some of the seeds will produce a crop that you will never know or witness.

If you are a hymn nerd, you no doubt recognize the name Martin Franzmann. And, if you listener to the podcast "Lutheran Ladies Lounge", episode #78 was devoted entirely to him. Franzmann (1907-1976) is one

of the most beloved hymn writers of the twentieth century. "Thy Strong Word" (LSB 578) is one of the five hymns that are in Lutheran Service Book.

Are you familiar with LSB 586 "Preach You the Word"? This hymn, with lyrics by Franzmann, is based on the Parable of the Sower. It was written in 1973 to commemorate the 125th anniversary of the Springfield seminary, now known as the Ft. Wayne Seminary. Though probably intended for pastors, preaching the Word has application for Lutheran educators, too.


The entire hymn is rich in text, but certain phrases stand out to me. Verse 3 begins with, "The sower sows; his reckless love Scatters abroad the goodly seed," In the spring of the year, you see farmers in their fields with giant tractors and planters drilling the individual corn and bean seeds in nice straight rows so many inches apart. Farmers may be sowing with love, but it's not reckless. It's precise and intentional. Quite different from our parable. Yet, neither the farmer in the parable or today's farmer have any control over what happens to the seed after it hits the ground. In verse 4, we sing, "The sower sows; his heart cries out, 'Oh what of that, and what of that'"? It is the power of Christ that will enable that seed to grow, nothing of our doing.

The first and last verse begins with the phrase, "Preach you the Word and plant it home". Your first and most important task is to tell your students about Jesus for you may be the only faith contact your student will ever have all year. "Integrate the faith" is not cliché. It's what you've been trained to do. Embrace it. Plan with it. Pray about it. Secondly, it is the Lord's Word, not ours. "Who gave the sower seed to sow will watch and tend His planted Word." (verse 6) God's Word will work for His purposes, not ours. It will produce in spite of us, and sometimes we just have to get out of the way.

This summer, get some gas back in your tank. Fill it up with the Word that grows in your heart and mind so that you can be re-energized to work on planting another crop of seedlings next year. May you be able to witness a harvest a hundredfold and sing, "Ah, what of that, Lord, what of that!" (verse 5) To God be the glory forever and ever!

Pastor Jim Lamb had some wonderful comments on this special feast day:

"June 24 is the Nativity of John the Baptist. John's nativity followed the course of most Jewish births at the time I suppose. The age of his parents, however, indicated that his conception was miraculous. Not miraculous like Jesus who had no earthly father, but miraculous because both Elizabeth and Zechariah were "advanced in years" and Elizabeth was barren (Luke 1:7). Thus, friends and relatives, recognizing God's hand in all of this, buzzed about John's future. "What then will this child be?" (1:66)

Zechariah knew. Through the power of the Holy Spirit he prophesied, "And you, child, will be called the prophet of the Most High; for you will go before the Lord to prepare his ways" (1:76).

John knew. The Holy Spirit filled him too, "even from his mother's womb" (1:15). At the very least, he knew when Jesus was present. At six months old, he "leaped for joy" (1:44) in his mother's womb when the dot-sized embryo that was Jesus showed up in Mary's womb. Babies as old as John leap frequently in wombs. But John does so with the very human emotion of joy.

We can learn from this embryo to fetus encounter. The Nativity of John the Baptist teaches us of the humanity and personhood of the unborn. I find it difficult to apply words like "glob of cells" or "non-sentient being" to the Spirit-filled, joyful, and leaping-in-the-presence-of-his-Savior John. Such things happen only to a fully human person.

The Nativity of John the Baptist gives affirmation to the science of human embryology and fetal development. Unborn babies feel pain and respond to touch and light and sound. They leap and kick and swim and walk. They suck their thumbs, take naps, and "go potty." They recognize their mother's voice and daddy's too if he talks to them. They love classical music, but good luck getting a teen to admit to this!

Philosophers, politicians, movie stars, judges, and sometimes theologians come up with all kinds of illogic, verbiage, sob stories, rulings, and heresy trying to minimize or deny the humanity and personhood of the unborn. But the basics of biology and the Bible bests them every time. When you celebrate the Nativity of John the Baptist, you not only celebrate the birth of the way-preparer, you affirm life and humanness and personhood.

And that's not such a bad way to describe Lutherans for Life and what you support with your monthly gifts. We affirm life and humanness and personhood regardless of size or location or stage of development or condition of health. We strive to energize and equip individuals, educators, pastors, and congregations to do the same. We do so based on the Word of God, centered in the cross of Christ, and flowing from our love for Him and the humanity He has redeemed."

The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod LCMS Stewardship Ministry Newsletter article – July 2021

"For freedom Christ has set us free; stand firm therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery" (Galatians 5:1).

We celebrate this month because of the freedoms and liberties our country has afforded us. We are right to do this. We should be thankful for these liberties – the freedom to gather together to worship and to live out what believe in our daily lives.

But freedom and liberty in our age have devolved. It has become a freedom from duty instead of a freedom for it. Indeed, freedom and liberty in our age has turned into licentiousness – a license to do what we want, when we want. This license is a submission again to a yoke of slavery. For freedom as license to do what we desire when we desire it means we are slaves to our desires and slaves to our passions.

Christ died to set us free from our desires. In Holy Baptism, our Old Adam is drowned and put to death along with all sin and evil desires so that a new man may arise and live before God in righteousness and purity. In Christ, we are a new creation. We are set free from the passions of the flesh so that we are free to do our duty and bear fruits of the Spirit.

Our duty is what God calls us to do as members of a family, society, and the Church. God calls us to believe in His Word and gladly hear and learn it. He calls us to pray for all people. He calls us to live in faith toward Him and in fervent love for our neighbor. He calls us to put the gifts He gives to us in His service. God calls parents provide for their children and raise them in the fear and admonition of the Lord.

And God calls children to honor their parents and provide and care for them when they are no longer able to do so themselves. God calls the government to punish those who do evil and to reward those who do good. He calls citizens to pay their taxes and honor the governing officials as God's servants. He calls pastors to preach and teach the Gospel, repentance for the forgiveness of sins. And He calls hearers to support those who teach them with every good thing.
