SWFL Five Forks Foodies Review

Well not only did I cross a bridge last month for the Foodie Review, I survived and enjoyed it. So, this month, I went even further and ventured all the way to Sanibel for dinner. A \$6 toll and a few turns off the causeway and we ended up at Traders with good friends who were kind enough to invite us to their 25th Anniversary dinner (now that's a good friendship!).

Traders is casual but certainly you can dress up a bit if you'd like. The center point of a rustic building on stilts, it boasts a nice bar upon entry and a cute coastal store.

We had a reservation and were seated quickly. Server was at the table within minutes and the girls opted for signature cocktails while the guys went as per usual with something from the small but impressive beer list.

This being our first time, I had to ask the customary questions about food prep due to food allergies and was informed that the chef can modify just about anything to my liking. Score one right there!

We opted to try a few appetizers – the classic Caesar salad with a crunchy Parm wedge, the mixed baby greens salad with a tasty raspberry vinaigrette, fresh Florida gumbo and the sesame seared rare ahi tuna. Salads were dressed well with tasty homemade dressings and the tuna looked and smelled awesome (can't have the sesame myself) and the guys said it was fresh and tasted great. The gumbo had chunks of fresh fish and was the right thickness for a savory gumbo.

While we were looking at the menu, and clearly having a good time laughing and celebrating with our friends, a vacationing couple at the table next to us came over and had to tell us how much they loved their meal, suggesting the blackened jumbo gulf shrimp over white cheddar grits (plate was practically clean so we didn't see the presentation itself) and macadamia encrusted grouper with Thai peanut sauce and mango salsa (all that was left was some basmati rice). While both sounded really good based on their rave review, we all went in different directions. My husband had the Parmesan crusted breast of chicken with lemon caper beurre blanc sauce, my girlfriend had the rack of barbecue baby back ribs, her husband had the pan-sautéed diver scallops with really cool looking striped lobster ravioli and I modified the pesto brushed salmon to be made with the lemon caper beurre blanc sauce instead of sundried tomato vinaigrette. We each sampled each other's entrees – everything was expertly cooked, sauced and plated and served hot. Ribs fell off the bone, the scallops were the perfect bounce-back consistency and lightly crispy on top. Beurre blanc was just tangy enough and a great compliment to the entrees. The piece of salmon was a very generous size and cooked exactly as an experienced chef can perfect.

Portion sizes inclusive of sides were not huge but definitely enough to fill you up.

Our server was kind enough to dress up the tangy Key lime pie with a candle for our friends and we also had the creme brule which was, once again, expertly prepared and finished with fresh berries.

After dinner we took a stroll through the attached store – it's a cute beachy vacationers higher end provisions store filled with cute clothes, kids' gifts, locally crafted jewelry, vacation home trinkets and beverage settings. Great for "a little something Sanibel" to bring home.

Dinner for four - four appetizers, four entrees, two drinks each and two desserts - was \$127 per couple, so at \$60-plus per person it's definitely not an every weekend kind of place but a great choice for a special night out or to couple with a stroll through Sanibel. Traders is definitely on our list to go back.

You can find Traders on Sanibel at 1551 Periwinkle Way, a mere 21 miles from the Ridge and a \$6 toll one way. Worth the drive for sure! Happy hour is 3 to 6 p.m. with a light menu and dinner begins serving at 5 o'clock. Definitely recommend reservations as it was quite busy and keep in mind they are closed on Sunday.

I promise to stay closer to home next time, or at least not cross a bridge or pay a toll. Feel free to make suggestions of places to try, remember - think "no chains" and "hidden gems!" Until next month!

A Former Eagle Ridge Neighbor ... **And Friend**

Ken Goebel was called home by his maker on April 4 at the age of 94. He was born on Oct. 20, 1925 in the city of Woodbury, N.J. He was my good friend and a wonderful neighbor for the past 20 years. We played golf together on many occasions and he always complained about his short drives, but he was about the straightest hitter I ever played with.

Ken enlisted in the U.S. Army on Aug. 7, 1942 and served as a combat infantryman in the European Theater during World War II with the 69th Infantry Division. For his actions he was awarded a Bronze Star; two additional Bronze Service Stars were later added to his awards.

After returning from the war he continued his education and earned a degree in electrical engineering from Drexel University. It was there that he met his future wife, Marilyn. They were married on June 10, 1949 in Philadelphia. They would have been married 70 years!

After graduation Ken worked a short time for the Westinghouse Company. He later joined the Rumsey Electrical Company selling equipment and parts, but it didn't take long for Ken to become a partner in the organization. After a successful career, Ken retired from Rumsey 40 years later.

Ken and Marilyn raised their children in Newtown Square, Pa. They moved to Fort Myers in 1998 and, in 2016 decided to move to a retirement community in Lewes, Del., near their Ken Goebel daughter Lauren Rose.



Ken Goebel is survived by his wife, Marilyn, their three children, Ken Jr., daughters Lauren and Lee Ann, and five grandchildren. He will be missed by all, including his former golfing friends.

How To Detect A Phony Census Worker

Did you know the U.S. Constitution requires the federal government to take a count of America's population every 10 years through a series of questions known as the decennial census? During this time, you can expect criminals to pose as census workers intent on stealing your personal and financial

As the United States Census Bureau prepares for the mobilization of the 2020 Census, Lee County Sheriff Carmine Marceno encourages you to be on the lookout for phishing emails, door-to-door imposters, and phony phone calls. You can expect to be asked questions about your age, ancestry, health insurance, home value and even fertility; however, the Census Bureau will never ask for:

- Your full Social Security number
- Money or donations
- Anything on behalf of a political party
- Your full bank or credit card account numbers
- Your mother's maiden name

If someone purporting to be a Census Bureau Representative contacts you and you would like to verify the authenticity of the call, email or home visit, you can reach the Census Bureau's Contact Center at (800) 523-3205 or the Atlanta Regional Office at (800) 424-6974.

For additional information on how to identify a legitimate census employee, visit www.census.gov.

To report a suspicious email or phone call you may contact the Sheriff's Office Fraud Line at (239) 258-3292. To report a suspicious person going door-to-door without proper identification, call the Lee County Sheriff's Office at 477-1000. This is the nonemergency phone number.

What is the month of July known for besides July 4? July is National Ice Cream Month and National Grilling Month. It is also Cell Phone Courtesy Month and World Kiss Day on July 6. July is Mango Month and I think using mangos in chutney is great. Here is some information about chutney.

Chutneys are made of fruit or vegetables. Chutney is similar to "salsa." It is typically served as an accompaniment to food. Chutneys are made fresh in small amounts and finished quickly. My cookbook, *In Addition...to the Entrée*

has many chutney recipes, but since July is Mango Month, I have a recipe of Lime-Mango Chutney that I think you will like. Give it a try.

Lime-Mango Chutney

- 4 cups sliced mango
- 1 onion, chopped coarsely
- 6 limes, juiced
- 1 cup sugar (option; substitute brown sugar)
- 1 cup raisins
- 1 clove garlic or 1/4 teaspoon minced garlic

Lee County Yard Waste Regulations

- Do not place out for pickup more than 24 hours early.
- Yard waste must be containerized (50 pounds or less), or securely tied into bundles not heavier than 50 pounds and no longer than 6 feet in length.
- Up to 50 pounds of unbundled palm fronds may be placed at the curb. Any excess palm fronds must be tied into bundles, each weighing 50 pounds or less.
- When using plastic bags, make sure that the contents can be easily identified by the refuse truck driver (leave a twig or small branch sticking out).
- Call 239-337-0800 for a cost estimate for large-scale yard waste disposal projects when containerizing or bundling is difficult.

QuickBooks/Insurance

• We moved to QuickBooks online as of mid-May. The data migration was successful except for some custom fields which I handled moving manually. The cost will be \$20 per month for the first two years. Then it increases to \$40 per month. We will keep an eye out for special pricing.

Mailbox Maintenance And Repair

Mailbox doors have a closure spring that eventually breaks after thousands of openings. It is important to replace them as soon as they are discovered as they usually result in a broken door, which is a much more expensive



repair. Call **Dennis Shelley**, (239) 887-1042. The cost of installing a new spring is \$34. If the door casting breaks, it costs an additional \$112 to repair the door. Dennis also has specially manufactured flagpole holders to match the lampposts. They are available for \$89 installed. Your mailbox and lamppost can also be repainted for \$49, which will bring them back to their "like-new" appearance. Dennis also offers handyman services.

• We have engaged with our accountant to have her firm perform monthly bank reconciliations for us. This was done as part of our due diligence to ensure separation of duties regarding handling of the Association's funds. This has also enabled us to increase our Fidelity (Crime) Insurance up to \$450,000

President's Monthly Report: John Spiegel

Condos v. ERPOA litigation: We await a decision from the Second District Court of Appeal.

With the assistance of resident Jim Lutsch, we obtained three bids to perform the pipe replacement work at ERCA. The Bonness company is selected based on price and prior experience of working with Bonness and their experience replacing rainwater drain piping at ERCA.
