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Psalm 90

1 Lord, you have been our dwelling place in all generations.

2 Before the mountains were brought forth, or ever you had formed the earth and the world, from everlasting to everlasting you are God.

3 You return man to dust and say, "Return, O children of man!"

4 For a thousand years in your sight are but as yesterday when it is past, or as a watch in the night.

- You sweep them away as with a flood; they are like a dream, like grass that is renewed in the morning:
- 6 in the morning it flourishes and is renewed; in the evening it fades and withers.
- 7 For we are brought to an end by your anger; by your wrath we are dismayed.
- 8 You have set our iniquities before you, our secret sins in the light of your presence.
- 9 For all our days pass away under your wrath; we bring our years to an end like a sigh.
- 10 The years of our life are seventy, or even by reason of strength eighty; yet their span is but toil and trouble; they are soon gone, and we fly away.
- 11 Who considers the power of your anger, and your wrath according to the fear of you?
- 12 So teach us to number our days that we may get a heart of wisdom.
- 13 Return, O LORD! How long? Have pity on your servants!

- 14 Satisfy us in the morning with your steadfast love, that we may rejoice and be glad all our days.
- 15 Make us glad for as many days as you have afflicted us, and for as many years as we have seen evil.
- 16 Let your work be shown to your servants, and your glorious power to their children.
- 17 Let the favor of the Lord our God be upon us, and establish the work of our hands upon us; yes, establish the work of our hands!

The month of September begins with Labor Day, which offers an occasion for a variety of activities: family get-togethers, house chores, yardwork, and travel, just to name a few. The U.S. Congress enacted Labor Day as a national holiday in 1894, ordering its observance on the first Monday of September. At that time, working conditions were miserable for the laborer, and management had unrestricted control. A work schedule of twelve hours per day, seven days per week, was common. Benefit packages didn't exist. There was truth to the worker's ballad, "I owe my soul to the company store."

Whatever the conditions, Christians were and are part of the work-force of our land. Although we have protective work laws today, we still run the risk of allowing our work to define our personhood rather than our God-redeemed personhood to define our work. I challenge you to read Psalm 90 every morning during the month of September, and as you do, may you recognize that God's gracious favor establishes your work. Because of that, you can give credit where credit is due, learn when to say "when," and be eager to get back to our Lord's work.

Genesis is clear on many things, one of them being that that God created us for work, "The LORD God took the man and put him in the garden of Eden to work it and keep it." (Genesis 2:15). That purposefulness was thwarted by Adam's and Eve's sinful disobedience. Ever since, "cursed is the ground because of you; in pain you shall eat of it all the days of your life; thorns and thistles it shall bring forth for you; and you shall eat the plants of the field. By the sweat of your face you shall eat bread, till you return to the ground, for out of it you were taken; for you are dust, and to dust you shall return." (Genesis 3:17-19)

Yet God, in grace, redeems us through the work of His Son, Jesus Christ. In holy love, we are re-created to live as God's people. God retools us in the rhythm of work that anticipates rest and rest that anticipates work. He commands, "Six days shall work be done, but the seventh day is a Sabbath of solemn rest, holy to the LORD." (Exodus 31:15).

This is hard to do in our contemporary workplaces. Today, the workplace is often plagued by moral and ethical dilemmas, which call for a Christian response. The apostle Paul says in Romans 12:2, "Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that by testing you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect."

This is difficult to do when the culture pays less attention to matters of moral obligation (personal sacrifice, rules and respect, restraint regarding physical pleasure and sexuality) and more to attitudes accentuating self-expression, individualism, self-realization, and personal choices.

Christians bear the cross of Christ in whatever vocation they perform. The bloody sweat of Christ's cross relates to our blood and sweat and tears. The cross provides the motivation for all that we do. Work for its own sake, apart from the Lord God, is void of meaning and worth. Without Christ, we lament with Solomon, "What does man gain by all the toil at which he toils under the sun?" (Ecclesiastes 1:3). In this context, Christ abides with His comforting summons, "Come to Me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest." (Matthew 11:28) His rest is our eternal "dwelling place, and underneath are the everlasting arms." (Deuteronomy 33:27), which sustain us in our endeavors.

By God's grace, there is purpose to our work. Not to work is to deprive ourselves or others of God's benefits. Each believer gets to *"labor, doing honest work with his own hands, so that he may have something to share with anyone in need."* (Ephesians 4:28) He uses us in His fields and whatever our field might be, each of us "goes out to his work and to his labor until the evening." (Psalm 104:23

Whether in the home or in the workplace, at the store or sporting events, Christians work eagerly and live as Peter exhorts, "in your hearts honor Christ the Lord as holy, always being prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you; yet do it with gentleness and respect." (1 Peter 3:15)

Francis Sheaffer was a Swiss philosopher who was fonder of the theology of Ulrich Zwingli than of Martin Luther. While he was appreciative of the spirit of Luther, he was Reformed in his view of the Means of Grace. As a result, no matter how much he complimented Luther, by the time his theology was fleshed out, he was far from an accurate biblical confession. This only proved his thesis which was known as the "Watershed Theory."

This theory proposed that two positions on any one issue may be side by side, such that it would be hard to notice any difference. But when fleshed out each position would end up miles apart. His illustration of this theory used a mountaintop snowbank. While there would be one bank of snow, the bank would be comprised of millions of individual snowflakes. At the peak of the mountain, two flakes in the snowbank would be side by side such that there would be no noticeable difference. Yet, when the sun would melt the snow, each flake would begin to role down the side of the mountain it rested on until it was miles apart from its former neighbor by the time it rested at the mountain's base.

What is my point of the theory by Schaeffer? It calls to our attention the importance of the effort we make to catechize and teach the children and adults of our congregations. As pastors and teachers, we are trained to know the intricacies of Holy Scripture. We are convinced by study and preparation that our vows of fidelity to

the Word of God are exhibited in the Lutheran Confessions. We boldly hold to the truth because it is only the Truth that sets is free from sin, death and the Devil. Not something close to it, but the actual Truth.

Satan is not afraid of that which might look closely like scripture but in reality, isn't. He is the father of lies and rejoices in the teaching of false doctrine. We are Called and installed as pastors by the Church for the purpose of preaching, teaching and administrating the sacraments as Christ gives them to us in the Word. Our Called teachers, DCE's, Deaconesses, and all

other commissioned offices are the voice God has sent to the sheep of each congregation and school that they may be led into all Truth. Sunday school teachers and confirmation instructors are of the same importance as the young and teenage children of the flock are fed from the pastures of eternal Truth.

I pray we can appreciate how important these responsibilities are. That we take them very seriously and prepare our lessons with a sincere and genuine desire to build the children and adults of our congregations with boys and girls, men and women, who will be able to recognize what might look close to biblical truth but in reality, is far from it. When it comes to the irreplaceable doctrine of justification by grace through faith alone, when it comes to the power of baptism and its salvific gift, when it comes to the real presence of the Body and Blood of Jesus given in the Holy Supper, there is no room for a teaching that sits side by side with truth, it must BE the truth.

To sit side by side leaves our members vulnerable to the wiles and ways of the Devil that only create doubt and despair. I encourage all our members to see to it that their children are in Sunday School and Bible Class. I pray all our catechumens are brought to the course work that they may study under the tutelage of a well-prepared catechist. The fall of the year is the time to gear up for this very important effort. Pray for your pas-

Work and Keep

"The Lord God took the man and put him in the garden of Eden to work it and keep it" (Genesis 2:15).

Genesis chapters one and two are familiar to us. We know them best as the Creation Account. Chapter one is where we hear the familiar, "let there be...and there was" directives. Chapter two gives us the account of Adam (the man) being formed from the "Adamah" (the dust) and becoming a living being when he receives the breath of life in his nostrils. Because of this, it would be quite easy to simply lump these two chapters into the category of creation accounts.

But do not be too hasty in this! While these two chapters do faithfully relate to us the account of creation, they also give us the creation of the "office" of steward. The man, created in the image of God in Genesis 1 and formed from the dust in Genesis 2, is created for a distinct purpose. He is created to be a steward of the perfect and beautiful creation that the Lord has made! In fact, this is THE reason that man was made. He — and we — were created in the image of God to be stewards of God's creation.

This purpose is spelled out in verse 15 of Genesis 2. The steward has one job, with two purposes. It is fitting that in the month that our nation marks Labor Day, we consider the task of steward. The first purpose of the job of steward is to work. The steward is the caretaker of the Garden. Being a steward is work! Before the fall into sin, this was not an onerous task. But it was an active thing.

Imagine being a farmer in the Garden of Eden! Work would be only harvest. No plowing. No planting. No cultivating. No weeding. The perfect garden that the Lord had made would simply produce automatically to provide for man, woman, and all living beings!

But there is a second task in verse fifteen. The word "keep" is not just a synonym for work. This second task is related to defending. This garden, holy by virtue of its being called into existence by a holy God, needed to be defended. Here is where the vocation of steward becomes priestly. The steward was to defend the perfect and holy garden from that which was unholy. Later in the Old Testament, this was the task of the priests in the tabernacle and temple. They were to defend with their lives the Holy of Holies. This too is the labor of stewardship. It is a labor that calls the steward to be willing to put the garden before life!

Stewardship was always work. It only got burdensome after the original steward, Adam, failed to defend the garden from the alien word of the serpent. But this was not a failure of harvest. It was a failure to defend the garden! As a result, all work that followed that failure became burdensome.

The steward failed but was never fired. That is why we have such an issue with stewardship to this day. We continue to live out a prefall vocation in a fallen world as failed stewards. That is why we in the church need to be reminded of our vocational call to be stewards. We so easily forget that this world is not ours to do with as we please. Nothing is ours. We are but stewards entrusted with managing the creation for the glory of God and the benefit of the neighbor.

It is a daunting task. But it is the one to which we have been called. We cannot do it on our own. Apart from the grace of God shared with us through Jesus, we would be burdened to the point of temporal and eternal death. But the Holy Spirit calls us by the Gospel! This Gospel connects us to the fertile garden of Christ's Work on our behalf. Now we are stewards of that grace! The Holy Spirit works this in and through us today and every day.

This is the work of the church. It is also the work of the individual steward. The Lord has placed us in the "garden" with the same two-fold purpose: work and keep! Enjoy your labor. For in the Lord, our labor is never in vain!
