



Super's Report

Bob McGeever Division Superintendent

It was a Thursday night and the Packers were not looking good. I figured I should turn off the sound and just read something for a bit. On the top of the pile was a book I mentioned last month, Scenery for Model Railroads by Bill McClanahan. It has been decades since I had read it all the way through. Seemed like as good time as any to do it again. By the time I was half way through it I realized that right now is a pretty good time to be a model railroader. The design issues and problems faced by anyone building a model railroad have not changed since the 60's but nowadays we have a much better set of tools and materials to work with. One thing that has not changed that much since the 60's is plaster. The book has pages and pages of discussions of the pros and cons of different types of plaster for different types of casting and scenery work. We still have these discussions. Often. Repeatedly. But ground cover and foliage techniques have really advanced. The book discussed the use of sawdust, zip texture (more plaster!) and flock for grass. Real flock. The type you find at an art or fabric store. No fine turf or static grass in those days! Foliage was mostly made from lichen. I don't recall a single use of dilute white glue in any of the ground cover sections. And the terrain techniques have evolved. We still lay plaster soaked cloth over cardboard strips or window screening. Now the cloth is usually plaster gauze. The window screening is plastic, not metal. I recall the scenery drew blood the first time I tried to form metal screening into hillside contours. I was

using a tin snips instead of the scissors I use today. Like I said, right now is a pretty good time to be a model railroader. The interesting thing is that despite the limitations of the materials folks were working with in the 60's, the techniques in the book are still fundamentally sound. They will work really well when you use the all the new materials that are available today. Makes me wonder what someone like John Allen could accomplish if he was working on a model railroad today. I'm sure it would be truly incredible.

On to other topics:

Rail School is fast approaching. We will need extra support from the membership to set up the room before the event starts and to put everything back where we found it after the event is complete. So even if you are not putting on a clinic, you can show up early and really contribute to the success of the event.

The Bad Order is getting a new editor. After many years of service, Paul Mangan is giving up the post. Kathy Clancy volunteered to take over the post on a Thursday and the Board of Directors gave her the job the following Monday. It never fails to amaze me how fast the BOD processes an appointment once we find out someone has volunteered to take the job.


We are getting an early start on the spring elections. There will be at least two new members on the BOD after the spring elections. John Haverberg and Fred Robinson have decided to step down from the BOD. At least two people have expressed an interest in running for the board. If you have any interest in running for the BOD, contact Mike Vivion. As the Past Superintendent, he is the person who organizes the annual BOD elections.

3-D printing is another of the new tools that I think makes right now a real good time to be a model railroader. The Madison Area Technical College is running a couple of 5 week mini-courses called "3-D Printing Design Intro". There is a session starting on January 21st and another starting on April 26th. I have been trying to teach myself the basics of 3-D printing. But there is a problem. The teacher doesn't know any more than the student. If you sign up for the January session, we can be lab partners! MATC is also running a pair of mini-courses covering the 3-D modeling software SketchUp. The "SketchUp Intro" session starts on March 23rd. The "SketchUp Advanced" session starts April 27th. SketchUp is free software that is commonly used to create models for submission to a 3-D printing service like Shapeways. It can very useful for planning scratch built structures.

SCWD Board of Directors Meeting Minutes November 9, 2015



The Board of Directors meeting for the 2015-2016 South Central Division, Midwest Region, National Model Railroad Association was called to order at 7:00 pm on November 9, 2015 by Superintendent Bob McGeever. In attendance were Directors McGeever, Phil Berry, Phil Hottmann, Bill Clancy, John Haverberg and Fred Robinson and guest Ewing Row. Bob declared a quorum present.

A motion was made by Bill, seconded by Phil H. and approved by the Board to accept the minutes of the 10/12/2015 Board Meeting as submitted.

Phil B. presented paymaster's reports for the months of Sept. and Oct., 2015. Bill made a motion to accept, Phil H. seconded and the Board approved the reports as presented.

Committee Reports:

Bad Order: Paul Mangan stressed the need to Bob, again, for articles by committee and Board members to be submitted by the 14^{th} of the month.

Club Liaison: Trainfest is in Milwaukee this coming weekend. There will be some involvement by SCWD members with layout displays and providing fliers to distribute for our show in February.

Clinics: Fred was thanked for good clinics at the 10/11 general SCWD meeting. For Dec. a clinic on trackside details, a report on the National NMRA meeting in Portland, a review of contest judging and video(s) on basic landscape modeling will be presented. Question brought to Bob by meeting attendee if the videos were copyrighted and did we have permission to show them. Phil B. said answer is that we do not charge for members to see them, so it is okay to show them.

Contests – models and photographs: Board noted the need for records of winners now that certificates are no longer being issued.

Modeling project: Ewing Row reported that 22 adult and 10 youth group kits have been paid for.

Layout Tours: Phil H. reported on layout tours planned for Dec. (Al Potts) and for next spring. He is working on a special list for the May combined Divisional meeting.

Publicity: SCWD meeting date and information through May 2016 have been provided to hobby and railfan magazines. Mad City Model Railroad Show and Sale dates and Info likewise has been provided to the hobby and railfan magazine "events" columns.

Rail School: Flyers to be provided at Olbrich Gardens Holiday Train and Flower show starting early December. Committee is working on arranging trainers for school.

Rail Show: Planning is on track for 2016 show.

Youth Group: Ad hoc meeting at Trainfest planned. Bob McGeever finishing new, light weight portable table(s) for youth display layout.

<u>Old Business</u>: Final changes to the SCWD Bylaws by BOD were reviewed. Fred made a motion to accept as modified, Bill seconded, and Board approved.

New Business: During discussion about publicity Bill suggested SCWD compile a list of model and prototype upcoming "events" outside of the tourist trains. John noted that John fisher had done this as a regular contribution to the Bad Order based on information he obtained from a variety of sources. Included in John's reports were railroad specific Historical Society meeting dates and locations, club meets and sales in the Wisconsin area, special steam and diesel railfan trips, etc. Bill felt that since SCWD members model a wide range of railroads in a wide range of locations, the service should identify events at least country wide. He also expressed a need for timely transfer of the information which might preclude using the Bad Order as a primary vehicle which is only published once a month. Bob suggested Bill investigate issues related to such a service and report back.

Motion by Bill, seconded by Phil H, to adjourn was approved at 8:10 pm.

Answer: The Milwaukee and Mississippi Railroad. Today it is known as the Milwaukee Road.




Our Train show in February always brings out our best so I salute the hardest working men and women in show business, the SCWD load in and out Crew.



Plans for this spring are progressing at a fast pace. Our Division AP chair Ken Hojnacki has organized a Make and Take clinic that goes along with this theme

The quest for modeling knowledge:

Make and Take Project

For our March meeting, we will have a hands-on construction clinic based on the NMRA Modeling with the Masters series. You will have the opportunity to construct a coil steel load complete with carrier in HO, N and other scales if you desire. You will construct four coil steel loads with banding and a steel I-beam carrier out of styrene and two wooden timber carriers from stripwood for use in a 40-42' gondola. The wooden carriers allow you to use a shorter or longer gondola by centering the carriers over the trucks. You don't need to have a high degree of skill working with styrene or wood to participate. Having built these at the Portland National, it is a fun project and one you can easily replicate at home if you desire more. All materials will be provided but if you want to bring a scale rule, a sanding tool, and/or your favorite paint brush, please feels free. All parts will be cut to length but may need some finishing. We will paint the coils but painting the steel carrier will be up to you in your own workshop. A PowerPoint presentation will take you through the construction steps and at the end; you will have a unique load you can proudly say you built yourself.

Those not wishing to build the project will have the opportunity to watch videos. If you would like to build a coil steel load, we will have a sign-up sheet at Rail School or you can email me your interest and what scale kit you would like at <u>khojnacki@charter.net</u>.
