Governor's Message

n behalf of the MWR Board, Happy New Year! I don't know about you, but I was expecting flying cars and Rosie the Robot by 2019. But at least the Bears are in the playoffs!

In all seriousness, I was also expecting a better environment for women and girls, but here we are. The U.S. tried to take language on reproductive health out of a U.N. resolution to prevent violence against women on December 17th. We voted against the resolution. Let me repeat, we voted against a resolution about preventing violence against women. In July, U.S. officials forced Ecuador to stop backing a resolution in support of breast-feeding - opposing decades of consensus that breast feeding is best. We sided with American infant formula producers. But then we dropped our opposition once Russia revealed that they supported it. The point here is that policies are being made with little to no concern for the actual well-being of women and girls. On December 21st, The Violence Against Women Act expired at midnight as the government shut down. Program funds that help victims of sexual assault, domestic abuse and stalking have been stopped until the shutdown is resolved.

As you know, our Soroptimist mission is to improve the lives of women and girls through programs leading to social and economic empowerment. We are an apolitical group, but that does-

n't mean that we can't support or oppose issues that impact women and girls. Our clubs here in Midwestern Region do a great job supporting women through our award programs as well as supporting girls with the DIBI program. At the moment, we have no plans to create a Legislative Advocacy Committee but it's something to consider. As Soroptimists, it's imperative that we understand policies that impact women and girls. To that end, several MWR members will be in New York this coming March, to attend the 63rd Commission on the Status of Women. I'm thrilled to be one of the attendees and promise to bring back lots of information to share with all of you. Whether you area social media junkie or a newbie, be sure to follow UN Women on Twitter and FaceBook/ Instagram, as they are a good source of news that impacts women and girls. And be sure that you're following me, @SIMWRGOV and MWR @SoroptimistMWR on Twitter. Here's a link to the

When "Amber" came to our Gracehaven house she was so traumatized she hardly spoke. Her traffickers held her in a room for two months and instilled deep fear that still affects her. Understandingly, she coped through angry outbursts and self harm. But she found her voice at Gracehaven, and learned healthy relating and coping skills. She blossomed into the bubbly, funny girl who could make everyone laugh. And most of all, she began a relationship with Jesus Christ. She has graduated from the House, but wrote this letter to everyone who helped in her journey: Dear Gracehaven, This place has helped me with a lot of stuff! I love every single staff and supervisor. You all have been there through everything! Even when I called ya'll rude names when I was upset, ya'll were still there! When I needed to talk, somebody was there to give me good feedback, or to just listen. I love

Rene. She's THE BEST THERA-

PIST! I just feel so comfortable to tell her anything. The girls though...the girls are a lot!! I really do love all of the girls. It might not have seemed like it, but trust me, I do! I had some rocky moments with some of them, but we went through it together. Whenever I'm down, ya'll were there to make me laugh. We had some great times together! I will never forget them, or you all! I thank God for sending me here, for meeting great, beautiful people! Thank you everyone for taking your time and patience to

Soroptimist International of Milwaukee



Rosalind Metcalf tested the knowledge of SI Milwaukee members on human trafficking when she spoke at the club's November meeting and she was impressed by what she discovered. SI scored 100 percent on the yesno exam distributed to members.

Rosalind specializes in domestic and sex abuse and prevention and is herself a survivor of abuse as a teen. "When I was 15 I was kidnapped and held for 10 to 11 months," she said.

Questions covered a range of matters, including such basics as the very fact that victims of trafficking often do not understand that they are being victimized. And that those victimized cover a wide range of the social strata. Many are not homeless or from backgrounds of abuse, poverty, drugs or alcohol, but have fled lives of physical comfort in affluent areas because, for them, something is missing in their safe homes.

"It can happen to anyone at any time," Rosalind said. "For me, my mother was a teacher and my dad in the military. I was the kind of person this 'doesn't happen to'."

The trafficked person can have started by consenting to be sexually trafficked or to be used for panhandling or shoplifting or any number of other for-money activities.

They can make more money in human trafficking than they could at McDonald's, Rosalind explained.

They wind up being blindsided because they never understood the long-term effects," she said.

"It's a crime that happens in plain sight, and it happens to boys as well as girls."

Rosalind spoke of the need for adults to make their children aware of human trafficking so they can recognize and avoid it.

Malls are one of the prime locations for slick conmen to approach vulnerable-looking young people and lure them into the life, according to Rosalind.

Prosecuting abusers can be difficult. Often there is no evidence of abuse and victims are reluctant to talk out of fear or embarrassment or the belief that what they have is what they deserve. Many of the people walking the streets have addictions that control them, she said.

We hear much today about human trafficking, but, according to Rosalind, there is not really a whole lot more of it going on than there has been in the past, it's just that there is so much more awareness of it now.

Rosalind tells the story of her own journey to healing and passes on educational information in her book "Smoking Out the Shadows," available through her website www.healingstartstoday.com.

Rosalind defines the mission of her Healing Starts Today Foundation this way: It is to end human trafficking, to prevent violence and to empower our community with the tools to achieve health, personal growth, wellness and awareness through rescuing, education and by helping individuals to development productive life skills.



SI Middletown Ruby Award winner: 'It's not about me at all'

Jim and Elsa Croucher's lives changed forever when their 18-year-old daughter, Tina, a 1992 Monroe High School graduate, was killed by her boyfriend 17 years ago.

Since then, the Middletown couple has taken drastic steps to keep other parents from burying their daughters as victims of domestic violence.

To work through their grief and to educate young people and their parents about violent teen relationships, Elsa and Jim Croucher founded Citizens Against Domestic Violence (CADV), a non-profit organization.

They have presented "Dating Violence: 101" to more than 73,000 high school and college students. In the last 1 1/2 years, the organization has assisted 41 victims and 76 children with funds and living necessities such as furniture, appliances, and motel accommodations.

A pinnacle of success for the Crouchers came May 13, 2009, when House Bill 19 — named the Tina Croucher Act — was

passed by the Ohio House of Representatives. This bill will require school districts to adopt a dating violence policy to include dating violence education within the health education curriculum in grades 7-12.

At 4 p.m. today, Oct. 27, Elsa Croucher will address the Ohio Senate about the importance of the Tina Croucher Act. "We want to make an impression," she said.

For all her efforts bringing attention to this cause, she will be honored next month by Middletown's Soroptimist International organization with the Ruby Award, marking the achievements of women who make a difference.

Mary Lu Flynn, who wrote Croucher's Ruby Award nominating letter, praised her for "taking a tragedy and turning it into a movement for change."

The Crouchers probably have told their stories hundreds of times, something she called "very taxing on us mentally and physically."

She continues her fight to honor her daughter's memory. "It's not about me at all," she said when asked about the Ruby Award, named after the first federation president, Ruby Lee Minar. "We don't care if the students remember our names as long as they remember what we're telling them."
