When I first read this Step I was like what? A power greater than myself? Greater than me? Is this possible? Does this power exist? What could it possibly be? And, what is this mumbo jumbo about how a power greater than myself could restore my sanity?

I had no argument about being insane. I accepted that. What I did not know was how to *regain* my sanity. I had totally lost it. I needed a way to find sanity and I was desperate.

**There was a loneliness** that I felt at the same time as this desperation. No one could have possibly understood! Haha. Woe is me!

I never believed in spirituality or a real God. The only God I knew helped me get loaded and back home safely from partying. And, to survive through the most hellacious hangovers.

It's true that our disease is progressive. I went from smoking weed for fun and having two beers to drinking straight 'hards' (to stop my hands from shaking), chronic cocaine use (to enable more drinking), and pill use to help me come down from being so high. Full blown addict behavior casually became my usual lifestyle.

If there was a power greater than myself then I needed it. I *wanted* to believe in this.

**The change did not** occur quickly. After a time of thinking and listening to others share I finally had a glimpse of it becoming a reality. The longer I didn't drink the closer I came to sanity.

**The serenity prayer** was and is a huge part of my life today. It lets God help me make decisions. It allows Him to decide. It takes all pressure away from me and helps restore me to sanity.

The ease of this program is amazing. Even magical. (Cont. p. 2)

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**She said:** Thank goodness when I finally, blearily, walked into the rooms of AA I was so emotionally, spiritually and physically exhausted that I was ready to believe in *anything* that could help me to stop being who or what I had become: a completely lost soul. In fact, looking back now I'm not even sure I saw the portion of the step regarding "sanity" that ended up being icing on the cake.

I didn't come from a religious environment and had spent years looking for something I thought was a higher power but never found it. It was never quite the right fit, if you know what I mean.

**Then I saw** that AA had a little provision in its language; my God could be a God of *my* understanding. Perfect! I was able to have a higher power that wasn't so big I couldn't wrap my head around it, or so small I couldn't refer even the most trivial of my problems to Him.

Some time has passed since I entered my first meeting and one day at a time that completely broken human being no longer lives in my skin. My periods of insanity are less frequent and shorter lasting but that's not to say I don't still have them. Apparently I sometimes forget what I learned early on; God is everything or God is nothing. My sick little brain sometimes tries to tell me I can handle certain areas of my life and that God is too busy handling much bigger problems of the world. I am well enough now and surely I can resolve this issue, whatever this happens to be - relationship problems, financial insecurities, a broken appliance, or even when I start to question why certain things happen the way that they do. The insanity starts to slowly creep back in. I begin getting those feelings of fear, disguised as anything, from self-righteousness to anger or depression. The horizon seems dark and the tunnel is long.

Eventually I somehow remember to use my tools –

#### The Best of Big Book Dave:

#### **February in Our History:**

**Feb. 1938:** Sobriety date of A.A Number 13, Earl Trent. Dr. Bob was his sponsor.

**Feb. 1939:** Collier magazine editor Thomas Uzzell edits the Big Book manuscript from approximately 800 pages down to 400.

**Feb 1940:** Sister Victorien, working with Sister Ignatia, was transferred to Cleveland and began admitting alcoholics at St. Vincent's Charity Hospital.

**Feb. 8, 1940:** The Rockefeller fund-raising dinner at the Union Club in New York with Dr. Bob, Bill and six other A.A.'s in attendance.

**Feb. 13, 1940:** The first recorded time the "Lord's Prayer" was used to close an A.A. meeting, at the 'Philadelphia Group', Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

**Feb. 1948:** Father Ralph Pfau founded the "Catholic Clergy Conf. on Alcoholism", which brought the A.A. message to priests suffering from alcoholism.

**Feb. 1959:** Permission was asked for and granted by G.S.O. for our literature to be put on tape for "Recordings for the Blind."

**Feb. 19, 1967:** Father Ralph Pfau died Sunday morning in "Our Lady of Mercy Hospital", Owensboro, Kentucky. He was the third most published author of the A.A. message behind Bill W. and Richmond Walker.

**Feb. 1990:** Going to print – the Ten Millionth copy of the Big Book.

#### **District 6 Inventory Panel 67**

1. What is the basic purpose of the District <u>Committee</u>? The basic purpose of the District Committee is to keep in frequent touch with the groups, to learn their problems, and to find ways to contribute to their growth and well being. Encouraging participation in General Service, by carrying information back and forth between Groups and the Area body.

2. <u>What additional activities can we engage in to</u> <u>carry the message?</u> Events that are informative, including workshops on service, carrying the message into the schools, and how about an Alano Club? --All within the spirit of unity.

3. <u>Considering the number of Alcoholics in our</u> <u>district, are we reaching enough people?</u> No.

4. <u>What has District done lately to bring the AA</u> <u>message to the attention of professionals who can</u> <u>be helpful in reaching those who are in need of AA?</u> We just added a new CPC (Cooperation with the Professional Community) chairperson and he contacted a Doctor who happens to be in AA.

5. Do we try to illustrate a good cross section of AA in our message carrying? We do try, how could improve? By encouraging greater participation from the broad cross section of members on the island.

6. <u>Do new GSR's stick with us, or does our turnover</u> and missed meeting seem excessive? Well, out of 31 Groups on the island, 6 GSR's participated in this inventory.

7. <u>How effective are we in communicating with all</u> <u>our groups?</u> Not well enough. We could try and incorporate District business in our shares. Also, when AA related announcements are offered, it's a perfect time to give 2 minutes of what District is doing.

8. Do all AA's know about District meetings and have the opportunity to attend? Overall, the District meetings are not a very important topic at most meetings. Opportunities to attend are on an individual basis, how important is it to each individual?

9. <u>Has enough effort been made to explain to all the</u> value and purpose of a GSR? Except for a GSR orientation event held in the beginning of panel 67 at the Lihue neighborhood center, probably not, and our DCM ought to look into the Service Manual for info on increasing awareness.

10. <u>How do we encourage GSR's and group members</u> to serve on committees? Again, it helps to share at a meeting the benefits of General Service.

11. <u>Are District officers picked with care and consideration?</u> Wouldn't it be great if we had more than one person willing to serve!

12. Do our groups carry their fair share of supporting the Area and the General Service Office (GSO)? The Area Treasurer reported in October that 38.7% of the groups on Kauai contributed. This compares to the National average of 41.5% in 2016.

13. How well are our groups informed about what is happening in AA worldwide? (See response to #9) 14. Are our District meetings informative and enthusiastic? A unanimous yes by all who participated. In summary, The Group Conscience is created in many ways. During our inventory process we addressed some principles that help us define ours here within the District 6 Committee: our basic purpose, activities we engage in to carry the message, attraction methods, community service, cross section accessibility, attendance, effective information. communication of committee membership, election procedures, financial selfsupport, and enthusiasm. I feel that while there's always room for improvement, in our own process of service, and in a collective manner, we have a terrific group of colorful individuals who show up with their experience, strength and hope, sharing information about their particular area of service, and are striving to keep our ultimate goal simple: Carrying the message to the alcoholic who still suffers.
