

Lent 2020

As we journey through our 4th Lent together, I give thanks for all the new lessons we have learned together. Soon it will be Holy Week. That last week of Jesus' life was filled with basically every emotion known to humankind. Jesus, God in the flesh, came as a human person to live a human life. In just that one week alone, Jesus felt joy and sadness. Jesus felt calm and frustration. Jesus felt friendship and betrayal. Jesus saw peace and fear. Jesus saw hope and despair. By becoming human and witnessing all of these, and even feeling some of them himself, God in the flesh knew exactly what He was saving us from.

Joy and sadness. Surely as he rode into Jerusalem on that donkey on Palm Sunday, Jesus saw joy on many people's faces. With no real indication in scripture of what Jesus did on Wednesday of Holy Week, we can imagine Jesus enjoyed the joy of rest. It was also during Holy Week when Jesus brought joy to the women in Simon's house as he defended Mary of Bethany use expensive oil to anoint him. But he also knew all of this joy wouldn't last. Those same people joyfully calling him their king on Sunday would yell "crucify him" on Friday. Sadly, what Mary was really doing was preparing his body for a burial that was just a few days away.

Calm and frustration. Jesus prayed. Even in that last week of his life, even as things got hectic, Jesus took time to calm his spirit. It was his favorite way of calming himself. Often when crowds got too large or things go too crazy, Jesus would go off by himself to pray. This week was no different. But frustration also crept in during Holy Week. On Tuesday, Jesus became frustrated, and perhaps even angry, at what we saw going on in the temple. It had turned from a house of prayer into a house of crooks, money and deal making. Jesus turned over those money tables to clearly show his frustration with what had been done to God's house.

Friendship and betrayal. It seemed like everyone was his friend on Sunday. But were they true friends? The disciples were. The women were. But most of them turned their backs on him. During Holy Week, Jesus would find out who his real friends are. Those who stayed by his side no matter what, those who continued to follow him and those who continued to believe in him even after the events that Good Friday would bring.

Peace and fear. Fear of the Roman empire was valid. It was known for its brutality. And there was valid reason to fear the religious leaders as well. Fear was a powerful tool used to control the people. During Holy Week, coming upon Passover, this fear would have been dialed up to the highest level possible. They didn't want any disturbances. And yet, out of that very same environment came a peace. We can imagine Jesus peacefully sitting there as he was anointed and the setting for the Lord's Supper seem extremely peaceful.

Hope and despair. The disciples would have felt plenty of despair as the Messiah died. What do they do now? They had gotten quite used to God walking among them. Now, it could appear to less faithful eyes, that they had been defeated. But as bad as Friday was, Sunday was coming. Through the resurrection of Jesus Christ on Easter Sunday the world was given hope; hope that good has triumphed over evil, hope that the Kingdom of God was real and we could get there, hope that some day there would be no more despair.

Life is hard. Emotions can go up and down more than a roller coaster. All of the emotions we feel in our lifetime, Jesus saw in just one week. Jesus knows your pain, and suffers with you. Jesus knows your joy and rejoices with you. Although it is a message more commonly heard at Christmas time, we can't ever forget that Jesus is Immanuel, God With Us, today, right here, right now, always and everywhere. Amen!

Total Expenses: \$32,606.84 Overall Total: -\$10,022.75

We have been drawing from our savings to cover our operating expenses for the past few years. Our Church budget for 2020 is \$195,559. To meet our budget, we need to receive \$16,296.60 per month. Thus far this year, we have been averaging \$11,292.00 per month.
