WATER BIRDS

On February 9th we should see many water birds and quite a few hawks. We will be going out to the Northeast Oxidation Ponds(Fort Bliss Ponds), which is always a must stop on our winter trips. Migration does not start until the end of the month, but migration from further south has already started, which adds to the number of species in this area. To enjoy this trip meet at Furniture Country, 4801 Fred Wilson Rd. at 7:45 AM on Sat. the 9th. Larry Jordan will be your host. (833-5969)

COUNTRY CLUB

The many swimming birds in the crossroads ponding area will greet you as you are meeting in this location for a leisurely afternoon of birding. The crossroads pond is located at the southwest corner of Mesa and Doniphan During the afternoon doves, wood ckers, sparrows and various other landbirds should be seen. The time to meet is 2:45 PM on the 24th of Feb.



GULLS AT FORT HANCOCK

Swallows should also be present at this 160 acre reservoir. In addition there should be many ducks, egrets, and may "Vestern Grebes. We will also look for Harris' Hawks and make a stop at the Tornillo Rest as a. Bring a lunch as this trip will last into the early afternoon. Meet at Feather Lake on Sunday March 3d, at 7:30 AM. RIO BOSQUE PARK

LAKE STINKY

SPRING HIGHLIGHTS

BIRDATHON

Far and away our biggest fundraiser is BIRDATHON. This year it will occur during the weekend of May 4th and 5th. A change this year will incorperate team birding. PIFASE plan now to participate in this very importatant event as a spotter and/or solicitor and of course as a sponsor.

Last year El Paso/Trans Pecos Audubon was one of the most successful chapters of its size in the nation, and our goal this year is to improve on last.

BREEDING BIRD ATLAS

We will again be participating in the Texas Breeding Bird Atlas project. This year we will census the Hueco Tanks Quadrangle. At this time 3 trips are scheduled, for April 20, May 18, and June 22.

SOUTHEAST ARIZONA

For our annual trip to this area we will be going to the Chiracahua Mountains over the Memorial Day weekend, which will be on the 25th, 26th, and the 27th of May.

OTHER

There will be several local trips in the spring and a weekend to the Ruidoso/Bonito Lake area in June.

PACIFIC OCEAN BIRDS

This coming September a Pelagic (birds that stay out in the ocean) trip is being considered. This could be a motor trip to San Deigo (about 5 days, with a stop at the Salton Sea) or a flight to San Francisco (about 3 days) for birding off Monterey. CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT

A quick analysis of the El Paso Christman Bird Count revealed a few unuasual facts. We had high (double the 10 year average) numbers of Canada Geese, Ring-necked Ducks, Western Sandpipers, Say's Phoebes, Chihuahuan Ravens, Mountain Bluebirds, and Yellow-headed Blackbirds.

New birds, never recorded on CBC, were Plain Titmouse, Brown Creeper, Yellow-Warbler, and Golden-crowned Sparrow (seen in area, but not on count day).

Unusual because they were not seen were; Common Moorhen, Roadrunner, Ladder-backed Woodpecker, Black Phoebe, Lesser Goldfinch, and Greentailed Towhee.

We had 29 spotters in the field and 6 looking in their yards. A total of 18,531 birds of 92 species were counted.

RARE BIRD TRIP

Not a function of the chapter, but Bob Johnson is going to take his kiannual trip to Southeast Texas the latter part of April. Going to the Kerrville area to look for the Golden-cheeked Warbler and the Blackcapped Vireo. Also to Santa Anna NWR hoping to spot the Hook-billed Kite a the Groove-billed Ani. TEXAS BREEDING BIRD ATLAS PROJECT



Now entering its 5th year, The Texas Breeding Bird Atlas Project (TBBAP), has yielded some fascinating results. But much work remains to be done, especially in west Texas.

The TBBAP is an ambitious effort to map the distributions of all breeding bird species in the state. When complete, it will advance greatly our understanding of Texas birdlife. The maps and data bases developed will be invaluable scientific and conservation tools.

Last year, as a chapter project, we surveyed the North Franklin Mtn. topographic quadrangle for the TBBAF, recording 53 nesting species. This year, we'll cover the Hueco Tanks quadrangle. Watch the field trips schedule for TBBAP outings and join us. Better yet, cover an additional survey area or areas on your own. There are many in need of field work. Please contact John Sproul (915/545-5157) if you are interested.

Another important way you can help the TBBAP is to support it financially. Tax-deductible contributions can be made to the Texas A&M University Development Foundation, P.O. Box J-7, College Station, TX 77844. Include on your check a memo that it is for the Texas Breeding Bird Atlas Project.

The atlas is scheduled to be published in 1993. Please help see this worthwhile project through to fruition.

NEW HUECO TANKS BIRD LIST

The 3rd edition of "Birds of Hueco Tanks State Historical Park: a Field Checklist" is now available. Next time you visit the Park, pick up a copy. Once again, Barry Zimmer has done an excellent job compiling the list, which reflects further gains in our understanding of birdlife at Hueco Tanks. Since the last edition in 1984, the species list has grown from 197 to 211 and the number of confirmed breeding species from 32 to 35. Another 9 species are shown as "suspected breeding." We'll be trying to confirm a few of those during breeding-birdatlas work in 1991.

ENDANGERED SPECIES ACTIONS

On Dec 27, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) published a final rule determining the Golden-cheeked Warbler to be an endangered species. This bird nests only in central Texas in mature Ashe juniper-oak woodlands, and the USFWS cited continued loss and fragmentation of that habitat as the cause of its endangered status. By providing the USFWS extensive information documenting declines in Golden-cheeked Warbler populations and prospects for future habitat loss, Audubon chapters in Texas played a key role in the listing decision.

Meanwhile, the USFWS has reportedly made its decision on whether the Mexican Spotted Owl warrants listing as endangered or threatened, but at this writing the decision has yet to be made public.

They did a tremendous job clearing an immense accumulation of tumbleweeds from the south fence and the west side of the basin. This has to be the dirtiest and most unpleasant chore at FL (which several chapter members will readily attest to), and the boys fell to and got the job done in record time. Our sincere thanks to Kevin and the leaders and members of Troop 677.

Additional applause must go to the following friends of FL who also had tumbleweed patrol on Nov. 24th and Jan. 12th, and all went home with scratches and looking grubby: Jean Coyle, Bob Johnson, Muriel Metcalf, Jo Nagel, Betty Pagel, John Sproul, and Nancy Wilson. Betty and Bob were there both work days and really deserve gold stars. With only six people each day, much work was completed and certainly the improvements that were made, in addition to those made by Kevin and crew, will be noted by those who walk the trail around the basin.


WAS GIET'S NEUES?*


