Twenty-third Sunday in Ordinary Time – 09-07-2025

"Who can know God's counsel, or who can conceive what the Lord intends...scarce do we guess the things on earth, and what is within our grasp we find with difficulty; but when things are in heaven, who can search them out?"

God's ways can seem very mysterious. Many people look around at the beauty of creation and readily admit that there must be a God but then at the same time they want to live as if he didn't exist.

But if there is a God who created all this then there must be very clear guidelines to help us navigate the world around us.

I can't imagine that God would have created light to show forth his beauty and then just allow us to drift aimlessly in darkness?

It's quite ironic! The stars and planets chart a pretty definite course, weather patterns on earth seem to follow a moderately predictable track, animals behave quite routinely according to their nature and the list goes on and on.

And yet human beings so often choose to step outside of God's plan and set their own course thinking that they know better.

Obviously the Lord, the Creator of the universe, understands the world around us perfectly and is aware of the challenges it presents much better than we do so he gave us rules to live by.
