

Rejoicing on Sukkot in the Bar-Lev's Booth

I looked out one of our kitchen windows this morning, and noticed a fresh pile of leaves starting to accumulate. For me, along with beginning of the High Holy Days, those falling leaves remind me that the holiday of Sukkot is coming. It's that time of year again, when we haul out the lumber and put our Bar-Lev family sukkah (portable outdoor booth) together. It's hard to believe this will be the 10th year we have built our sukkah here in Columbus. As I write this article just before the start of our High Holy Day season, I must say, I am feeling overwhelmingly lucky and grateful to be entering my tenth year of service to this congregation. In some ways it feels like yesterday when my then-girlfriend, Lauren, helped me pack my Cincinnati apartment into a U-Haul and I first made that drive up I-71. And yet at other times, it's hard for me to remember a time before living here in Columbus. I have been so fortunate in my time here to get married, start a family, build loving and enduring relationships and friendships, and find a spiritual and ethical home here at Beth Shalom.

Throughout these 10 years, and even before, Sukkot has consistently been one of my very favorite times of the year. Along with the Fall air and the changing colors, Sukkot reminds us to take some time to slow down - to appreciate that which is most important and to thank God for all the blessings in our lives.

You may know that some of our holidays have "nicknames." Sukkot is also called "Z'man Simchateinu," which means our time for rejoicing, because it instructs us to rejoice with family and friends and reminds us that our lives and the good deeds we do are so much more important than stuff we can accumulate. Many Jews describe Yom Kippur as the holiest day of the year. We deny ourselves food, sit solemnly in the sanctuary all day, and reflect on our lives. Yes, Yom Kippur is a holy and very important day on the Jewish calendar. And yes, solemnity, dignity and reflection have a certain holiness built right into them. But, according to Jewish tradition, joy and celebration are just as holy and special to God as self-denial and solemnity. Some rabbis argue that life's pleasures and joys are basic Jewish values. Perhaps rejoicing is a mitzvah because in celebrating the pleasures of life, we are led to gratitude not for stuff, but for people and relationships.

Another important lesson from Sukkot is for us to remember what's really important. Rabbi Irving Greenberg teaches, "The s'kach, the ever green branches or bamboo or corn stalks that form the roof is meant to teach something about the true nature of protection. Human beings instinctively strive to build solid walls of security. People shut out life; they heap up treasures and power and status symbols in the hope of excluding death and disaster and even the unexpected. This search for solid security all too often leads to idolatry, to the worship of things that give security. People end up sacrificing values and even loved ones to obtain tangible sources of security. The sukkah urges people to give up this pseudo-safety." It reminds us that our ancestors were never too rooted in one place, and that material possessions aren't so important. Believe it or not, we're actually instructed to bring our most expensive vases and pillows and decorations outside to the sukkah with us, partially to beautify the sukkah but also so we remember that stuff is just stuff.

If we take these two overarching values, rejoicing with those whom we love, and thanking God for our lives rather than our possessions, we can really understand the meaning of Sukkot, and we can begin to rejoice in the blessings of our lives.

For the 10th year in a row, Lauren, the kids, and I warmly invite the entire congregation to our home for a Sukkot party on Sunday, October 8, 5pm-7pm (weather permitting). We hope you'll join us (and bring a nut-free side dish or dessert to share) to shake the lulav and etrog, spend some time relaxing with new and old TBS friends, and fulfill the mitzvah of dwelling in the sukkah, counting each of our many blessings.

10 CHAI-er Learning with Rabbi Lenette Herzog



Shanah Tovah! I am so excited to begin this fresh new year with you, the Temple Beth Shalom community, and I am especially honored to be directing the Kehillat Torah Religious School. Before the holidays, the religious school community had a great time reconnecting and meeting new friends, first at JCC Camp Hoover, and then for two more weeks at JCC New Albany.

“Kehillat Torah” is a wonderful name for a religious school, and it really fits with my vision for Jewish education at Temple Beth Shalom.

“Kehillat Torah” can be interpreted as “a community of sacred learning.” At our religious school, each student, madrich/madricha, teacher, faculty member and parent is a valuable member of our community, and brings something unique that everyone can learn from. We strive to make religious school as engaging and dynamic as possible - like camp, but more formal - using multiple learning modalities to engage students in different ways, and also “spiraling” our curriculum, so that learners can revisit material in new, deeper ways as they get older. We also emphasize the importance of music and our liturgy, as our younger and older groups of students come together for singing and prayer each week.

What makes the learning sacred? It challenges each of us to discover what being Jewish means to us - and that continually evolves with each year, into adulthood and beyond.

But the name “Kehillat Torah” also reminds us that sacred learning - the study of Torah - is far more than just accruing knowledge. We don’t just learn Jewish values, we live by them, and we use Jewish learning as a vehicle to become our best, most authentic selves, and to help heal the world.

Our tradition teaches that each person is created b’tzelem Elohim, in the image of God, and therefore we must welcome each other (hachnasat orchim) and treat each other with chesed (compassion) and kavod (respect). As a community, we teach how to be sacred to each other not just in our lessons, but how we treat each other inside and outside the classroom - in the hallways, during snack, in the parking lot.

We are so excited that our ninth and tenth graders will each be engaging in new kinds of sacred learning this year. Our ninth graders will be engaging in mitzvot and social justice, particularly the balance of learning and action. And our tenth graders will be focusing on spirituality and their own personal theologies, as they prepare to become our newest class of Confirmands.

I am tremendously humbled to be a part of this community of sacred learning that Rabbi Beny and all of you have helped create over the years, and I look forward to a wonderful year together!

Simchat Torah Fest!

Happy New Year! I hope that you experienced the spiritual introspection that you were hoping for and obtained a rich sense of fulfillment and purpose during your 5778 High Holidays.

I am so appreciative of the TBS staff, service leaders, musicians and Sharyonim Choir all of who make the three months that it takes to prepare for these Days of Awe, days of happiness and days of growth.

We have two more important holidays to look forward to this month: Sukkot and Simchat Torah.

Sukkot is the holiday when we celebrate how a small group of related tribes left slavery and came together to form a nation that has now survived over 3,000 years. Make sure to look in this Window for the exciting Sukkot events that are scheduled.

Immediately following Sukkot, we celebrate Simchat Torah. This holiday celebrates the completion of the annual reading of the Torah and affirms Torah as one of the pillars on which we build our lives. In most Temples and Synagogues the Torah scrolls are taken from the ark and carried or danced around the synagogue seven times. During the Torah service, the concluding section of the fifth book of the Torah, D'varim (Deuteronomy), is read, and immediately following, the opening section of Genesis, or B'reishit as it is called in Hebrew, is read. This practice represents the cyclical nature of the relationship between the Jewish people and the reading of the Torah.

Temple Beth Shalom takes a slightly different twist on this celebratory custom. (Are you surprised?)

Yes, there will be Torah scrolls carried around surrounded by joyous dancing, but here at Temple Beth Shalom this merriment will be accompanied by our TBS Klezmer Band!

Yes, we will hear D'varim (the last section of Deuteronomy) and B'reishit (the first book of Genesis) but we will also include sentences from other books of the Torah.

So here is my Simchat Torah request: Would you please read a sentence from your Torah portion???
You can chant it in Hebrew or English, your choice! If you need help, Rabbi Bar-Lev, Rabbi Herzog or I will be happy to help you by recording it on your phone, reviewing it with you...whatever it takes for you to be able to experience the joy of Simchat Torah.

Please let Rabbi B know if you would like to participate in the reading of the Torah and remember to wear your dancing shoes!

A Happy New Year to All!

Hag Hasomeach and L'shana Tova! Happy Holidays and a Good New Year! On behalf of the Temple's Board of Trustees, we would like to wish you, your families and your communities a most healthy, happy and secure 5778.

More than a year ago, you bestowed the privilege upon the two of us to guide the Temple's lay governance over one of our congregation's most significant bienniums. Thanks to our Immediate Past President, Steve Herman, and Evan DuBro, the groundwork for Beth Shalom's Senior Rabbinic succession was laid. Our vacant Executive Director position was presciently filled by Bonnie Abramowitz.

During the first 15 months of our term, as a result of the strenuous efforts of Rabbi Beny and our Rabbinic Search Committee co-chaired by Steve Herman and Bethany Klynn, our congregation was fortunate to lure Lenette Herzog away from Arizona and California to become our Assistant Rabbi. Bonnie, Marcie Golden and Trustees Jonathan Wolman and Don Feibel among others were able to secure a grant from the State of Ohio to strengthen security at our building for the benefit our staff, ourselves and our guests. We have signed a Lease Option with Verizon relating to the construction of a cell phone tower near the outdoor chapel . This contract could generate funds for our congregation for as many as 30 years into the future.

Even before we moved into our new home more than 20 years ago, TBS had a mortgage. Thanks to the hard work of Steve and Mike Rothstein, we are happy to inform you that our mortgage has been paid in full. However, we still need all outstanding Building Fund and Campaign pledges to be paid in full. These payments along with future generosity will allow our Temple to strengthen its future programming, enlarge our endowment and better maintain our building.

You may have noticed how many times we have used the words "our congregation". We truly believe that one characteristic that distinguishes Temple Beth Shalom from other congregations is that instead of us belonging to the Temple, the Temple belongs to each one of us. No matter how long we have been members, how much we may have contributed in sweat or treasure or how young or old we might be, we all have an equal claim to this institution.

Since we like to think of Temple Beth Shalom as one of our family, like a spouse, child, parent or sibling. I'd like to extend an invitation to you to meet some of our relatives. From December 8-10 my husband, Ira, and I will be attending the Union for Reform Judaism's Biennial Conference is being held in Boston from December 8-10. This event presents an opportunity to meet and engage with 5000 of our Reform brothers and sisters from around the country. Our temple has a scholarship fund to support a limited number of our members to attend such programs. Since the discounted registration deadline is less than two weeks away, please let the temple office know if you might be interested in joining us at a very low cost.

Although we have paid off the "house" and caught up on some deferred maintenance, there are future challenges that await us. Major work needs to be done to our driveway and parking lot. Our HVAC system is more than twenty (20) years old. We need to start boosting our college savings fund, that is, our small endowment, in order to assure the long-term well-being of our congregation. We envision a relevant and thriving Temple Beth Shalom 30 to 50 years from now. With your support during our High Holy Day appeal, we are sure that our mutual family member will be able to do for future generations at least as much as we have been able to do for our Temple.

We anticipate that at May's annual meeting, co-Presidents-Elect Dave Segal and Bonnie Cram will be elected as co-Presidents of our congregation and that on September 9, 2018 they will address us on Rosh Hashanah. We sincerely hope that each of you who attended High Holiday services this year will be in attendance then and that you will assist them and our Temple as much or more than you have in the past.

Once again, we wish you Hag Hasomeach and a wonderful 5778 for all of us!


