Celebrate the Advent and Christmas seasons and join us for our Festival of Lessons and Carols on Sunday afternoon, December 14 at 3:00! And please invite as many of your friends and family as you can!

As many of you already know, Lessons and Carols is a service that tells the story of the Nativity from the Genesis reading of Adam and Eve in the garden to the birth of Jesus. Through seven scripture readings and a mix of carols, hymns, and anthems, we will celebrate the hope of Christmas.


The history of Lessons and Carols can be traced to Truro Cathedral in Cornwall, England, In 1880, Bishop Edward White Benson created the first Lessons and Carols service to offer a spiritual alternative to Christmas Eve celebrations that were taking place in local pubs! He wanted to draw people out of secular festivities and into the church to tell the story of Christmas.

The modern version of the service was adapted for King's College, Cambridge, in 1918 by Eric Milner-White. Its popularity spread globally after the BBC began broadcasting it in 1928.

At Augustus, our festivities will begin with the Augustus Bell Choir presenting the "Ukranian Bell Carol," followed by Ali Buckland presenting "One Small Child" by David Meece on flute, and Matthew Boatmon presenting an organ setting of the "Magnificat" by Marcel Dupré. Our treble choristers will join our adult singers in presenting a variety of carols and anthems, including Aston's "The Glory of the Lord," Warlock's "Adam Lay Ybounden," How's "An Advent Message," Phillips "People, Look East," Parry's "O Day of Peace," Phillip's "There's a Voice in the Wilderness Crying," and Lindley's "Ave Maria." Hymns will range from "Come, O Come, Emmanuel" to a setting of "Joy to the World" by John Rutter. The service will conclude with Matthew playing a setting of "Bring a Torch, Jeannette, Isabella" by Keith Chapman, who was the principal Organist at Wannamaker's in Philadelphia from 1966 - 1989.

A festive reception will follow the service. The choirs and I are looking forward to seeing you! Thank you,

Christian Education

Our Sunday school kids have completed lessons about the early Church and have moved into Advent and Christmas activities. We are currently learning about Advent, the beginning of the Church year and the season when we prepare for the holy season of Christmas.

Our regular Sunday school students will have the most prominent parts, but our pageant also needs lots of angels, sheep, and even narrators who can easily be added to the cast. This is a great opportunity to invite grand-children, neighbors and any children you know to join us at Augustus. Practices for the pageant will be on **December 7th**, **December 14th and December 21st** during Sunday school (9-10:15 a.m.) Attendance at all practices is mandatory for everyone except angels and sheep. The pageant will be presented on December 21st at the 10:30 a.m. service.

After the pageant, Sunday school will be on hiatus until January 4th, when we'll come back for our Epiphany celebration, a visit from the magi, and the annual baby shower for Jesus.

Our confirmation kids are also getting ready for Christmas during Advent. They have prepared worship bags for children attending church in the coming year, as well as Advent chains to help the Sunday school children count down to Christmas. They will also present a living nativity at the 5 p.m. Christmas Eve service.

Meanwhile, our Senior High Youth Group is keeping us well fed with Thanksgiving pies and Christmas cookies. All proceeds go to benefit the SHYG programs, including their annual mission trip. This means that by eating pies and cookies, you're doing God's work in the world! Thank you to SHYG and their wonderful leaders.

Gracious Givers

In God's Plan Nothing Is Insignificant

Lots of jokes have been made about the "begats" in the first chapter of Matthew. We have updated that word now and use the more understandable "was the father of." Still, we tend to skip over those seventeen verses with their hard-to-pronounce names. Yet we know that we can benefit from reading these verses, for we are told, "ALL Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness" (2 Timothy 3:16). Insignificant as those names may at first seem to us, each represents a person from whom Jesus was directly descended.

Bethlehem was considered an insignificant little town. Nothing much was going on there. When the Wise Men went looking for Jesus, Bethlehem was not their first stop. No, they stopped in Jerusalem. They inquired of a king in a king's palace for ". . . the one who [had] been born king of the Jews" (Matthew 2:2). Yes, the prevailing view of Bethlehem was that it was a pretty insignificant place. However, God chose Bethlehem to be Jesus' birthplace. "But you, Bethlehem Ephrathah . . . out of you will come for me one who will be ruler over Israel . . ." (Micah 5:2).

Then there's Nazareth. When Nathanael was told about Jesus, he sneered, "Nazareth! Can anything good come from there?" (John 1:46) It was just an obscure, insignificant town, but it was the place God chose to be Jesus' hometown.

Looking back, we see God's wonderful plan. We realize that nothing is insignificant to him. "For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways,' declares the Lord. 'As the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts'" (Isaiah 55:8-9).


Just as, in the past, God used seemingly insignificant people, places, and events to carry out his plan, he is today using us where we live and where we work, throughout our daily lives, to be stewards of his message, stewards of his gifts, stewards of the lives he has given us.

As we worship the Christ Child this Christmas season and hear again the wonderful chain of events God put in motion to fulfill Scripture, let us be prepared to be used by him as his ongoing plan for the salvation of all people unfolds.

Telling Others about Jesus

At the birth of a child, most parents make numerous telephone calls to relatives and friends to tell them about the wonderful news. In addition to telephone calls, announcement cards are often sent. When Jesus was born, there were no telephones or mail service. However, God had a better method of announcing the birth of his Son. He used his angels:

"And there were shepherds living out in the fields nearby, keeping watch over their flocks at night. An angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, 'Do not be afraid. I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. Today in the town of David a Savior has been born to you; he is Christ the Lord. This will be a sign to you: You will find a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger'" (Luke 2:8-12).

God, in his sovereignty, did not choose the rulers of the time nor the wealthy to be among those who were the first to hear of Jesus' birth. Interestingly, he chose a group of people who, in many ways, were considered outcasts. Upon hearing the good news of the Christ Child, the shepherds went to Bethlehem to see Jesus in the manger.



After seeing Jesus, the shepherds went out and "spread the word concerning what had been told to them about this child" (Luke 2:17). God used these people to be his ambassadors. The people who heard the shepherds talk about Jesus were "amazed at what the shepherds said to them" (verse 18).

Like the shepherds, we are called to be faithful witnesses of Jesus and his love. Once we begin to comprehend his love for us, we will be compelled to share that love with others. In telling others, we reflect our gratitude for his love, grace, and mercy. God hears and sees our gratitude through the way we live our lives.

Jesus Is Our Treasure

In the Christmas story, we are told that the Magi followed the brilliant star in the sky to find Jesus. These noblemen were seeking the "king of the Jews" (Matthew 2:2). The star led them to Bethlehem and "on coming to the house, they saw the child with his mother Mary, and they bowed down and worshiped him. Then they opened their treasures and presented him with gifts of gold and of incense and of myrrh" (Matthew 2:11).

When the Magi entered the house and saw the baby Jesus, they immediately "bowed down and worshiped him." Before they gave their gifts, they first showed their reverence. In essence, they gave themselves. Their hearts were filled with joy to be in the presence of the King. After they had shown Jesus their adoration, they gave their gifts of gold, incense, and myrrh.

The Magi willingly gave their gifts because they had first given their hearts to Jesus. In much the same way that the Magi gave, the Apostle Paul refers to the giving of the people in the Macedonian churches. In his letter to the church in Corinth, he asks the church to give to the needy church in Jerusalem. As an encouragement for their giving, he refers to the

grace that God has given the Macedonian churches. "Out of the most severe trial, their overflowing joy and their extreme poverty welled up in rich generosity. For I testify that they gave as much as they were able, and even beyond their ability. Entirely on their own, they urgently pleaded with us for the privilege of sharing in this service to the saints. And they did not as we expected, but they gave themselves first to the Lord..." (2 Corinthians 8:2-5).


Both the Magi and the people in the Macedonian churches gave themselves before they gave their gifts. Stewardship is self-giving before it is money-giving. Jesus said, "Where your treasure is, there your heart will be also" (Matthew 6:21). Through Word and Sacrament, Jesus reveals himself to us as our treasure, and for that our hearts are eager to respond in generous giving.

For a Godly Church

Leadership may determine the church's level, but you and I determine its character. Someone has suggested:

- ➡ If the church grows, it is because your attendance is regular and you invite and bring friends regularly.
- ➡ If it is an active church, it is because you are committed to her ministries and give your time and influence to them.
- ₱ If it is a scriptural church, it is because you insist on nothing short of biblical preaching and teaching.
- ➡ If it is a friendly church, it is because you are friendly. You take the initiative to meet and greet new and old alike each week.

- ➡ If it is a soul-winning church, it is because you are a soul winner and you are interested in bringing others to Christ.
- ➡ If it is an educated church, it is because you attend the Bible School and other educational opportunities and desire to learn the Bible.
- ➡ If it is a giving church, it is because you give, not just of your tithes and offerings, but of your God-given abilities and time.



Let's work at making the church that kind of church. It takes all of us working together with our leaders and with each other. Our concern for others must be evident, and our burden for a lost world must have top priority.
