

In Banning and Beaumont Senior Citizen communities, such as Sun Lakes, 4 Seasons and Solaro are large and growing. In Sun Lakes, a 30-year-old community, about 10% of the homes turnover with new residents. This represents over 300 households each year.

How do we increase awareness of our church? Plans are underway to address senior communities and make them more aware that Beaumont Presbyterian Church. 



Our numbers were up this month; I guess the earlier hot weather kept people away.

We are seeing more homeless people; not the ones panhandling or parked on the grass along Highland Springs with their shopping carts. But young couples, middle-aged couples, and most heartbreakingly, a 79 year old woman who lost her home.

This is tough. She is trying to navigate through all the steps to obtain help but is consistently thwarted. Her husband was a veteran but the VA said she didn't qualify for aid. She has tried to apply for a Title-8 voucher for housing and her paperwork was lost; twice. She has a son in Orange County who rebuked her for paying for storage in which to store some of her furniture. She told him; "I'm not going to be homeless forever." We wish we could solve her problems but of course we can't.

So, we do what we do best; we serve nourishing food, give hugs and smiles and listening ears.

On a positive note. You received a brochure about Table of Plenty in the order of service. Non-profits are encouraged not to spend more than 35% of their income on administrative costs. Because we are 100% volunteers, our administrative costs are: 1.8%! You can be assured that your money goes directly for food.

Did America have a Religious Founding? (Part 2)

The Pilgrims were English Puritans who came to North America to seek religious independence. They were a Puritan separatist's congregation who held Calvinist religion beliefs. They had rejected the Church of England, wanting to construct an ideal Christian society in the New World. They rejected the Church of England because it still maintained many characteristics too similar to the Roman Catholic Church. These Puritans supported a greater form of purity in doctrinal worship and being highly anti-Catholic, they believed that the Church of England required further reform. Upon arrival in the new world this separatist group developed a unique form of governance called the Mayflower Compact. The compact were rules to ensure a functioning social structure in their new society. They knew life without laws and rules could prove catastrophic. It was the first formal framework of government in North America and was created to prevent dissent between Puritan separatist and non-separatist. The Mayflower Compact was the seed of the American constitution and has been referred to as the world's first written constitution. William Bradford, a leader of the Pilgrims, helped develop the compact and went on to serve as Governor of the Plymouth Colony intermittently for about 30 years.

If the Pilgrims finding the only place in Plymouth that would allow them to survive their first harsh winter was the first miraculous occurrence, then the second miracle was their encounter with a Patuxet Native American man named Squanto. Although the Pilgrims caught glimpses of native people, it wasn't until several months after their arrival that the colonists met and communicated with them. One day, after the harsh winter, a tall native man came walking toward the Plymouth settlement. The Pilgrims went for their guns because there had been previous attacks. But when the man was within hearing distance he exclaimed, "Welcome Englishman." Then he said, "Do you have beer?" His name was Samoset and he had learned some English from traders who had been traveling the Atlantic coast for a century trading with the native tribes. Most likely this is how he acquired his taste for beer. But the Pilgrims had run out of beer, so they offered him brandy instead. Samoset next brought another native man to the Pilgrims, and history remembers him as Squanto. Years before, Squanto had been captured by English sailors and sold into slavery. While living in England he learned English and eventually returned to his homeland. Squanto was then captured a second time and sold as a slave in Spain. Some Spanish friars rescued him and Squanto was able to travel from Spain back to England. There he lived with a wealthy merchant as a likely indentured servant. In 1619 Squanto was able return home again where he made the sad discovery that no one in his village was alive. They had been wiped out by a European disease for which there was no immunity. Squanto then went to live with the neighboring Wampanoag tribe.

After Squanto's introduction to the Pilgrims, Massasoit, the Wampanoag tribal chief allowed him to stay and advise the Pilgrims. Squanto settled in with the Pilgrims who were sick and dying from the harsh winter. They lacked food and needed help. Squanto taught them how to fish, hunt and cultivate corn. He acted as their interpreter which led to trade and peace between the Wampanoag tribe and the Pilgrims. Massasoit also decided to follow Squanto's advice and sign a peace treaty, which formed an alliance with the Pilgrims. The alliance helped the Wampanoag fend off threats from enemy tribes because the Wampanoag tribe had been weakened by disease and warfare. Also, the alliance certainly was beneficial to the struggling and out-numbered Pilgrims. The hand of God seemed to be working in Plymouth for the survival of the colony.

ADULT SUNDAY SCHOOL

This year marks the 500th anniversary of the Protestant Reformation so it seemed appropriate to devote a Bible study to this topic.

Rob Fuquay just released this DVD and study program in August called the New Reformation – From Luther's world to ours. We are enjoying seeing the sites in Germany where Martin Luther began his humble beginnings as a monk. After posting his 95 Thesis on the door of Castle church in Wittenberg, Luther's message sparked two key themes of the Reformation.

Sola Scriptura, Latin for scripture alone, meant the church could not replace the role of the Bible as the primary means of hearing God's voice.

The second concept was Sola Fide, Latin for faith alone. Luther held that God's grace grants salvation through faith alone, so human beings' good works do not earn the free gift of salvation.
