Gemstone Treatments (Part 1 of 4) Jerry Johnson, Gemologist

Introduction

Many of the popular gems used in jewelry today have been subjected to some sort of treatment, usually to enhance color or improve clarity, which results in an increase in value. The vast majority of rubies and sapphires are routinely heat treated. Likewise, the majority of tanzanite in the market is the result of the heat treatment of brown zoisite. Many gems are irradiated to enhance their color. Electron bombardment is used to produce various colors in diamonds. Both gamma and neutron irradiation are used to treat topaz. Many other types of treatments are routinely used on other gemstones.

In this series of four articles, I will discuss the application of these treatments: heat, irradiation, impregnation, chemical treatments and coatings. The discussion is an overview, and as such, not all of the details of a given process will be covered.

Heat Treatment

Heat Treatment of Sapphires

Many people are familiar with the sapphires that come from Montana. I have dug for them on several occasions and this past year sent a batch to Montana for heat treating. Sites for digging are on the Missouri river near Helena and at Rock Creek (Phillipsburg). While these locations will yield stones that can be cut without using any treatments, the majority of the sapphires can be treated to improve clarity and color.

Pure sapphire (corundum; aluminum oxide) is colorless. All color in sapphire is the result of impurities. The blue color of sapphire, as it is found in nature, comes from an interaction between two impurities, iron and titanium. The titanium is usually present as rutile (titanium dioxide) and in many of the stones from the Missouri river sites the rutile appears as inclusions called "silk". The stones will have a greasy appearance and the color is usually a light blue or a green shade.

The heat treatment of sapphires requires high temperatures and a controlled atmosphere. Temperatures are usually in the range of 1600 to 1750 Celsius (Corundum melts at 2052 Celsius), but depending upon the desired result, temperatures may be in the range of 1300 to 1900 Celsius. A reducing atmosphere is required. This can be accomplished by using hydrogen, but it is hazardous and violent explosions can occur. So, a much less explosive mixture of hydrogen and nitrogen is used. Also, reducing conditions can be obtained by controlling the ratio of carbon monoxide to carbon dioxide. Treatments require sophisticated equipment and this represents a significant investment.

Blue is not the only color that is produced via heat treatment. Heating of near colorless stones to 1200 Celsius in an oxidizing atmosphere can yield nice yellow sapphires. Sometimes pink and pinkish orange are produced.

Color enhancement of rubies can also be accomplished with heat treatment. The brownish and purplish rubies from Thailand can be heated to a temperature below 1000 Celsius in an oxidizing atmosphere to yield stones that have improved red tones.

Heat Treatment of Other Stones

Tanzanite is heat treated zoisite. Zoisite is trichroic and as such exhibits three colors in three directions. Normally the colors are brown, blue and violet. The heat treatment removes the brown and the result is a more intense blue to purple color. The literature lists treatment temperatures from 370 to 500 Celsius. I have treated a number of zoisites and found that I got a better result at temperatures in the range of 540 to 570 Celsius. Heating and cooling of the stones must be done slowly. I put the rough stones in to a cavity cut into a fire brick and then slowly brought the temperature up to the desired value over a period of 2-3 hours. After holding for a couple of hours at temperature the furnace was turned off and was allowed to cool to room temperature before the fire brick was removed. I then faceted the stones to the desired shape. I have read that some people heat the stones after faceting. I consider this to be risky as there is always the possibility that some fine cracks may develop as a result of the treatment.

Pink topaz is produced by heating brownish-yellow and orange topaz at 550 Celsius.

Heating amethyst at 450 Celsius yields a dark citrine.

Reddish brown zircon can be changed to a blue color by heating at 1000 Celsius in a reducing atmosphere, while heating the same material in air at 900 Celsius will produce colorless zircon.

Greenish beryl can be heated at 450 Celsius to yield blue beryl (aguamarine).

Some dark green tourmalines can be heated (370 C) so as to lighten the color.

Carnelian agate has been made by heating yellow agate. Yellowish to brownish tiger's eye is heat treated to make a reddish hue.

Finally, amber can be hot pressed to yield larger pieces which are then carved into various forms.

Detection of heat-treated stones is possible in some cases. Heat treated sapphires may exhibit unusual color zoning and fractured inclusions. It is difficult to find evidence of treatment in tanzanites. In many cases sophisticated laboratory procedures are required to detect any treatment.

In the April Geode, the next article will cover irradiation treatments.

I obtained my skills via course work with the GIA to become a gemologist.
