## BATIK DEMO AT GENERAL MEETING

The October meeting demo will be on the artistic use of batik, the Indonesian technique of wax-resist dyeing of cloth. It will be given by member Michael Mc Conville, who entered a large stretched batik panel titled "Nestled" in the Spring Membership show.



Batik is made by drawing resist dots and lines with a tool and/or by printing the resist with a stamp. The applied wax resists dyes and allows selectively soaking of the cloth in one color, removing the wax with boiling water, and repeating for multiple colors.



Michael graduated from Illinois State University with a Bachelor of Arts. His studies included painting, drawing, lithography and graphic design. After College he sought employment in his hometown of Rockford Illinois. After a few years he went on to employment in a Chicago suburban advertising agency.

As his skills as a practical artist grew, so did his abilities as a fine artist. Attending workshops and classes he advanced in painting, colored pencils and pastels. About five years age he rediscovered Batik. At first he was mesmerized by effects of colored wax

combined with dye. Now he enjoys that challenge of the media, the foresight required, the understanding of color theory, color blending and of course the "Happy Accident."

The Benny Center staff regrets that they must include nude art in this constraint, but they are happy to store it until the critique.
- Your piece must be accompanied with a signed release form. This form also includes details identifying your submittal.
- Dues for the 2018-19 year must be paid, and a lot of our members use this opportunity to do that.
- Any member needing to remove or swap a piece that has already been hung must first alert Chris Tanner. He can be reached at 847-367-5308 or chrisetanner@sbcglobal.net.
- The piece should be wired for hanging.
- The piece must have been completed within the past three years
- The piece must not have been in a previous Spring or Fall Membership Show.


## IN MEMORY OF VIRGINIA MORRISSEAU 1925-2018

The following profile of Virginia Morrisseau was published in the April 2004 issue of *Sketches*. It was assembled by Sally Baker Keller as an edited summary of Virginia's response to a number of questions. This rich memory is thus presented to you in Virginia's voice. The image is from a 2008 Daily Herald article.

"My art career started at nine years old, when I was awarded a scholarship to the Boston Museum of Fine Arts Saturday Children's program. This was a fine arts education that inspired me and gave me a vision of being an artist. Art has been an important and integral part of my life ever since. After High School I came to the stark realization that I could not support myself in this avenue, and began my engineering career. This allowed me to continue studying art and painting, however sparingly.

"It was a good mix, as the engineering work was very rewarding and allowed me to move to California

(Hughes Aircraft) and then to the Midwest, where I settled down in Lindenhurst. Here, I designed and set up production for one of the first thermoelectric refrigerators. "Following that, I worked for Baxter Healthcare for 13 years in the development of new products — all the time counting the days to retirement, when I could be a full-time artist. Following my time at Baxter, I formed my own consulting company (PAR INT'L) and worked as a contract engineer, providing artist services as well. This is now only an artist services, etc. company, and has served me very well.





ancient method of painting has engulfed me. My inspirations have always been the Impressionists, although lately, I have been leaning toward Jasper Johns and various abstract artists. Encaustic paintings can be both. ... "Probably my most challenging experience was a request to show my work at an exhibit for blind and sight impaired people, at the Lemon Street Gallery in Kenosha, WI. I felt that I could "give something back" through my art, so I added Braille to my Encaustic paintings, using B-B pellets, and allowed the "viewers" to feel and read at the same time. Since most paintings are NOT to be touched, this was an unusual opportunity for those people. It was also an enriching experience for me, and I am now working on a series of ten paintings for the blind, with Braille incorporated in them. I am hoping to be able to offer a show to the Institute for the Blind, in the near future. ...

"As to the style of my paintings, I can't go all the way to total abstraction. I'm too interested in the characters of the subject matter. I just can't abstract it out of existence unless, of course, it is a geometric design which is a result of my engineering background.

"I have been privileged to be a member of the LCAL for many years, having served as President, Corresponding Secretary and Scholarship Chair. It is a constant source of inspiration. How lucky we are!"
