This has been a banner year for the Historical Museums. We celebrated our 65th Anniversary and the 60th Anniversary of the Pioneer Museum. Crow Valley School is resplendent in new paint and both Museums hosted a very successful run of



Spooky Tales by Master Story Teller Antoinette Botsford. Our goal has been to increase usage of both Museums and Spooky Tales drew more than 300 visitors to our programming thanks to a team lead by board member Carol Kulminski.

We paid the mortgage off this year and installed heat for the cabins and main gallery which are huge milestones for us. This helps the long term conservation of the Pioneer Museum cabins and exhibits and allows us to be open more hours during the winter serving locals and visitors alike.

Attendance numbers at both Museums are higher than last year. Our Aviation History exhibit is bringing a number of folks from all over the Northwest and beyond. Hearing and Saving Orcas Voices projects have been successful in fundraising and recruiting new volunteers for transcription.

Enthusiastic kudos are in order for Edrie and Terri Vinson and board member Harold Lentzner as the driving forces behind this important and labor intensive project. Linda Peth has done an outstanding job in our museum store as well as recruiting and training new docents.

Pegi Groundwater and Madie Murray redesigned our increasingly popular website. Brittney Maruska has done an amazing job as our administrative assistant helping train docents, doing our deposits, processing memberships and coordinating the myriad of details that go with our events and fund raising efforts.

I want to thank the president Jim Biddick and all the board of directors for their hard work and support over this past year and you, most importantly: our vital members, volunteers, donors and helpers, each an integral part our successful team.
