•	Num. 26:33 (to :)
	And Zelophehad the son of Hepher had no sons, but daughters:

• Num. 27:1-5

THEN came the daughters of Zelophehad, the son of Hepher, the son of Gilead, the son of Machir, the son of Manasseh, of the families of Manasseh the son of Joseph: and these *are* the names of his daughters; Mahlah, Noah, and Hoglah, and Milcah, and Tirzah.

I do change my mind frequently, but when I do, it is always God that changes me. Sometimes I will be headed in one direction, like a weather vane, and will stay that way for several days. The next time you see me, I will have turned completely around and am going the other way, but in the meantime God had given me additional light and has led me to make the change. There have been times in working out a problem when I have not known just what step to take, and finding it necessary to make a move of some sort, I have taken a step as nearly as I could in the right direction. Perhaps I would find out shortly that it was wrong, but this step gave me a new point of view that I would not have had, had I not taken it as I did. I would not condemn myself, therefore, for what seemed to be a mistake but would include it as part of the working out of the problem.

Obeying before Understanding From Clara Shannon PP188-89

One day I wanted to have some proof of which I could speak concerning God's guidance of the Cause of Christian Science, and I had the following proof, which left no doubt whatever. One night the Directors of The Mother Church wished to have guidance as to the wisdom of taking certain steps in something concerning The Mother Church which was of great importance. Late that night some letters were brought from them telling Mrs. Eddy about the circumstance and asking advice. At that hour Mrs. Eddy had

retired and was sleeping, so we thought it best to wait until the morning, or till she wakened, before bringing them to her. In a short time she wakened and rang her bell, asked if any letters had come for her from the Directors, and wanted to see them at once, as she said there was a great need of wisdom. After reading them, she told us what it was, and she said, "I don't know what is best to do, but Love will show me the way." She told me to get her block of paper and pencil and to write.

I sat on the carpet beside the hot-air register and wrote at her dictation. She said, "God *bids* me to do so and so, but I don't see the reason why." Several times she corrected that manuscript, saying "The does not make the meaning clear enough. I must put better words to express what God meant," and she dictated for hours, and as I finished writing each sheet, I passed it on to Mr. Frye for him to copy on the typewriter. At about 2 or 2:30 a.m., I said to her, "Mother, why don't you wait to write this till tomorrow?" She said, "And what would become of our Cause if I waited? This will be on its way to Boston at half past five, ready for the Directors' meeting at eight o'clock."...And in the morning, at five-thirty, it was on its way and arrived in time for the meeting.

Later in the morning after she had been for her walk on the veranda, she said to us, as she came into her room, "Love has shown me the reason why," and she explained to us the reason. Then she said very seriously, "I want you always to remember that Mother had to obey God before she knew the reason why." Afterwards, when the news of the result reached her, she had the proof that all was well and that she had acted rightly, and God's directions were carried out. That was a heavenly lesson in obedience to spiritual direction..."

OBSTACLES

1. Self-justification

Rolling Away the Stone, by Stephen Gottschalk PP 307-308

The one thing Eddy most abhorred and rebuked was self-justification, which she saw as a mental state of acute resistance to genuine spiritual progress. In the words of Hermann Hering [a worker in Eddy's household and the second First Reader of TMC], when workers failed to accomplish something they had been asked to do and had to report to Eddy, she would "not permit them to make any excuses," to justify themselves or even apologize; "she never stopped questioning them or talking with them until they admitted that error had made them do this or fail to do it. She said that unless you made this admission that error made you do it, you can't be healed of it."

Caroline Foss

Her position is evident in the case of Caroline Foss, a New York practitioner whom Eddy called to Pleasant View to serve as her personal maid. Foss later wrote of her initial feeling of humility at the possibility of being with Eddy, but found that she was frequently rebuked for her resistance to correction.

...Foss reproduced in her reminiscence a letter sent to her by Eddy after she had returned to New York saying: "I have begged you to quit telling me why you did a thing wrongly, but you have not obeyed me. I have told you it is like the sick excusing sickness—tell why they are sick, and you do know that this would tend to make it real and to justify sickness."

John Lathrop

He was called to her study at Pleasant View and asked if he was doing his mental work. He replied that he was trying to do it. Eddy repeated the question and he replied as before. His account continues:

She said, "Stop, stop!" and gave me one of her penetrating looks which went right thought one. "I asked you if you were doing what I gave you to do. You replied, I am trying to do it.' Now you are either doing a thing or you are not doing it. Were you doing it? "No, Mother, I was not doing it," I replied.

She said quickly, "When are you going to do it?" "Now," I replied. "Let me see you do it now," she said sternly. I returned to my room. I knew that if I did not do the required mental work now, I would soon be taking a train to my home.

Lathrop quickly gained the needed spiritual realization—and just as quickly, Eddy called him back and gave him more work to do.
