PACT Fall Conference, Tuesday, October 15, 2013 Workshops

1. TITLE: Relationships that Build a Cooperative Preschool

PRESENTER: Leta Mach, Vice President Resources, Parent Cooperative Preschools International; and retired Director of Co-op Education and Communications at the National Cooperative Business Association

CONTENT AREA: Community, Professionalism

DESCRIPTION & GOALS: Cooperative Preschools are a part of a wider community, a community of cooperatives, preschools, educators, parents, the surrounding neighborhood, landlords and other businesses. This workshop will explore the relationship of the cooperative and its leaders with stakeholders within and without the cooperative. Participants will be asked to share and discuss their experiences including recent research and trends and the impact of these on the operations of a cooperative preschool. We will generate ideas that can improve the relationship of the cooperative to the surrounding community.

TITLE: "I Can Be the Author!": Creative Writing with Young Children
PRESENTER: Emily Ederer, Staff Development Coordinator, SSDS
CONTENT AREA: Curriculum

DESCRIPTION & GOALS: A love of reading and writing starts in the preschool years. In this workshop, participants will practice using a variety of arts-integrated teaching techniques that can help children experience the creative joy of using language. We'll learn easy ways to use song writing, round-robin storytelling, and dramatic tableaus with young children.

As a result of this workshop, participants will be able to:

- Write collaborative songs with children that reinforce other curriculum and help children experience sentence structures.
- Facilitate round-robin storytelling with preschool children to help them learn about the parts of a story.
- Lead children in creating dramatic tableaus that help with listening, reading comprehension and interpretation.
- 3. TITLE: Ensuring Participation for All Expanding Learning Opportunities with Technology

PRESENTER: Sue Mistrett, Project Director, Lets Participate! US

Department of Education

CONTENT AREA: Special Needs, Curriculum

DESCRIPTION & GOALS: With increasingly diverse classrooms, a universal approach intentionally plans for the individual learning needs

of all children in the program. Universal design (UD) principles guide the educator to expand options for materials and teaching strategies to ensure the active participation and engagement of every child in daily activities.

- This workshop will demonstrate how a universal approach can enhance everyday learning
 opportunities by including more options to better address the range of abilities, interests and
 needs of the children in the classroom.
- A range of flexible, adaptable technology supports will be highlighted, including ways to make the
 classroom environment accessible to all children with visual and sensory considerations. iPad apps
 to support the communication and learning needs of children with disabilities will be included.
- Technology tools that provide alternate means for creative expression, story making, science and community exploration will be shared. Other strategies include ways to use cameras and photos to record and share daily events.
- 4. TITLE: Improvisatory Theater Skills for the Preschool Teacher

PRESENTER: Oran Sandal (Living Stage Theater) & Pickett Craddock (Pre School teacher)

CONTENT AREA: Child Development, Curriculum, Community

DESCRIPTION & GOALS: This workshop seeks to share some of the improvisational theater skills developed by Living Stage Theater Company over its 35 years of working with very young children. In addition, we will address some of the techniques and philosophy of Liev Vygotski and his Tools of the Mind system. Among the guiding questions we will address are:

- How can the adult move the play forward without telling the kids what to do? How can listening to the children and enacting their ideas be enhanced?
- When is it time to back off your input and let the children lead?
- What theater skills can help adults to be better players? How important is it that the teacher be a good player herself/himself?
- 5. TITLE: LEARNING FROM ASSESSMENT: Improving classroom practice through child observation. PRESENTERS: Louisa Tarullo, Ed.D. and Emily Moiduddin, Ph.D. (Mathematica)

CONTENT AREA: Curriculum, Child Development

DESCRIPTION & GOALS: Mathematica Policy Research developed the *Learning from Assessment Toolkit (LFA Toolkit)*, which is designed to support staff in Head Start, Early Head Start, and other early care and learning settings in child assessment activities to improve instruction at the child, classroom, or program level. The Toolkit can support staff across the range of curriculum and assessment systems already in place. The LFA Toolkit is posted on the web-based Head Start Early Learning and Knowledge Center (ECLKC), where is it considered an important resource for Head Start and the early childhood field. This workshop will provide an introduction and hands-on guide to using the materials in the Toolkit. Participants will gain increased knowledge of the importance of tracking children's progress, practice using helpful tools for gathering information, and learn strategies for interpreting and applying their data for improved classroom practice.

6. TITLE: Come on In! How to Build Community When You Can't Leave Your Office

PRESENTERS: Kimberly Reinhard, Pre School director

CONTENT AREA: Community

DESCRIPTION & GOALS: This workshop will look at tangible ways that administrators can create community and develop relationships by using office space (no matter how small), toys, animals, newsletters, staff development and a simple open door. This is presented from the Director perspective and conferees will have an opportunity to learn:

- How relationships can be developed in an office and then trickle down to the rest of the center to
 establish a strong sense of community. Examples and samples given.
 - How you can set up an environment that welcomes families and create a space using your interests and theirs to develop relationships with even the most challenging families.

- How to use different forms of communication to establish relationships regardless of the personality. Examples of different approaches and styles given
- How to create staff development and parent programs to build community (samples of Amazing Race, Scavenger Hunts, Parent Workshops and more)
- 7. TITLE: Understanding children's Social-Emotional Development in the Classroom.

PRESENTER: Elana Benatar, LCSW, Independent Consultant, Child Play Therapist **CONTENT AREA:** Child Development, Special Needs

DESCRIPTION & GOALS: In this workshop I will present what is referred to as the "phase model" for understanding development and behavior of children in the classroom throughout the year. I will focus on 3 phases of development (attachment, individuation/autonomy, and consolidation) that originate from attachment theory, but are applied to a preschool classroom. The phase model provides a framework for understanding social-emotional development in preschool age children. In this workshop, participants will:

- Understand how children's classroom behaviors relate to developmental needs and tasks.
- Learn ways to structure activities and classroom setup around these phases and developmental needs,
- Gain perspective on how to manage the challenging behaviors and emotions that come up in each phase, both for children and staff members.
- Process their own phase-specific experiences as teachers or administrators in a preschool setting.
- 8. TITLE: "Teaching from Our Passions: Strategies for Moving from Ho Hum to Inviting Curriculum"
 PRESENTER: Jacky Howell, MA (Independent Consultant & Trainer, Early Childhood)
 CONTENT AREA: Curriculum

DESCRIPTION & GOALS: In this active, engaging workshop teachers will discover their strengths and look at all the interesting ideas to offer to young children when you teach from your passions. This training will help you uncover topics and activities that involve you and children in dynamic and inviting learning.

Three goals include:

- Teachers will uncover their unique interests and how they can be turned into curriculum
- Teachers will experience ways other teachers have used their passions and turned them into curriculum
- Teachers will begin developing activities to use right away in their classroom based on teaching from their passions.
- 9. TITLE: Sensory-Integration in the Classroom.

PRESENTERS: Sharon Goodwin & Allison Mistrett, MS, OTR/L (Leaps & Bounds Ped. OT)

CONTENT AREA: Child Development, Health/Safety & Nutrition, special needs

DESCRIPTION & GOALS: This workshop will provide a review of the sensory system and how it impacts a child's gross motor skills, fine motor skills and behavior. We will provide hands on opportunities to explore sensory strategies for helping children function to the best of their ability in the school setting. Participants will be able to:

- Describe how sensory processing can impact a child in the school setting
- Identify potential "red flags" demonstrated by children in the school setting that could indicate sensory possessing issues
- Develop a "tool kit" of sensory strategies to address various problematic behaviors in the school setting.

10. TITLE: SOCIAL JUSTICE & DIVERSITY in the Classroom

PRESENTERS: Betsy DeMulder, PhD & Stacia Stribling, PhD (Associate Profs., George Mason

University)

CONTENT AREA: Child Development, Curriculum, Professionalism

DESCRIPTION & GOALS: This workshop will demonstrate ways to take an inquiry stance in order to

identify and address issues of diversity and social justice in the preschool classroom.

Teachers will:

Develop critical inquiry skills,

- Learn about resources and materials that support a social justice stance, and
- Develop critical dialogue skills for use with colleagues and students.

11. TITLE: The Value of Children's Risk-Taking in Outdoor Environments: Let's Take a Balanced Approach!
PRESENTER: Sissy Walker, ED of WISE Educational Services

CONTENT AREA: Child Development, curriculum, health/safety/nutrition

DESCRIPTION & GOALS: In this workshop participants will examine their own perspectives around children's risk-taking behaviors in the outdoors, clarify the differences between risks and hazards, gain increased understanding of the role of risk taking in healthy child development and learning, and learn strategies for creating a balanced approach to risk-taking in the out of doors.

12. TITLE: A Year in the Sideyard

PRESENTER: Cara Elkins, MA & Rachel Henigan, MA (Classroom teachers)

CONTENT AREA: Child development, curriculum, health/safety/nutrition, community

DESCRIPTION & GOALS: Part one of the workshop will document our evolving construction and use of our outdoor space. We will look at the science, health, art and literacy curriculum and materials which underpin our time outside and how they have changed over the years through teacher reflection and adaptation and through tremendous parent participation. Participants will look at a power point presentation with photos and other documentation of our time outside and get to handle different materials such as dirt, seeds, newspaper pots and natural blocks. Part two of the workshop will be facilitated independent work time and group discussion to map out how participants can adapt this work to whatever scale is available to them from filling a large tupperware container with dirt and placing it in the sensory area, to rallying parents to plant an indoor or outdoor vegetable garden.

Directions: Located just east of the Seven Corners area of Falls Church, Virginia, on Route 7 (also known as Leesburg Pike) one quarter mile east of Highway 50. Address is **6165 Leesburg Pike, Falls Church, VA 22044-2302.** The office phone number is 703-532-8220. Our main parking lot is around in the back of the church and so is our main entrance.

From DC and MD:

Take Beltway (495) South. Exit onto Rte 50 East toward Arlington. Go 3-4 miles to Rte 7 Exit (Leesburg Pike East). This will be a right exit. Go 1/2 mile (through several lights) to the First Christian Church of Falls Church, which will be on the right side of the street. There is plenty of parking behind the church.

From Alexandria:
