## From the Bridge

From The Bridge September 2014

Hi everyone



What a great summer - they actually seem to get better each year. The Memorial Day cruise at Kingston was a blast. We had at least a dozen boats. Friday night, we joined the Kingston Yacht Club for a potluck dinner that was a great get together. There was a farmers market Saturday and we had our big BBQ Saturday night and Monday had a potluck breakfast with Memorial Day services right after. Kingston is very accommodating and the free use of the electric car is a real bonus.

The Summer Cruise at Roche Harbor was terrific. Perfect weather, party barge, a dozen boats and more food than is advisable. We have scheduled Roche again for next year: July 14-16. A special thanks to Debbie in the Roche Harbor Market - she again got us great steaks and corn for the party at very fair pricing.

Linda and I can't thank everyone enough - for joining us, for the terrific potluck and pupu items and the great friendships that have developed. The food that comes out of your boats is amazing.

We went from the Summer Cruise North to the Chris Craft Rendezvous at Telegraph Harbor in the Canadian Gulf Islands. It was special. Can't say enough nice things about the owners and their staff at Telegraph or the 20 or so Chris Craft owners who are restoring, maintaining and enjoying a huge part of boating's history. We stopped at Ganges for day on the way back down. The market at the head of the dinghy dock has anything you might need. We stayed at Salt Springs Marina and it is decent, but should be terrific in the next year or so - major remodel coming. Moby's Restaurant at the head of their dock has undergone new ownership and it was very good casual food.

In addition, we were fortunate to have visited all our favorite spots - Islander Inn At Fisherman's Bay, Roche, Reid and Prevost Harbors, Sucia, Garrison and, of course, Friday Harbor and PT. Hudson on the way back down.

We have some observations: the food at The Islander Inn was terrific - best it's ever been there. The homemade pie at Telegraph and banana splits - perfect. Westcott Bay Oyster Farms is open again this year with new owners and they a making huge strides in restoring it to it's old glory. We bought a "boatload" of steamers and oysters this year and they were all fresh, cleaned and without waste. They have started rebuilding the dock, will be building new pens for retail sales and a new retail office center. They have already planted 500,000 oysters and will sell between 60 and 70,000 DOZEN oysters next year, plus they will have great steamers and too many mussels to count! The owners live on Henry Island and your support for saving this resource will come back many times over. Lime Kiln at Roche is a favorite, along with their homemade donuts. Orcas Village Market at the ferry terminal gets better each year. At Friday, the pizza stand at the head of the dock is very good and King's Market is the Cadillac of the Islands. At PT Hudson, the PT. Hudson cafe is great for breakfasts and lunches and Doc's was very good for dinner.

The bottom line, though, is that the very best meals we have ever had are those cooked on the aft deck of Ohana - not sure what it is, but the fresh air, sun, smell of salt water and light breezes make everything taste terrific.

We cleared Customs at Bedwell and Roche- Bedwell took three minutes by phone, Roche about 10 - mostly because I forgot about the annual sticker you have to buy.

We finally found the whale boats favorite channel - VHF 79. Sometimes they use a code which means go to 77. This really helps if you listen and be patient before going out to see these magnificent creatures. We also learned in the fog at Cattle Point, that the whale watching boats do not use AIS - not smart in my opinion.

Next Summer is a big one for us - we will have sold our house, moved aboard our newly built houseboat on Lake Union, bought an vintage runabout for Lake use, and Linda will be near retirement or going to limited part time. We intend to abuse every day of vacation we can get and extend out travels accordingly. Hope part of that time is spent with you all.
