## **WW II TRIVIA for January 2021**

- On January 1, 1946 Emperor Hirohito went on Japanese radio and renounced his divinity.
- He said it had been nothing more than a historical myth.
- In mid 1940, just before declaring war on France, Mussolini boasted that his Italian military could recover the whole of the old Roman Empire.
- In many US aircraft factories, midgets were employed because they could get into tight places to do construction work.
- General Patton's personal jeep had specially cushioned seats.
- US atomic bombs had built-in radar fuses that sensed the bomb's altitude above the ground. They were set to detonate the bomb at about 1500 feet above ground.
- In Norway after the war the Norwegian Government passed a law called the "War-baby law." The law provided for the records of children born of German fathers and Norwegian mothers to be obscured from the public. It also allowed for the baby's names to be changed if so desired and for their secret adoption. The costs for all of this were added to Norway's war reparation claims against Germany.
- President Truman, when pinning a Congressional Medal of Honor around the neck of a recipient would, on occasion, say, "I would rather have one of these than be President of the United States."
- During WW I rumors of subversive acts by secret German agents in the US ran rampant. Rumors circulated that German sailors were coming ashore from submarines and attending theaters in order to spread influenza germs. It was also rumored that German agents were poisoning wells and putting ground glass in food and medicines. German place names were changed. Berlin, OH became Lincoln, OH, German Street in Cincinnati was renamed English Street and sauerkraut was renamed "liberty cabbage."




## What is special about January 2021?

In light of John Shively's upcoming lecture series and the fact that last month we commemorated the Japanese attack on our Pacific Naval Base at Pearl Harbor, were there any warning signs of trouble to come in January '41?

- January 16, 1941: US vice admiral Bellinger warns of an assault on Pearl Harbor
- January 27, 1941: Peruvian ambassador Ricardo Rivera-Schreiber warns American Ambassador of Japanese assault on Pearl Harbor

In light of these warnings, what was the general public's understanding of possible war in the Pacific? When the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor, why did so many Americans have to look up the location on an atlas? Where was this far away place and why did it matter? The following newspaper page reveals a lot about our public awareness or lack thereof—for an attack against American bases in the Pacific. By Richard Haller, International News Service



Honolulu. T. H., Jan. 18 — United States naval forces centered in Hawaiian waters, these days never less than two-thirds of the entire fleet, are ready to attack if war should come in the Pacific. Theoretically the words attack and offensive are not in the dictionary of American fighting preparedness, everything is defense, and the spending of \$100,000,000 and more on armaments in the Pacific area is called a defense program. But a large part of it is definitely for offensive warfare, and most strategists declare that any war in the Pacific, whether defensive or punitive, would necessitate offensive effort by the armed for forces of the United States.


#### **Areas Must be Protected**

There is no war machine in the Far East, they say, prepared to venture as far from home as Hawaii or Alaska, but since the United States is committed to resist attempts at expansion southward by far eastern powers, and possibly territorial acquisitions of the Axis nations, it would be necessary for the fleet to carry any fight to the areas threatened.

That is why bases are being rushed to completion at Midway and Wake Islands northwest and west of Hawaii, where the transpacific clippers pause, and

south of Hawaii near the Equator at Palmyra, Canton and others of the "line" group. Not too much is known about what is going on at those remote atolls. There are no steamer stops. Workmen and materials are transported by army and navy. Clipper passengers catch only scant outlines. But dredges have been towed from Honolulu to scoop out harbors and underground fuel tanks have been shipped to at least some of the islands. **Fueling Stations Built** Fields for land planes and channels for seaplanes have been provided and fueling stations for small surface craft have been constructed. Offensive naval war in the western Pacific would require a tremendous service of supply, of which Honolulu and Pearl Harbor would be the heart. Even there oil, ammunition and food would be from six to ten days nearer than the Pacific Coast. Wake Island, some 2,000 miles westward from Hawaii, will be ready to serve in similar if lesser capacity, and Guam, another 1,000 miles westward, will not

be useless, even though defenses there are not so far advanced. Guam lies between Japan and the Japanese-mandated Caroline group. Wake and the "line" island bases are not far from the north coast of Australia and coveted new Guinea. Then there is the understanding that the British bases at Singapore and Hongkong would be available to the United States fleet. Singapore Vital That would be absolutely vital to any offensive warfare the fleet would attempt to wage in the Far East. As useful and indispensable as the smaller American-owned bases would be, they will not have the facilities for servicing battle craft. With Singapore and Hongkong bases for supply stations and with the string of secondary-bases stretching across the Pacific from the main base at Pearl Harbor, there is scarcely and area more than 1,000 miles from a source of fuel. 

This series is about the war in the Southwest Pacific Theater with some attention to the threat to Australia.

The lecture will include discussion of these targets: 1) Pearl Harbor 2) Malaya 3) Singapore 4) Hong Kong 5) Philippines 6) Wake 7) Midway 8) SS *Cynthia Olson* (torpedoed on the high seas)

Originally as conceived, this series was initially intended for an Australian audience, but provides a solid foundation for studying the campaigns in the Central and Northern Pacific.



Toll, *Pacific Crucible: War at Sea in the Pacific, 1941-1942* (editor's note) This book examines in depth Nimitz and Halsey's operations and strategies and is very readable. Fascinating reading and a good preparation for the first and subsequent lectures in this series.

### Of Local Interest to Hoosiers: Gerald Mansbach's WW2 Story

At 94, most of Gerald Mansbach's World War II memories are crystal clear. It's a bit surprising, because he couldn't even remember his own name for several months after being blown out of a Sherman tank on Jan. 25, 1945. The Barrington of Carmel resident, who served as a sergeant in the Army and tank commander in the U.S. Army, has relayed his story to many audiences the last several years. "Gerald's speech was one of the most moving speeches I've ever heard. It was so personal and brought me to tears both times I heard his speech," Barrington resident Claire Campbell said. "I was a kid during World War II, so to hear him speak about it was very moving. It's amazing that at (his age), he still remembered all the places and dates in which things occurred." In 2013, Mansbach was awarded the prestigious French Legion of Honor, originally created by Napoleon Bonaparte. Mansbach's other military honors include a Purple Heart, Silver Star and Bronze Star.

For a little background, "Mansbach's Fourth Armored Division was part of Gen. George S. Patton's Third Army. Mansbach's tank division had just done its part in holding off the German offensive in the Battle of the Bulge. On a fateful January 1945 day, Mansbach was ordered to surveil and report on a German city. After a vicious attack by the Germans at a crossroads, his tank took a direct hit. "I didn't remember what I was doing there or who I was — nothing," he said." Mansbach spent months in hospitals recovering from physical and mental injuries and he was eventually reunited with his family.

Just a reminder, there are a couple tips before your join one of our a sessions. You may have the option to join meeting session with or without video. If you join with video, be sure lighting in front of you so that your image is viewable, not a dark silhouette and set your camera (laptop) pretty much level with your face. As soon as the Host opens the meeting you will be immediately entered. I suggest that everyone do this well before the start time of the meeting. 10-15 minutes is not too early, or in other words between 6:45-7:00. After all, you do not want to miss the opening of the meeting!

Zoom protocol for the January Meeting

Not everyone should speak at once. Normally, the moderator will mute everyone then ask the next speaker to unmute. The mute icon is a microphone at the bottom left corner. Move your cursor to that area; this turns the selection bar on and you may unmute when you are asked to share your story, then re-mute yourself when done. For our audience, there is a "Chat" icon at the bottom middle of your screen. If you click on it everyone attending the meeting is listed. You can select their name and send them a chat text message while the meeting is going on. You can also send "Everyone" a text message. Response back to you will be indicated by a number in the chat icon. If you need to step away from the meeting to get a cup of coffee, kiss the wife or let the dog out you can "Stop Video" at the lower left of your screen. If you have entered a picture of yourself in your Zoom account profile that image will appear. When you return to the meeting click 'Start Video ' and your camera's image will come back on-line. At many of these sites, memorials have been erected which are not listed in this book because they are so numerous. These memorials can be located by utilizing the companion book - World War II Museums, Memorials, and Historic Displays in the United States.

1919 The First Year of WWII	'The First Year of World War II, 1919', puts forward the idea that the events of 1919 were so significant that they in fact saw the beginning of World War Two, such a short while after the end of the First World War. This book explores the events that took place and discusses their impact. Key events such as Hitler and Mussolini entering politics, the Bolsheviks beginning to win the Russian Civil War and so Stalin gaining power and of course the effect of the severe Treaty of Versailles on an already damaged Germany are covered in detail. #### LOCAL AUTHOR'S NEW RELEASE FEATURES MORE WWII VETERANS' STORIES

Bluffton, Ind.—Indiana author Kayleen Reusser, known for writing several series of books featuring stories centered on World War II, has just completed a second book in fall 2020. This title, We Defended Freedom: Adventures of World War II Veterans, is Book 4 in her WWII Legacies series. It includes the stories of 28 World War II veterans from various branches of the U.S. military. All but two of the veterans hail Indiana. The exceptions are a veteran from Virginia along with Woody Williams, the only living World War II Medal of Honor recipient from Kentucky.


Reusser's stories include an officer of an aircraft carrier, an Army soldier at D-Day, a sailor who was stationed at Cuba, and a pilot who flew in the South Pacific. Among the compilation are stories of two women who served in the Army as a WAC (Women's Army Corps) and in the WAVES (Women Accepted for Volunteer Emergency Service).

"It is exciting to present another group of World War II veteran stories to readers," said Reusser. "This collection of four books tells about the war, not from the generals' point of view, but from the viewpoint of the soldier, sailor and airman. They are how we won the war and why we have our freedoms today. My goal is to present stories in an exciting and factual way that will help readers appreciate what our veterans have done for us." Reusser has written books in other series: Witnesses of War; World War II Insider.

Since 2014, Reusser has published books of stories of America's oldest military veterans. "Documenting how past wars have helped to shape the world of today has been a rewarding challenge," she said. She releases new titles near Veteran's Day to commemorate and show appreciation for that group of citizens.

Reusser is the wife and mother of U.S. Air Force airmen. "I firmly believe we need to teach people about patriotism because if we don't reinforce its importance, we could be in a position to lose it," she said. "My method of presenting it is through sharing veterans' stories. My books are part of a continued effort to preserve our

national military heritage."



Reusser recently completed a book of Prisoner of War stories entitled *Captured!* Stories of American WWII Prisoners of War (Prisoner of War series). [JUST RE-LEASED 11/20]

She has also finished a coloring book featuring women from World War II whom she has interviewed. "The coloring book could encourage people of all ages to become familiar with women who volunteered to serve in the military when much of society disapproved," she said. "I admire them for their pluck."
