Jeff and Thomas Cowan Memorial Foundation—William Cowan

The Foundation is a Non-profit funded mostly by donations. The focus is for scholarships of descendants of the Tribe for Higher Education or vocational training. There was one person who received a BA in Science and them mostly incentives. The board has decided to dissolve the foundation and donate the money to the tribe for Higher Education. They were current with the State of Nevada. They forgot to file IRS forms. They need to file the form. He asked for assistance from the Finance Director who help coach him and help coordinate with the IRS. They need to do this to be able to donate to the Tribe without any problems with taxes. This needs to be done prior to the end of August.

Mr. N. Frank said he tried to do his due diligence. Tribal law is very different. He was recommended to go online with the IRS. They do not want any tax liability or debt to tribe. Only cash will be involved and that it will be 100% for the same intent for higher education. They discussed everything in depth.

Mrs. Lone Eagle thanked Mr. Cowan the money would be helpful. It will provide all the documentation to Mr. N. Frank. Mr. Cowan will take the Dissolution form and authorization. Mr. Cowan left the meeting.

The Council discussed a fund for donations. This fund will be SLPT Higher Education, as a General Fund. This was the consensus of the Council.

Grant Writer Report--Larry Curley,

BACKGROUND

Council is aware of the status of these efforts.

8. **NATIONAL ENDOWMENT FOR THE ARTS**

Program will fund Sustaining Cultural Heritage Collections. Program has three funding levels for Planning, Implementation I, and Implementation II. Total funding combined is \$500,000 for a two-year period. Grant writer reviewed requirements and determined requirements are not attainable.

9. **Repatriation Grants.** Grant writer reviewed grant requirements and determined tribe not eligible due to tribe not having a repatriation office. **DUE DATE:** May 5, 2025.

10. **DOT, RURAL AND TRIBAL ASSISTANCE PILOT PROGRAM**

Grant Writer reviewed program requirements. Shared NOTO with Natural Resources Department and determined that it was not feasible at this time.

11. **Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA). *****

This grant is to develop tribally oriented suicide and substance abuse prevention programs. Program requirements as of February 7, 2025 have not been posted.

12. Department of Health and Human Services.

“Child/Infant Home Visiting Grant” funds have been posted. Grant would create a “Parents as Teachers” program that would focus on the needs of pre-natal, infant and children up until they reach kindergarten. There was not sufficient time to complete a well-written proposal. **DUE DATE:** April 4 ,2025.

13. Indian Health Service.

Funding opportunity to determine how best to enhance and provide care to persons with Alzheimer’s Disease and Related Dementia. Currently, the grant writer is working on developing a model which would meet the requirements of the grant. _Update 1. (The project required a clinical setting for the provision of these services and SLPT currently does not have the capacity to successfully implement.)_ **DUE DATE:** September 1, 2025.

14. Department of Transportation.

Reviewed GRANT ANNOUNCEMENT Rural and Tribal Assistance (RTA) Pilot Program and discussed regarding appropriateness of working with an outside organization on this grant. Pursuant to the discussion with Natural Resource Department, decision was to not pursue partnership due to application of funds in “rural” area.

15. Department of Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA).**

Reviewed Notice of Funding Opportunity to determine eligibility criteria. After reviewing the NOF, determined that SLPT did not meet criteria; funds were being released to States only. The amount being made available was \$50B.

16. INSTITUTE OF MUSEUM & LIBRARY SERVICES.

This is a two-year grant for the preservation of historical information and documents. Project envisions the creation of a tribal repository that will secure documents and artifacts of significance to Summit Lake Tribe. When funded, the project begins 07/01/2025.

17. Manuel PALMS CARE.

Grant applications are now being accepted by the PALMS CARE Foundation to tribal communities in Nevada. Grant Writer wrote a proposal that emphasizes tribal cultural preservation. A follow up request for additional information was received on April18,2025 which was submitted on April 22, 2025. A telephone conversation is scheduled for early next week. **Due Date: March 15, 2025.**

Amount requested: \$100,000.

18. Annual THPO Grant.

This grant supports the operation of THPOs. Summit Lake Paiute Tribe received an allocated formula portion of the national appropriation. This amount is an additional allocation for this fiscal year. **DUE DATE:** August 29, 2025.

Requested Amount: \$97,145

19. ARCHIVAL-202511.

Grants to fund archival projects which collect documents that are of historical significance to tribes, organizations and historical events. Upon review of criteria, the requirement for eligibility is an infrastructure in which technologic requirements (almost similar to the National Archives or the Library of Congress). More suitable for universities, state museums or tribes with tribal museums/archives.

A. No Action Taken.

20. Indian Health Service, “Tribal Injury Prevention Cooperative Agreement Program.”

This a program designed to reduce and prevent injuries in Indian Country. Among the many types of injuries listed and based on recent Council discussions regarding youth suicide prevention, the proposal will focus on this topic. It is 5-year program at \$40,000 a year. **DUE DATE: November 13,2025. Potential amount for five years: \$200,000.**

21. The Mastercard Foundation.

Currently exploring this foundation. The Mastercard Foundation in Toronto just awarded over \$150 Million to support education programs for indigenous youths in Canada. Reviewing U.S. Mastercard to determine if they are doing something similar. Upon researching U.S. Mastercard, they do not have similar programs.

22. Drug-Free Communities Support Program Grants.

Grant from the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) was designed to reduce substance abuse among youth and, over time, reduce substance abuse among adults by addressing the factors in a community that increase the risk of substance abuse. Unfortunately, grant required a 100%, dollar for dollar, match. Grant writer did not want to commit SLPT financially.

DUE DATE: February 12, 2026.

23. Global Fund for Children.

This is a funding organization that is international in scope but also can operate in the United States. Focus of funding opportunities is the empowerment of youths through education, arts and other creative avenues. Grant writer identified contacts and will be contacting for possible submission of a proposal that focuses on SLPT youths.

24. Indian Housing Block Grant (ICDBG).

Notice of Funding Opportunity for tribal housing projects. Currently reviewing grant requirements and will be requesting data and information from tribal housing staff to support application. NOFO addresses construction, acquisition and/or rehabilitation issues. **DUE DATE:** January 15, 2026. **Amount Available: \$150m (35 GRANTEES)**

25. Food Bank of Northern Nevada.

Coordinated with Christine to develop the application and waiting for signatures to submit to the Food Bank. Application includes funding for Reusable Food Bags and indigenous meats. **DUE DATE:** October 31, 2025. **Amount to be requested: \$1,835.50.**

26. SEVENTH GENERATION

Proposal to continue work on cultural preservation issues impinging on youth. **Funding Amount: \$50,000**

27. WILKES CENTER FOR CLIMATE SCIENCE AND POLICY

Funding is being made available for organizations to develop and implement programs designed to address environmental and climate change issues. Grant Writer reviewed and discussed with DNR and determined that capacity was currently not available. **DUE DATE: 2/28/26. Available Funding: \$250,000.**

28. COCA COLA FOUNDATION

The Coca Cola Foundation provides grants to organizations with an emphasis on Access to Safe Water and Watershed Conservation. These two initiatives include the conservation and preservation of rivers, lakes and their protection. Grant Writer discussed funding opportunity with DNR and determined application would be premature. **DUE DATE: On Going. FUNDING AMOUNT: \$10,000 - \$5M.**

Native American Basic Grants. Provides funding for the collection and archiving tribal artifacts, books, videos and recordings for the preservation of tribal culture. His proposal is for creation of a dance group training monthly and doing a couple of performances. **DUE: 3/13/26. Amount to be Requested: \$10,000 for one year.**

1. Wells Fargo Tribal Initiative Grant

Provides funding for capacity building for organizations related to arts and culture, thought leadership, Public Engagement. Grant writer submitted an OFI to fund a story telling project. This would complement the work being performed in the THPO Project.

Contacted the Foundation to inquire if opportunities exist to establish a fiscal/grant relationship with the tribe. Identified environmental concerns and cultural preservation as potential funding areas for the Tribe.

6. **Garrett Lee Smith (SAMHSA)****
Announcement has been posted, but the final announcement has not been published that would include eligibility and amount of funding available. Grant would be a youth suicide prevention program.

7. **CHOICE Neighborhoods (DHUD)****
Planning Grants (up to \$500k) to create comprehensive revitalization plans, focusing on improving Housing, People, and Neighborhoods. These grants leverage public and private investment for mixed-income housing, resident services (health, education, jobs), and neighborhood amenities, often awarded to Public Housing Authorities (PHAs) and local governments. Posted on 12/9/25, but application has not been published.

8. **PROJECT AWARE (SAMHSA)****
Announcement has been posted, but no closing date or application documents are in the process of being announced. Projects funds drug awareness programs in the context of education that would include communities and families.

9. **AmeriCorps VISTA****
Announcement regarding the availability of funding for a variety of AmeriCorps programs. In reviewing the different programs, it appears that the VISTA program is a likely candidate to pursue for funding opportunities. These people are volunteer in service to America. According to the announcement, funds, staffing or technical assistance is available through the program. He will need input from to determine what assistance the tribe requires. A concept paper is the first step in the application process. **DUE DATE:** March 26, 2026.

SUMMARY

This report concludes my work during this reporting period. On a daily basis, He reviews announcements in Grants.gov, Federal Office of Rural Health, Health Resources and Services Administration, Candid (philanthropy funding newsletter) and Tribal Fund Registry. In response to ensuring the THPO submits its Final Report to the National Park Service, a comprehensive report was crafted for submission to the funding agency. These are important to maintain the tribe in good standing as grants are being sought in a very competitive environment .

There are grants he is looking at that are still in pending. They are posted but have no due date. The information needed to put together a proposal have not been complied, or the departments decides to not fund, or funds are not available, or they do not know when the funds will become available. Education grants are up it the air. Grants.gov changed to SimpleGrants.gov. He is still looking for foundation grants.

She received one complete application. She contacted the Enrollment Committee and shared their contact information with them. They have not set up a time to meet. She gave out one application.

Progeny

Updating files when needed.

Owyhee's Enrollment called about a past member. They shared information to get the correct blood degree for past member and his grandson. Because this family had relinquished and re-enrolled a couple of times the family's blood degrees were recorded inaccurately. She will need more information going back to the 1940 census to fix what they have in their files.

Owyhee has similar findings with their files like missing documents, incomplete records, empty files, etc. They will be working together to gather and share information to correct the files on the families they have in common. Some of the SLPT members' records are missing the other blood degrees from the Owyhee Shoshone side and they are missing SLPT's. This does not change their members' enrollment; it will change their total blood degrees.

They had 24 people in attendance. 12 SLPT youth, one non-SLPT youth, four SLPT elders, four SLPT parents, three adults. Thursday, March 5, 2026, they had 32 people in attendance. 16 SLPT youth, four non-SLPT youth, eight SLPT adults, four non-SLPT adults. The next Powwow Club will be on March 19, 2026, 5:00 -7:00 pm.

Beaded Rope Class: It was scheduled for February 21-22, 2026, rescheduled due to weather. Jennifer Ackley for Yerington taught the class. Saturday, February 28, 2026, they had 20 people in attendance. Sunday, March 1, 2026, they had 33 people in attendance.

Mrs. Lone Eagle stated that she knew that there was a complaint made about the pantry. The same individual is getting rental assistance. There were questions about the turn-a-round time from when she submits her stuff to Housing, the check is signed and then mailed. It was learned that it was mailed to an old address so it did not go to the new person who has taken over the lease agreement with the broker. Mr. Frank issued another check which was hand delivered. The first check was returned two days later. This person was concerned about late fees. The need to come up with a plan or process to avoid this in the future. Mr. Frank said they can process one week earlier.

Mr. Pollock is for conservation and growing things. He has grown cannabis and organic foods for 15 years. People are not conscious of the difficulties. He believes in a resources system he calls GROW he has been building for four years.

He is conservation based, saving resources while maximizing output. He works with micro-grids.

He believes current industries have been lying about alternatives. He has been looking at micro-grids. He laid it out to see if it could benefit the tribe.

The system: growth, process-market place and final product.

His system is scalable.

He loves nature. He showed some slides on his growing things.

He learned how to draw up what he wants to do, then asked experts if it was good or what to change. He showed slides of his own Co-gen system with the growth facility and power plant for plant to use and sell.

Co-gen is cheap power generating your own power and heat. HVAC is the biggest energy consumer.

He explained the cost of power outages in failed growth system, loss of plants

Co-gen provides opportunities, control of who or what you want.

Nevada has gas at a cost of 6 1/2¢ per KWatt.
The more power used, the faster it pays for itself.

Solar vs. Cogen: solar is best as supplemental power. Cogen is constant power generation. Equipment can be leased.

He discussed the companies who built the equipment.

There is the ability to optimize. Everything is purpose built and specific. The system is modular and scalable.

The process takes a total of 18 month and pays for itself in 14 months.

Mr. Pollock left the meeting at 12:33 pm

There was a brief discussion. There would be the cost of the pipeline from the main line to the Reservation. BLM review and environmental review.

He is currently the Chief Operating Officer for Native Public Media , a non-profit working with tribal licensed radio and TV stations throughout the country. They also do emergency planning training. They focus on MMIP Indigenous Person, Federal System Emergency Alert—Amber Alert.

Integrated Alert System, the tribe can be part of the system by becoming an Alert Authority.

He serves on the Sacre Vision Powwow Committee and UNR Native American Alumni as well as many other organizations.

Why does he want to be a County Commissioner—

Gerlach has no firefighter services emergency services. He thought they must have felt forgotten. We are one Washoe County. We all deserve total safety. He is part of the Washoe Leadership Academy, but it seems every one is working on their own. Responsible growth—where is the water coming from. They need sustainable resources.

Open Communication—will hold quarterly Town Halls in various location in the district. He understands Tribal Sovereignty

Ms. Crane asked if Mr. Frank had looked for a new Finance Clerk. He has one who has applied, but needs to get passed Native Preference.

She can access ASAP. Mr. Frank still cannot.

Mr. Simmons asked about IDC rate proposal. He does not have IDC yet. He will probably get it after the Audit is complete

The Chairwoman called a break at 2:32 pm.

Returned from break at 2:48 pm.

Mrs. Lone Eagle said she did get agreement CCDF for the child care She also got an updated child count for the ITCN 2023-2025 FY26 ITCN report.

Natural Resources Department—James Simmons

Accomplishments or Noteworthy Events

- Snowpack is still very low! The watershed is half of what it had been before. This is a good test of what they have been doing with reed canary grass. They are interested in the fish trap and spawning run. Predictions for next year is an EL Nino wet season.
- Sage grouse captures started Sunday, March 15, 2029. Field season now underway! Fisheries and Lake sampling start the following week.
- Whether they are SLPT staff or under contract with GBI, NRD fully staffed! This year is busier, wrapping up the BOR grant.
- Climate Adaptation Plan completed. First ever climate plan for the Tribe. The grant started in 2023. They will put it to the members. They will post the plan on NRD Facebook page. The intent is a living document to make it revisited every three to five years to review for updates.
- Water rights on Mahogany Creek, Snow Creek, and the Lake as part of the SSOAR grant. Streams went through program and are ready for permits but they want to resubmit on Lake water. If all is good, pay for creek permits and 60 days.

Discussion Topics

1. SL-14-2026: Approval to Apply for the Environmental Protection Agency FY2027 General Assistance Program (GAP), Clean Water Act Water Quality (106), and Nonpoint Source Pollution (319) Program Base Grants, Fund 723

This is for the annual approval for three base EPA grants over three to four years. It pays for RTOC for Council, Mr. Simmons and a NRD staff. RTOC conference in Spring—April 15 to 17, 2026; Summer—May 1 to 3, 2026 in San Francisco, California; and Fall—in October. Mr. Simmons read the pertinent portions of Resolution SL-14-2026 for \$200,000.

MOTION: Vice-Chairwoman Nedra Crane moved to approve and accept Resolution SL-14-2026 Approval to Apply for the Environmental Protection Agency FY2027 General Assistance Program (GAP), Clean Water Act Water Quality (106), and Nonpoint Source Pollution (319) Program Base Grants with the reading. Secretary/Treasurer Philip Frank seconded the motion. Chairwoman Randi Lone Eagle called the

vote: 3 FOR. 0 AGAINST, 0 ABSTAINED. Resolution SL-14-2026 enacted at 3:19 pm.

2. SL-15-2026: Approval to accept BIA Transportation one-time funding agreement

This is a one-time funding of \$22,970.96 for Transportation out of the Phoenix, Arizona. It is separate from the BIA Long Range Transportation Plan. Mr. Simmons wants to Table it to the April Council meeting. It is due in May. It is only for items on the current TTP plan.

3. SL-16-2026: Approval to apply for FY2026 NDOW Heritage Grant for Sage Grouse Population Monitoring and Habitat Improvement.

This is a quick turn-a-round. They had three days to get it in. This is a new grant. The money is through special tags (Dream Tag and Heritage tag) and will be used for sage grouse monitoring and population work. It is NDOW-State of Nevada and has no IDC. Mr. Simmons brought it to Council. They can always pull it back if necessary. The grant is for July 1, 2026 to June 30, 2027. It is a reimbursement grant. Mr. Simmons read the pertinent portion of Resolution SL-16-2026 for \$100,000.

MOTION: Vice-Chairwoman Nedra Crane moved to approve and accept Resolution SL-16-2026 : Approval to Apply for FY2026 NDOW Heritage Grant for Sage Grouse Population Monitoring and Habitat Improvement with the reading. Council Member Scott Cory Burdette seconded the motion. Chairwoman Randi Lone Eagle called the vote: 3 FOR. 0 AGAINST, 0 ABSTAINED. Resolution SL-16-2026 enacted at 3:35 pm.

Mrs. Lone Eagle read an email on a grant. She is seeing grants very late and with quick turn-a-rounds. If necessary, they can call a special meeting in 24 hours if necessary. She thinks this could be intentional and why nobody is applying for them.

4. SL-17-2026: Approval to apply for 2026 NFWF Western Big Game Seasonal Corridor Habitat and Restoration

This is to improve habitat and migration for antelope and mule deer. Last year they retrofitted parts of the boundary fence with wildlife friendly fencing. This year's application will focus on habitat improvement. Mr. Simmons read the pertinent portions of SL-17-2026.

MOTION: Vice-Chairwoman Nedra Crane moved to approve and accept Resolution SL-17-2026 Approval to Apply for 2026 NFWF Western Big Game Seasonal Corridor Habitat and Restoration with the reading. Secretary/Treasurer Philip Frank seconded the motion. Chairwoman

**Randi Lone Eagle called the vote: 4 FOR. 0 AGAINST, 0 ABSTAINED.
Resolution SL-17-2026 enacted at 3:48 pm.**

5. SL-18-2026: Approval to apply for FY26 EPA Region 9 Wetlands Program Development Grant—This is a competitive grant.

This is for two projects: a Wetland Management Plan and Wetlands project for beaver dam analogs. It is to encourage innovation. The grant is \$100,000-\$200,000. NRD is waiting to do two projects in one grant. If not, they would do the Management plan first.

Mr. Burdette was concerned that the dams would lower water too much. It could prohibit spawning in the North Channel . Mr. Simmons said there was no spawning in the North Channel last year. He believes the reed canary grass restoration work has changed that. He said that he does not think that it is good to mess with the ecosystem due to the drought conditions and the system is already too fragile.

Mr. Simmons said the plan would involve all the wetlands. They would focus on the plan. If they do allow the BDA project, they would not start on it until next year.

Mr. Burdette pointed out another wet area. Also Mr. Simmons confirmed they will not work in any allotment. Mr. Burdette would like to use drones. They are having problems where Federal dollars cannot pay for any Chinese made drones.

Mr. Simmons read the pertinent portions of SL-18-2026.

Mrs. Lone Eagle said they need to check with the government to see whether they can use electronic signatures on contracts or soft copies. The resolution just says allow, not require. Mr. Simmons read the pertinent portions of Resolution SL-19-2026.

7. SL-20-2026: Approval of Wildscape contract for NV AB578 Project Reed Canary Grass Off Reservation

This project has already been okayed by Council. There are three projects under this grant. The first project was to retrofit the fencing along Mahogany with wildlife friendly fencing. The second was habitat restoration. It is the third project for the reed canary grass control work off the Reservation from the Reservation boundary into the headwaters.

Mr. Simmons read the pertinent portions of Resolution SL-20-2026.

MOTION: Vice-Chairwoman Nedra Crane moved to approve and accept Resolution SL-20-2026 Approval of Wildscape Contract for NV AB578 Project Reed Canary Grass Off Reservation with the reading. Secretary/Treasurer Philip Frank seconded the motion. Chairwoman Randi Lone Eagle called the vote: 4 FOR. 0 AGAINST, 0 ABSTAINED. Resolution SL-19-2026 enacted at 4:27 pm.

8. Nevada Division of Natural Heritage visit in April for snails, moss, and rare plants and scuds for surveys– April 13, 2026 Fund 1341.

This is to confirm a date for the surveys for snails, moss, and rare plants and collect scuds on the reservation. They also want to collect some scuds for identification. The date proposed is April 13, 2026.

It is the consensus of the Council to confirm the date.

9. Approval for updated Rangeland Management Plan – NRCS 5002

This is for approval to update the plan to make SLPT eligible to apply for sage grouse grants for NRCS. They would come on the Reservation to do surveys. Mr. Simmons is suggesting updating the current plan.

It is the consensus of the Council to approve an updated Rangeland Management Plan- NRCS 5002.

Mr. Burdette would also like the Council to be included in creating the plan.

10. Review of social media guidelines for NRD Fund 723

Mr. Simmons read the proposed draft guidelines including:

Mr. Burdette says this concerns social media because someone posts something that gets thousands of views. Now you have a lot of attention. That would be opening up for challenges. He does not see opening the door and inviting that tension. He heard some says he can go on the Reservation and welcomes people whom SLPT does not have the resources to handle. People do get hostile.

Mr. Simmons will bring it back to the next meeting. He is looking for feedback.

Mr. Burdette said it was a good draft.

NEW BUSINESS

Harney Electric: Mrs. Lone Eagle received mail asking for SLPT to send voting representative signatures, one member one vote. The Chairwoman Lone Eagle and the Vice-Chairwoman Crane the voting representatives.

Mrs. Lone Eagle received an email. There are college students wanting to get permission to come onto the Lake as a school bike expedition.

Mr. Simmons volunteered to handle the request. There are three main roads on the Reservation that are public roads under the jurisdiction of the BIA and the county. The public can be on those roads. Any other roads are not open to public. They can go only on the public roads and nowhere else. Mr. Simmons will contact the school group.

Mrs. Lone Eagle was told there was someone who has been barred who said they were the current Secretary/Treasurer. They do not know who they were.

Mrs. Lone Eagle got a letter from Natural Resources Conservation Service asking about completing conservation projects. Mr. Simmons said he has been working with them so they finish their archeology review.

NRD needs Microsoft licenses for new staff. NRD will purchase them. He will contact PacState. It was the consensus of the Council to move forward.

Higher Education

Mr. Mace sent an application with total needs of \$6,792. There is only \$696 left in the fund. The Council approved \$696.

MOTION: Vice-Chairwoman Nedra Crane moved to approve Resolution SL-21-2026 for Higher Education Assistance for Mr. E. Mace in the amount of \$696 without the reading. Council Member Scott Cory Burdette seconded the motion. Chairwoman Randi Lone Eagle called the vote: 4 FOR, 0 AGAINST, 0 ABSTAINED. Resolution SL-21-2026 enacted at 5:02 pm.

They discussed the 7th Generation Fund award. It is for a service agreement with TLC to provide storybooks and a vocabulary application. Summit Lake would recruit the speakers. The grant is for \$40,300. Ms. Trejo wants to tie it in with the previous Paiute Language classes. The language classes are on You Tube for TLC. They would like to involve Thalia Dick.

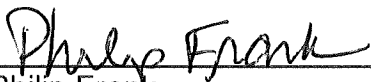
