pastor's letter

from pastor jane

A note about the LCMC Conference in Des Moines:

Dear Brothers & Sisters in Christ,

Thank you for the opportunity of representing Hope Lutheran church, along with Sylvia Munter, at the above referenced annual church wide conference. What a thrill to again be in a room filled with people who stand on Holy scripture as the basis of faith.

This years theme was The Great Commission given by Jesus in Matthew 28:18-20 (NIV):

"Then Jesus came to them and said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. 19 Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, ²⁰ and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely, I am with you always, to the very end of the age."

Each of us has a circle of friends and acquaintances that are "unchurched", including me. Some of them were raised in a church and have fallen away, or more often they will say "I believe in God", but do not feel the need for church. At least not until they want a baptism, or a wedding, or a funeral, or feel the need for other services provided by the church. After a brief church event, their contribution to the fellowship wanes, and they fall back into a non-participatory status. Why is this? I hope not because they were made to feel unwelcome, or not invited. These events are an opportunity to practice good old-fashioned hospitality.

In defense of those who do not stay or continue to participate, we may not always be welcoming. Jesus asks us to reach out to the unchurched and invite them. The joke goes that Norwegian Lutherans invite someone to church every 30 years, "whether they need to or not."

Some of our churches have paid a price for this type of isolation and lose their ability to function. Some may say we love our church as it is, but if we are not welcoming, inviting, friendly, learning and growing, we may not like the long-term outcome. Welcoming new people might mean "change", and not all change is good. So we pray for the gift of discernment (Hebrews 5:14), so that we keep all that is good and prayerfully adjust what could use improvement.

We certainly do not want "change for the sake of change", but change for good reason should always be something we can think and pray about to reach Spirit-guided decisions about renewal and refreshing church practices. An example is the acceptance of "a new song" in music.

Today, some of the most revered traditional, sacred music is by Bach. Yet he wasn't always considered "traditional", nor was he revered. The young Johann Sebastian was considered a radical and disrupter of sacred music, which at the time consisted of mostly simple melodies. He was radical because Johann introduced chords to existing melodies that were only a third apart producing a "new-fangled thing" called "harmony"! This sounded like "dissonance" and "dis-chord" to the traditional ear of the church musicians. Now we all love good harmony!

Now, in the 21st century, we cherish the harmony that was introduced as a "new song" in the 16th century as our traditional hymns, which have evolved into 4-part harmony. Everything old (2-part harmony) becomes new (4-part

harmony) with just a little tweaking. Throughout church history, there were those who ignored Gods Word, which advised them to "sing a new song unto the Lord" (found in Psalm chapters 33, 40, 96, 98, 144 & 149; as well as Isaiah 42 and Revelation 5 & 14. NKJV)

The great commission is ours; as baptized members of the church we are part of the priesthood of all believers (1 Peter 2:9 "You are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, Gods special possession, that you may declare the praises of Him Who call you out of darkness into His wonderful light.")

Our own personal mission field consists of those we know and who know us, outside the family of faith. With China as the #1 mission field, India as #2; the United States is #3; we know that we do not need to travel anywhere to fulfill the Great Commission. It is right here in the midst of us.

Invite new people to join us for coffee and goodies between worship services. Being that friendly, inviting face to a person you do not know (new or not new) reflects a gift called "hospitality", and it comes from the Holy Spirit. Hospitality may be reflected in an attitude toward change. It is my prayer that we guard our hearts and minds against being "inhospitable", while holding faithfully to all that is good, using love as our guide.

"Let love be genuine; hate what is evil, hold fast to what is good; ¹⁰ love one another with brotherly affection; outdo one another in showing honor. ¹¹ Never flag in zeal, be aglow with the Spirit, serve the Lord. ¹² Rejoice in your hope, be patient in tribulation, be constant in prayer. ¹³ Contribute to the needs of the saints, **practice hospitality**." (Romans 12:9-13)

It is such a joy to serve you as your interim pastor! Ours is such a great community to serve, an oasis in the desert of the World. I know this may not always be the case as I continue in specialized ministry, so I am enjoying all of you at Hope Lutheran while I can. May we grow together in "harmony".

Not every church has the gifted lay leadership that Hope Lutheran enjoys, what a blessing to work with you all! May God continue to guide, as together, we prepare for your new pastor. Please keep him or her in your prayers.

YOUTH STEWARDSHIP

"Whoever can be trusted with very little can also be trusted with much, and whoever is dishonest with very little will also be dishonest with much. So if you have not been trustworthy in handling worldly wealth, who will trust you with true riches?" (Luke 16:10-11).

Jesus spoke these words in reference to his Parable of the Shrewd Manager (Luke 16:1-13). His point was that faithfulness does not relate to the amount of the trust, but to the person to whom it is entrusted. Perhaps you've known someone of high intelligence who could have been whatever he wanted an engineer, a doctor, a scientist - but he didn't apply himself to his studies in high school and, as a result, was not accepted into a college. Maybe you've met someone who was a gifted athlete, but she lacked the discipline to get to practices on time and work hard when she was there, refused to take direction from the coach, and couldn't get along with her teammates. This type of person is one who is "dishonest" with the gifts God gave him and, due to his own misuse of his gifts, has proved himself untrustworthy. This choice has its own consequences. The person has robbed herself of opportunities to help her school, improve her talents and skills, and advance her career. Everyone else is robbed too, for perhaps that person's leadership would be necessary to form a winning team. Maybe that person's research

would lead to a cure for diabetes.

In his letter to the Ephesians, Paul wrote that God has given different gifts to each of us, but all gifts are to be used for the purpose of building up the body of Christ (Ephesians 4:11 -12). He lists such occupations as apostles, prophets, evangelists, pastors, and teachers. We could add the occupations above to this list, along with carpenters, painters, musicians, and whatever field God calls you to. The talents, skills, interests you have are just what we've been calling them: gifts. You haven't earned them and you can't buy them; they have been given to you by God. However, God does expect you to be a good steward of your gifts, to develop them in order that you might take your part in building up the body of Christ. Then you can be trusted with "true riches," which are things of the highest value, spiritual things.

Let's think about it:

- 1. Read the Parable of the Shrewd Manager from Luke 16. Use your Bible footnotes to get a clearer understanding of this complex parable.
- 2. Read Matthew 25:14-30. How serious is God about our use of the gifts He gives us?

Let's pray: Dear heavenly Father, thank You for the gifts and talents You've blessed me with. Forgive me when I take them for granted and don't use them as I should. Amen.
