PARISH COUNCIL CORNER

The Divine Liturgy of the Armenian Church has sustained the Armenian people continuously for more than 1700 years. Our parents, grandparents, and those before them found stability and hope in the regular celebration of the Badarak. Even during the Covid-19 Pandemic, services were held each and every Sunday here in Yettem. I am not sure that we stop often enough to realize the importance of this continuity in our own Yettem Community and how it has happened.

Since our founding in 1911, we have been served by eleven priests – only three since 2003. The spiritual leadership of Father Vartan, Father Zaven and Father Mashdots and those before them have provided us with great stability.

This month, I would like to reflect on the service of our altar servers and choir in their unwavering devotion to St. Mary Yettem.

Later this month, His Eminence Archbishop Hovnan Derderian will be ordaining additional altar servers. In 1986, twelve altar servers were pictured in our 75th anniversary book. Here recently, we depend on the service of our ordained: Deacon Randy Tellalian, Deacon Ryan Tellalian, Sub Deacon Alan Farsakian, Sub Deacon David Yahnian and Acolyte Dustin Vartanian to assist Father Mashdots at the altar. Thank you for your dedication.

A large part of our weekly service is singing with the same melodies sung at all Armenian Churches across the world. Traditionally, Orthodox churches did not use instruments, although churches today will have organs. It is the choir that leads the congregation in singing. In our Armenian Church, the faithful are encouraged to sing with the choir because the choir's responses are the people's responses.

We are blessed to have our dedicated St. Mary Armenian Church Choir led by Mari Louise Menendian, who also serves as the organist. Again, looking back to our 75th anniversary book, pictured were thirteen regular choir members, led then by Araxie Menendian – Mari Louise's mother. Today, we thank Kohar Sheklian, JoAnn Sheklian, Janice McWilliams, Laurie Menendian, John Kalfayan, Marilyn Zerounian, Linda Farsakian Wall, Yn. Maral Khanjian, Annie Davidian, Olivia Garabedian and Sharon Luisi who lend their voices to our choir.

We need to remember these servants in our thoughts and prayers and take the opportunity to thank these individuals for their service to our church.

Lucille Boudakian Margosian

Lucille (Yeghsapert) was born in Yettem on March 24, 1932, to Hacher and Mary Majarian Boudakian. She joined her three older siblings Nazalie Evelyn, Garabed Charlie, and Hartoon Harry. Her brother Hagop Jack was born 7 years later. The family moved to a ranch in Visalia where Lucille was raised. Her parents frequently took her out of school to help during harvest season. She attended Visalia High School where she excelled in the Girls Athletic Association. She then attended and graduated from the College of the Sequoias. All the time she was in school, she divided her time between helping her family and caring for her four cousins, Judy, Armen, Danny, and Dickie.



At an ACYO dance in Fowler, she saw her brothers' friend Amos standing on the side lines and asked him to dance. That was the beginning of their courtship. On their first date, Lucille was told she could go only if she took her cousin Danny. Lucille and Amos were married on November 15, 1953, at St. Mary Yettem.

The couple started their life together living in Monson in the house Amos built. Amos's younger brother George also lived with them. It was not long before their first born, twins Sharon and Karon were born. Then 18 months later Aron was born. Lucille cared for the children and did the book work for Amos and George's ranches. The family moved to their new home on Avenue 384 where Lucille lives to this day.



Lucille now has 6 grandchildren and 2 great-grandchildren. She loves and supports them as she did her children. It is nothing for her to drop everything at a moment's notice to care for her grandchildren. Every year before school started, she took the grandchildren to sushi and then to Office Depot to buy each their school supplies.

Life was good and the house was always full of people. Lucille enjoyed cooking and hosting. This came in handy because Amos often came in Sunday morning and told Lucille the gang was coming over for dinner that night. At Christmas time, the house was full of family and friends. She also enjoyed the simpler times when her parents came to dinner. No matter the occasion, Lucille set a beautiful table loaded with food.

Lucille learned the importance of supporting her church from her grandfather Katcher Majarian, one of the Godfathers of our church and donor of the land for the church hall. Majarian Hall is named after her grandparents. Being a devoted member of Ladies Society since 1963, Lucille held the offices of treasurer and of advisor for multiple years. She served on the Memorial Dinner committee and was the Salad Bar and Fashion Show chairlady. There wasn't a committee or duty from which she shied away. She is especially proud that she served in the organization with her mother and now with her daughter Karon.

Lucille also served the church in other capacities. She is a Century Club charter member. She taught Sunday school. It was her idea for the Merchants' Luncheon which continues today. She served on the church's 75th and the 100th anniversary committees. She convinced her friend Ralph Moore to develop a miniature rose for the 75th anniversary celebration. It was named SAINT MARY, variety: MORyettem.

Over the years, Lucille showed her strength as a wife, mother, and grandmother. She has dealt with grace the loss of her husband Amos, her son Aron, and her brother-in-law George as well as a car accident which hampered her mobility. Through it all, she held her family together and never abandoned our church.

Jesus's Last Sayings on the Cross

The last moments of a man's life in front of death is full of meaning. Many of us do not think about these moments where He sees all of the emotional life's events and tries to give His life summary to all His lovers. Christ came to this world to do God's will to save you and me. Jesus paid the price of this salvation by shedding his blood on the cross. Jesus spent his last hours nailed on the cross.
