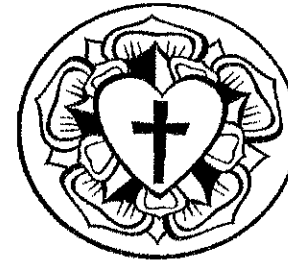




A combined service with St. Paul's UCC Church to honor all veterans for Memorial Day will be held May 30th during the Sunday School hour at the memorial.

Dear Folks,

It is not unusual in the ordinary days of life we dream of what could be. Words like, “I wish ...,” and “it would be really nice if ...” carry our hopes and dreams as we imagine a future time. These dreams allow us to expand the possibilities beyond what we know now and help us set goals.


Sometimes this dreaming takes place in the natural transitions of life. A high school graduate dreams about their next step in life as they become more independent. A college graduate, moving into the work force, dreams of that perfect job that will use their hard-earned skills. Engaged couples dream of what they want their married life to be. Those nearing retirement dream of what to do with their “free” time. Some of these visions and dreams we make a conscience effort to obtain. Others fall by the wayside, perhaps not fitting into our life the way we originally thought.

Recently I rediscovered some notes taken from an All-Committee Night at St. Paul's many years ago. While not dated, one of the dreams was to have more musicians in the contemporary service, so the notes date back quite a few years. While we no longer have that Contemporary Service, I was surprised by the number of visions or dreams we have accomplished. Dreams such as printing a full service bulletin, having the handbell choir again, coming to the altar rail more than once a month, learning the first setting in the ELW,

assisting ministers, having the Saturday night service every weekend, developing visitor gifts, one Sunday service in the summer, screens for projection in the sanctuary, healing services on the 5th Sunday, and being able to record the service on CD have been put into place. That's not to say we've done everything. We still dream having more choir members, singing the psalms, and having music sponsors for special music and groups among other dreams. Someone even hoped for a church van. While some of these items have been put on hold with the pandemic this past year as we had to change the way we worship and minister, it is interesting to see how far dreaming can take us.

The Acts passage I quoted in the beginning comes from Peter's Pentecost speech. He witnesses to Jesus Christ and the power of the Holy Spirit, dispelling the idea that the disciples were drunk as they spoke in other languages. Sometimes dreaming or visioning can feel like folly, but Spirit-led dreaming has the power to accomplish so much more than we can imagine. My dream for our church is that as we come out of the restrictions of the pandemic and go back to something that looks more normal, we also take time to dream and vision of what God is calling us to be. Experiencing the pandemic gave us new ideas (i.e. livestreaming, the camera system, and in home communion kits.) This past year has proven we can be creative and resourceful in reaching out in new ways. Let us be Spirit-led and continue to dream the possibilities!

NORTHEASTERN PENNSYLVANIA SYNOD, ELCA

Our Synod is trying something new – and we need you! As many of you will know, our 2021 Synod Assembly (SA21) was scheduled to be at the Kalahari Resort in the Poconos. COVID canceled that plan. Our Synod Assembly for this year is to be virtual once again and is scheduled for June 4 & 5.

Our theme for SA21 is “Growing Young and Vital.

It will showcase our commitment to the nation-wide church renewal program called “Growing Young”. It will also introduce our three-pronged Synod-wide emphasis on the “Vital Signs,” signs of life and thriving among us. These Vital Signs are: **Loving the Land, Healing the Hurt, and Engaging the Stranger.** Our goal was to invite many churches and ministries in the Synod to participate by bringing your ministries in the three areas to display at the Kalahari Resort. **So, what to do, now that SA21 is virtual?**

A Brief Look At Some Summer Hill History

Since Mother's Day will be observed during this month of May, I thought it would be appropriate to focus my article on the first Mother and Daughter Banquet that was held at our church. For many years thereafter, both the Mother and Daughter Banquet served by the men, and the Father and Son Banquet served by the women, were both held at St. Paul's and were eventually discontinued. In 2009, during our church's 225th anniversary, both banquets were resurrected, but after a few years, they were again discontinued.

This information was in "The Call" newspaper, the weekly newspaper from Schuykill Haven, on May 17, 1962.

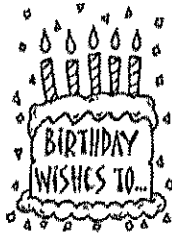

Crop Walk Results

Each year on the first Sunday of October, the Schuylkill Haven Council of Churches, of which we are a part, holds the annual Crop Walk. Monies raised support our local food pantry in Schuylkill Haven as well as food projects around the world through Church World Service. Recently the Council received an update from CWS of one of these projects that aided farmers in Northwest Haiti.

Erin Luchenbill of CWS reports, *"Throughout 2020, the COVID-19 pandemic took a catastrophic toll. Haiti's Northwest department was no exception. Unemployment soared, and people lost their livelihoods. This meant that many people spent what little savings they had.*

When planting season arrived in November, farmers had fields that they had prepared to plant. But many couldn't afford to buy the seeds that would go in those fields. CWS and our partners knew that a small boost now would lead to a huge impact for families when harvest season rolled around. So we provided seeds to 100 farmers. These seeds were short-cycle, which means that they would be able to harvest sooner. Of the 100 farmers, 70 were women. The seeds they received to plant included corn, peanuts, black beans, white beans and lima beans.

Five months later, farmers are reimbursing CWS with part of their harvests. These repayments will ensure that seeds are available for future planting seasons if farmers need the boost again. Each farmer pays back 1.5 times the number of cans of seeds they received.

Gedeon Sidernier received peanuts and corn to plant. When he came to reimburse corn, Gideon said: "With one can of corn received, I was able to harvest a yield of 80 cans."

Ruthelaine Destin is a single mother of three. When she came to our partner to reimburse her seeds, she said:

"In November I received corn, black and white beans, and lima beans. It was a good moment for me to receive this, because my land was prepared, but I had no money to buy seeds. I had nice crops, good crops. I have already harvested black and white beans and lima beans. They gave me one can of beans, with which I made a yield of 6 cans, without counting what I have eaten and donated to others. As for lima beans, I made 14 cans out of 1 can. I shared with others, I sold a part, I paid for school for my children, and I used part for our own consumption. On top of that, I have 14 cans saved.

With these seeds, I am doing well. This is my joy and this will help me advance, because I am progressing thanks to this group that gave us these seeds"

The funds your walk raised provided a small investment in Haiti that led to a huge harvest of joy that is underway right now. Thank you for making this story possible!"
