MUD/FLOOD

The 2019 Spring and Summer snow melt runoff was truly one for the record books. While the Town of Marble did not suffer any large scale flood damage from the high water this year, the potential was certainly present. As a proactive precaution, the Town Council purchased 500 sandbags in early July to keep on hand for any flooding in Marble.

SHORT TERM RENTAL ORDINANCE

After months of discussion, debate and input from the public on August 1, 2019 the Marble Town Council voted unanimously to approve Ordinance #3-2019 updating the Town's Zoning Code with provisions regarding Short Term Rentals and Business Licenses for Short Term Rentals.

Effective January 1, 2020, property owners of residential units within the Town of Marble desiring to rent their dwellings, or portions thereof, for periods of time less than thirty days will be required to obtain a Short Term Rental Business License from the Town. The business license shall be renewable annually at a cost of \$50.00 per year.

The ordinance requires a designated responsible party be immediately available within one hour of notification to respond to any issues arising from the short term rental of the rented property.

FIRE DISTRICT NEWS

Rob Goodwin, Fire Chief of the Carbondale & Rural Fire Protection District is pleased to announce the District's plans for a major expansion of the Marble Fire Station in the spring of 2020. In addition to two new truck bays, the expansion will feature a large multifunction meeting room. The room will be utilized as an incident command post for back country rescues, wildfires and other emergencies in the Marble area. The room will also be available to the Marble Town Council for town council meetings and other special town events such as the annual community Thanksgiving dinner as well as a polling place for elections.

Fire District voters approved a bond issue in November 2018 which included an expansion of the Marble Fire Station. Also included in the bond issue were 2 new replacement fire trucks for Marble along with a new replacement back country rescue vehicle. Other lifesaving equipment will also be upgraded such as the Life Pac 12 Heart Monitor.

The property upon which the Marble Fire Station is located is owned by the Town of Marble and is part of the Mill Site Park property. The SBA deed allows fire department improvements to be placed on the property without approval from the SBA.

MARBLE TOWN COUNCIL ELECTION APRIL 7, 2020

The next regularly scheduled municipal election for Trustees of the Town of Marble is scheduled for April 7th, 2020. There are 4 trustee seats up for election, 2 four year terms and 2 two year terms. The mayor's seat has two years remaining.

Nominations petitions will be available in early January 2020 from the Town Clerk. Anyone interested in running for one of the open seats can contact the Town Clerk at leach@townofmarble.com.

ROAD MAINTENANCE PLAN AND INPUT

The Marble Trustees are seeking input on road maintenance projects for 2020. The trustees are dedicating 10 minutes on each month's town council meeting agenda for discussion and prioritization of road maintenance projects in 2020. In October of 2018 a working group was formed to study the increased usage of the Lead King Loop and the associated impacts to the Town of Marble and surrounding areas. The group has met via conference call each month and is preparing to present a progress report that will be made available on townofmarble.com later this fall.

Corinne Truesdell, a Masters of Environmental Management (MEM) student at Western Colorado University in Gunnison Colorado is joined the team in June of this year and is assisting the working group with a comprehensive study of the issues and impacts. Corinne has hit the ground running and is quickly getting up to speed with the associated issues and impacts of the wildly increasingly popular "LOOP".

Everyone knows the Marble Community Church is one of the first things a person sees as they enter the town of Marble, standing in the same location since 1908, silently reminding all, that faith has been important to Marble almost since its conception. In 1912 the 500 pound bell was installed and ready to ring for Christmas services of that year. It can still be heard every Sunday morning at 10 am reminding locals and visitors that services are beginning and that faith still plays an important role in the town of Marble.

We are a "living and breathing" church as reflected in our summer activities. Each Friday we have had church sponsored hikes open to anyone—taking participants all over the surrounding trails. These hikes have been led by parishioner Jay Davison and his faithful dog, Blaze. It has been a wonderful way to experience the beauty of our surroundings. The hikes will continue through the end of September and all are invited to attend.

Another new venture began this summer with the development of a Men's group that meets once a month. They received the name ROMEO—translated into retired old men eating out—from a parishioner, Joyce Leeman. A highlight of the summer occurred on Sunday August 25th when a baptismal service was performed in the Chrystal River. It was a beautiful warm day as parishioners strolled to the river after church to witness this very meaningful service.

passing of another great summer in the heart of the mountains in a town called Marble.

As a reminder to all, this is 'your' community church and Sunday services are held every Sunday at 10 am. Following the service is a fellowship time where good food can be had by all. Everyone is invited to join us. As winter approaches we will continue to be a living and breathing church with many seasonal celebrations. On that note we would like to let everyone know that there is always a candlelight Christmas Eve service at the church held at 7 pm. This is an especially meaningful service as our church is usually surrounded by snow and beautifully decorated to celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ.

So if you happen to be in Marble on a Sunday morning and you hear the bell ringing at 10 am, know that this bell has rung since 1912 proclaiming all the services of faith held within. May it remind you that faith is still important in the town and community of Marble.

DID YOU KNOW

The marble scattered along the right of way between Marble and Carbondale are not the result of railroad cars overturning, but were deliberately placed there as ballast to prevent the river undermining the tracks. They are mostly the trimmings cut from building blocks, and the larger pieces are rejects, pieces with fissures, points of flint, or streaks of lime in them.
